


Here's some of the latest new books to arrive in our library!




How to Steal the Mona Lisa

How does a dog find his way home when he never had one to begin with?


This novel is written in verse. It has interesting formatting and illustrations. If you like dogs and you don't mind the tugging on the heart strings I think you'll love this new book in our library.




Rafferty Ferret Ratbag By Sherryl Jordan

Written by award winning NZ author - Sherryl Jordan, this book is a rollicking medieval adventure. Check it out today.




Inside Bubble Earth - Recycling

Now he has written a non fiction series called 'Bubble Earth.' In this science filled series he presents facts and information about what is happening to our Mother Earth.






Alex Rider by Anthony Horowitz

Graphic novels continue to be super popular in our library.




Dare to be Different

A Whale of the Wild By Rosanne Parry




ICE A secret. A rescue. A terrifying truth By Susan Brocker

James Ryan is 12 years old, he lives in Canterbury and has always loved nature and animals. This book started out as a school project, but James says he could not stop!



To her amazement, Sophia discovers that the aquanaut is not what it seems -- inside lives a band of four goofy sea creatures! And when




