### RECTOR'S MESSAGE



Congratulations to all the boys in the stand for the First XV Waitaki match last Wednesday. I was seated along to the western end with supporters from both sides. While it was great to see our players have another win on the paddock (part of a broader exchange success) and with our community out in force, I found myself watching our 'sideline school' in action much of the time; drawn by how well our boys behaved, and very proud of their conduct.

The stand was crowded. The weather was miserable. And not every student is fanatical about rugby. And while we would like to think that all boys will rise to the occasion to be sporting at such a game or similar event, we can't assume it. We all know that in larger numbers, groups of boys sometimes become ill-mannered or boorish when watching an exciting, competitive event, or forget themselves to reduce to behavior at its worst 'mob – like' and far from our POWER values. Sport doesn't always bring out the best in us as Kiwis!

The mood in the stand was however good - humoured and fun. Boys were definitely enjoying the atmosphere and sporting tussle.

The school haka, led by **Sidney Hamilton**, sent strong support out to the middle (the stand itself projecting it like a giant speaker). This sparked unity and common purpose.

Singing of *Eee Ah La Spatio* was spontaneous and enthusiastic (not saying this euphemistically) and if unpolished in musical terms it was certainly not lacking gusto. It heartened many of the Old Boys there as well.

Regarding respect for the opposition, there was total, utter, 'pin – dropping' silence as the opposition took kicks at goal. When a player made an error there wasn't a barrage of derogatory abuse or whistling. Players from both teams were warmly applauded as they were 'subbed' off. Departure from the stand was orderly in a congested space, and members of the public could leave easily. The facility was respected. It was, overall, an impressive sideline performance.

Why is all this important? It's because the character of the school was on display, as it is every day somewhere, somehow.

Times like this are a true test of how far boys have chosen to make the right choices, and to accept good advice, when away from full or direct staff influence and not under close individual scrutiny. The boys heeded earlier requests from last Tuesday to be positive and to separate themselves from other Boys' Schools we encounter with poorer self-control.

The boys also kept the inclusivity of the day's Waitaki Assembly until the final whistle (at the Assembly, Old Boy **Dick Tayler** gave us memorable musings - including about his run for Commonwealth Gold in '74. The 'Speedy Oil' made its mystical appearance again too!)

Lastly, there was lots of mateship in the stand. So many boys were clearly keen to see their mates do well. This spoke to the bonds and kinship in the school. The final applause and passionate haka directed at the stand by the First XV at the end said it all really.

## Timaru Boys' dominates Waitaki Exchange

The 135<sup>th</sup> Waitaki inter-school was played in cool damp conditions in Timaru on Wednesday the 29 August. Timaru emerged as clear cut winners 9-4 in the overall exchange.

The 1<sup>st</sup> XV match was a scrappy, dour affair in difficult, slippery conditions dominated by the defence of both sides and a high error rate. Waitaki, through a sound tactical kicking display, dominated territory and possession for long periods. They also had an edge on Timaru at scrum-time. They were perhaps guilty at times of not playing to their strengths close to the line and backline handling mistakes were costly for them. For Timaru Boys', their lineout and driving play was a strength and they were largely the more enterprising side, although guilty at times of moving the ball wide against a compressed defence without first committing the defenders. First half tries to **Taniela Wacokecoke** and **George Brown** were enough to see the home side to a 12-0 victory and round off a pleasing finish to the year.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> XV enjoyed a 19-10 victory over Waitaki after a tough season. A good all-round performance providing their season highlight. The **Colts** side dominated in an easy 69-5 win. **George Small** scored a hat-trick and along with **Ryan Allan** and **James Wacokecoke** was the best of the Timaru side.

The 1<sup>st</sup> XI Football side controlled their match and ran out comfortable 4-0 victors. **Ben Sewell** used his pace to good effect in a creative performance and was one of the home side's goal scorers along with **Logan Hope**, **Taylor Donaldson** and **Tyler Cunningham**. The junior match was a hard fought affair with Timaru narrow 2-1 winners. **Josh Goodwin**, **Pero Forman** and **Caleb Rollo** were the stand out performers.



The **Senior Basketball** side drew out to a clear-cut 86-60 win over their Waitaki counterparts. **James Watt** with 31 and **Jack Crossan** with 23 points led the scoring for Timaru while **Alvin Sutedja** again led a committed defensive effort.

In the **Junior Basketball** game, a strong Waitaki side were decisive 69-49 winners. **Ethan Seyb** was the best of the local side.

In **Hockey**, a late **Jack Thomson** goal was the difference in a 4-3 win for TBHS in the 2<sup>nd</sup>s match. **Lucas Wood** with a double and **Hayden Kennedy** were the other scorers for Timaru. With Rankin Cup looming, TBHS took the opportunity to give a number of wider squad and 2<sup>nd</sup> XI members a game.

The **Badminton** was an evenly fought contest with the result hinging on the last two singles matches both of which were narrow victories to Waitaki which saw them win the rubber 4-2.

Waitaki also took the honours in the **Squash** with a 2-1 win with **Stephen Garner** recording the only win for TBHS in the battle of the top ranked players.

The **Shooting** results saw honours shared, with Timaru taking out the Trap-shooting 417-413 and Waitaki the Smallbore 365-341.

The **Chess** team rounded out the victories for TBHS with a narrow 9-7 win and **Matthew Lang** recording wins in all four of his matches.





## Professor Glyn Harper's Visit

We were very fortunate to have renowned historian, Professor Glyn Harper visit our school on Wednesday 15 August. Glyn Harper is a professor of War Studies at Massey University in Palmerston North. He was the Director of the Centre for Defence and Security Studies for eight years and is currently Massey Project Manager for the Centenary of History of New Zealand and the First World War.

Professor Harper co-ordinated two sessions in our Hogben Assembly Hall. The first focused on the Great War and was attended by both the Senior and Junior year levels. The second was designed specifically for History students in Levels 2 and 3 and focused on the Holocaust.

History Scholarship students also attended a special seminar on Gallipoli with Professor Harper after school in the Memorial Library.

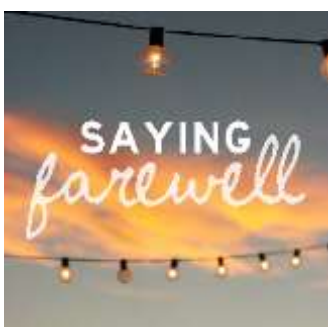

The boys have been asked to make known on their form any dietary requirements that the caterer will be required to know.

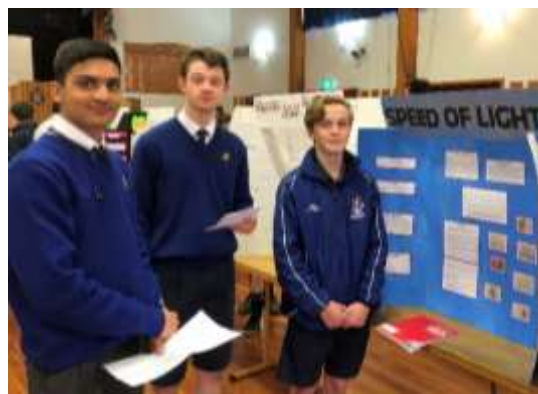

The season has proved that there is excellent depth coming through from the junior grades with the three TBHS 14<sup>th</sup> Grade teams performing well during the season and showing excellent improvement as the season progressed. We were fortunate to win both the league competition and have the TBHS Blue team named as South Canterbury Junior Team of the year. These teams were very well coached by **Taylor Donaldson** and **Henry Baxter** (TBHS White), **Jason McCone** (TBHS Navy) and **Todd Burtenshaw** (TBHS Blue).

## Sexuality Education in Health



Sexuality education is a key area of learning in *The Health and Physical Education Curriculum*.

This means that it must be included in teaching programmes at both primary and secondary school levels, using the strands and achievement objectives outlined in the curriculum document.

Sexuality education in schools provides students with opportunities to develop:

- knowledge, understanding and skills relating to sexual development – physical, emotional, and social
- knowledge, understanding and skills to enhance their sexual and reproductive health, eg knowledge about the process of conception and the skills to make decisions that maintain and enhance their sexual health
- personal and interpersonal skills and related attitudes, including:
  - the skills needed to examine people's attitudes, values and beliefs and their rights and responsibilities
  - attitudes of respect for themselves and other people
  - attitudes of care and concern for themselves and other people
  - effective communication skills, problem-solving and decision making skills
  - understanding and skills to enhance relationships, e.g. in relation to friendship, love, families and parenting.

The Sexuality component of the Health curriculum is compulsory in Years 9 & 10. If you do not wish your son to be part of the programme when it is being covered then you must write a letter to the Rector explaining the circumstances.

Years 9 and 10 will commence the programme in late Term 3 and will continue into Term 4.

## Careers



### Year 11 Careers Day

Through the joint efforts of a number of agencies, along with Aoraki Development and especially with the drive from TBHS Careers department and Opihi College, a highly successful Careers Expo was held in Temuka.

With tertiary-educated people making up 55 per cent of new trades apprentices in New Zealand last year, organisers of the Employment Expo hoped that bringing high schoolers together with employers will help them make better decisions earlier.
