My favourite colour is pink."


I am great at racing around in my pacer and love singing during music time. Especially into the microphone.


William for working really hard with Melissa from BLENNZ. She said he was an absolute superstar.



Keeleigh for great independent walking around the local block at Manaaki




Adam for a good transition back to school from the Rare Disorders Day celebration.
