## **Message From The Principal**

There has been a fair amount of media coverage over this year's round of NCEA exams, particularly those that are online.

A change to any long-established system such as external exams will always cause a degree of uncertainty and angst for staff, and staff are always concerned about problems that might upset or disadvantage their students. NZQA is aware of this and had taken steps to ensure, and were confident,



that the online system would operate effectively. However, for this year's Level 1 English exam there were 20,000 students enrolled to do this exam NZQA was aware of this number but, unfortunately, their network

slowed after 18,000 students logged on. NZQA was monitoring the load on their network and, on finding it was slowing down around the 18,000 students' mark, they closed it to any further log-ons. This decision obviously affected 2000 students nationally.

Fortunately for Ashburton College, only three of our students were affected. While this did cause undue stress on them and the exam supervisors, the back-up plan was put into action.

The back-up plan, via NZQA in case of such an eventuality, was always to revert to using the personalised hard copies of the same exam and completing their exam in hard copy written form. All students nationally had this fall-back option, and these papers were then available to be downloaded for each individual student impacted on by lack of online

NZQA is working on details of, and will advise, their approach to ensuring that students not able to log-on are not disadvantaged.

At College, as no doubt for a number of schools, our students already had experience of logging-in, having completed their English Derived Grade

My thanks go to our key staff who ensured that our students were wellprepared.

- Free Meningococcal Vaccines for 13-25 Year Olds From 01 March 2023, rangatahi (young people) aged 13 to 25 years old, in

certain situations, are now eligible for free Meningococcal B vaccines.
