TeachNZ Scholarships

Students who are fully registered teachers may apply for a Māori medium study award through TeachNZ. The study award provides paid leave, a contribution towards course fees and, in some cases, a contribution towards accommodation and travel or relocation expenses. If you are successful will receive the equivalent of your normal salary while on study leave.

Māori Bilingual and Immersion Teaching

Hōaka Pounamu

The Hōaka Pounamu: Bilingual and Immersion Teaching endorsement aims to develop high-quality graduates who will promote leadership and raise the knowledge of te reo Māori in bilingual, immersion and mainstream settings. Hōaka Pounamu is designed to extend teachers on the use of te reo Māori in the classroom.

Are these courses for me?

This programme is ideal for early childhood, primary and secondary teachers who are teaching te reo Māori in mainstream, bilingual and immersion settings and want to gain a postgraduate qualification whilst upskilling their te reo Māori and teaching skills. Applicants may be Māori teachers, teachers of te reo Māori, teachers responsible for Māori in schools, Resource Teachers of Māori, or Resource Teachers of Learning and Behaviour who work with Māori children and/or families. The programme is designed for but not restricted to practising teachers.

Master of Hōaka Pounamu Postgraduate Diploma in Hōaka Pounamu

Course	Timing	Description
EDHP603 Matauranga Māori Hei Marautanga	Term 1	30 points This course will critically examine Matauranga Māori: Māori ways of knowing and engaging with their environment in traditional and contemporary contexts as a means of developing a Kaupapa Māori based curriculum.
EDHP604 Tïkanga and Rautaki Whakaako Reo	Term 2	30 points This course will explore, develop and critically assess communicative teaching and learning methodologies and strategies for a range of learners and learning styles in Māori bilingual and immersion settings.
EDHP602 Te Whakarauora Reo	Semester 2	30 points This course will critically examine the historical repression of the Māori language/ indigenous languages and the growth of language revitalisation movements in the twentieth century.
EDHP601 Te Tiriti o Waitangi i te Ao Matauranga	Semester 2	30 points This course will enable teachers and educators to gain a sound knowledge of the Treaty of Waitangi and Te Tiriti o Waitangi, its roles in the history of New Zealand and the implications for theory and practice in learning communities today.

Entry requirements

Students require a teaching qualification (early childhood, primary or secondary) or Adult Teaching qualification or equivalent. Funding in the form of study awards (for fully registered teachers) are available for this year-long course (see the TeachNZ Scholarships information in this brochure).

An entry assessment to ascertain the level of te reo Māori proficiency is required.

How are the courses delivered?

All classes and assessments are delivered through the medium of te reo Māori.

What are the courses?

The Postgraduate Diploma in Hōaka Pounamu (PGDipHP) is a full-time, 120-point programme and consists of the four courses in the table above.

Pathway to the Master of Hōaka Pounamu

The PGDipHP can be upgraded to a Master of Hōaka Pounamu (180 point degree) by adding a minimum of another 60 points of Level 8 or 9 courses from the Master of Education schedule of courses. NOTE: the extra workload must be approved by the Hōaka Pounamu Programme Coordinator before enrolment into the MEd is confirmed.
