GENERAL INFORMATION

Getting to Bangkok

There are two airports in Bangkok. International flights are serviced at Suvarnabhumi International Airport while the old airport, Don Muang, handles the region's budget airlines for both domestic and international flights.

Getting Around Bangkok

An efficient, easily accessible transportation network makes getting around Bangkok a breeze. Forms of transportation available to the visitor includes the BTS Skytrain, the Metropolitan Rapid Transit, the public buses, the airport rail link and taxis.

Language

Although the official language of Thailand is Thai, English is widely spoken in Bangkok and appears in signage throughout the city.

Time

Thailand Standard time is GMT +7; daylight savings time is not observed.

Money

The currency used in Thailand is the Thai Baht (THB). Major credit cards are accepted in all of Thailand's large hotels and commercial areas. ATMs are easily accessible in major commercial areas. Tipping is not a common practice as many hotels and restaurants include a small service charge.

Weather

It is hot and humid across most of Thailand the whole year round. Temperature in Bangkok hovers above 30°C throughout the year with overnight lows rarely dropping below 20°C.

1. Grand Palace & Emerald Buddha

Former residence of the King Rama I to King Rama V of the Rattanakosin Kingdom, the Grand Palace is now used for hosting royal ceremonies and welcoming the king's guests, State guests, and other foreign dignitaries. It is also a place where remains of kings and high-ranked members of the royal family were situated before cremation. This is one of the most sacred temple in Thailand, and in there sits the Emerald Buddha made out of semi-precious green stones (jade), clothed in gold and about 66 inches tall.



2. Damnoen Saduak Floating Market & Samphran Elephant Ground and Crocodile Farm

The world-famous Damnoen Saduak Floating Market located 100km southwest from the bustling city, Bangkok. The market is filled with tradition and culture of Thailand that you will not be able to experience elsewhere. You will be able to cruise past floating shops that sell handicrafts, fruits and vegetables as well as various Thailand souvenirs. In comparison to the bustling city of Bangkok, the Damnoen Saduak Floating Market allows you to relive and experience the slow and relaxing environment.



3. Ayutthaya World Heritage Tour

From 1351 till 1767, the Ayutthaya was known to be one of the largest and most prosperous kingdom before it was looted and invade by the Burmese in 1767. The ruins of the Ayutthaya were so impressive that it made an impression on the wealth of the kingdom. During this period, Ayutthaya was the most populous city with more than 1 million of population.
