Monday will be a big day as we all await the final call on the end to level four restrictions. Yesterday the Prime Minster outlined the key points for coming out of a level 4 alert level. The key points related to school are:-

Level Three Announcement

In level **Three** school will be open for students in year 1-10.

Attendance will be voluntary with the recommendation you should continue to home school if you can.

Amuri will provide BOTH on site and distance options during level Three. No judgement will be made the decision is yours to make!

Students in year 11-13 will continue to receive remote delivery during level Three. WHEN /IF we will move to level three will be announced on Monday.

Early next week I will be asking each family in year 1-10 to indicate which option, home or school you will take during level three. This will allow us to plan accordingly. We will be asking you to make a decision one way or another as we cannot manage wild fluctuations in class numbers AND deliver remote learning at the same time. Take some time over the weekend to consider what is best for your family and circumstances and I will be in touch!

Penny Mossman Year 9-13

This week has seen a return to school using remote learning which may not be ideal but is the new normal for many of our students for the foreseeable future.

The changes for Level 3 mean that all our Year 11-13 students will continue to learn online and aside from the subjects with specific practical requirements the course work being covered will remain the same. It is important to understand that there will be some tweaking of courses to incorporate replacement standards that are suitable for remote learning and assessment. These changes will be advised by teachers and are not optional - we are operating in very different conditions for the foreseeable future and our aim is to provide courses that enable students to achieve their NCEA Levels. This is most important at Level 2 & 3.

It has been great to hear from staff how their 9-13 classes are progressing and the numbers of students who are attending zoom meetings and working on the programmes and platforms being used by teachers. I am getting feedback on some great Social Studies work from Year 9 - well done. It is disappointing that some students have yet to engage — this is something we will monitor but if access or other issues are behind this please let James, Liz or myself know. We do appreciate that the return to school will place additional stress on some families so we will do all we can to help.

The alert level change to level 3, when it is implemented, will mean that the children in Years 1-10 of essential workers may return to school, but again we fully understand many parents will want to keep their students at home. This means that for Year 9 & 10 getting into an online routine is really important and feedback from staff again is that many of our students are doing this well.

The next couple of weeks will have challenges for both students, families, and teachers as we get more adept at teaching and learning in the online space and getting used to virtual communication. We are all in this together so be kind to yourself and patient with one another – together we will get there....wherever that finally is!

Getting back to School!

You may seen over the last weekend the tentative proposal to reopen school for some or all students on the 29th April. It does seem this will be confirmed one way or another on April the 20th.

From speaking to many of you I know there are some real worries and concerns out there around returning your child to school and opinions range dramatically from household to household. The details around what this return may look like should (all being well) be available by the end of next week and I wanted to give you a chance to ask any questions in an open forum as your concerns are probably shared by many others. I cannot promise to know all the answers but at the least I can compile a list to follow up with the Ministry of Education on your behalf.

To this end on Friday 24th April I will be running FACEBOOK Live Sessions on this page at 12 noon and again at 6pm to outline what the plan is for the immediate future and answer any questions you may have online. You will be able to type in your questions for all to see and I will do my best to answer them for you.

We may see delivery of some Ministry provided loan devices this week to identified students to supplement the ones we have already provided. Please note that these are on loan and the expectation is these will be returned to school on the day we return in the majority of cases. We still have some left to help with this if you are struggling with device access at home so please ask if needed. I do not know the expected arrival or provision for Ministry provided home learning packs at this time.

Home Learning | Papa Kāinga TV will be shown, free to air, on TVNZ channel 2+1 and on TVNZ on Demand, as well as on Sky Channel 502. It will run from 9am to 3pm on schooldays with programming for children and young people aged 2 to 15, as well as for parents.

Māori Television will also be broadcasting te reo educational programmes (for ages 2 to 18) from 9am to 3pm on schooldays.
