Test and Tag: getting the best out of vour contractor

Metrotest: Test & Tag Training

Most schools are put off electrical testing by the costs involved in having a registered electrician inspect and test their portable electrical equipment. However, the person doing the testing does not need to hold electrical registration, but does need to be 'competent'. This workshop is an introduction to the training requirements:

- introduction to AS/NZS 3760 (scope);
- · fundamentals of electrical safety;
- compliance versus safety
- how Test & Tag applies to your school
- · who can test?
- DIY option (with training & support), or an outside contractor?
- · choosing a Test & Tag provider;
- Test & Tag fraud in schools:
- Records (not all records are created equal);
- · Ttypes of testing Instruments and demonstration:
- testing instrument information (back-up, support, calibration, repairs);
- · tags, label requirements and colours.
