An invitation to join with Bishop Steven in prayer for our Diocese today Thursday 24 January 2019.

A warm open invitation is extended to anyone who would like to join Bishop Steven today, Thursday 24 January from 3.30pm to 5pm in a time of prayer at St John's Roslyn, 373 Highgate, Dunedin.

This will be an unstructured time of prayer and you are welcome to come and go as needed.



Prayers for the Diocese... At all times, pray by the power of the Spirit. Pray all kinds of prayers. Be watchful, so that you can pray. Always keep on praying for all the Lord's people. (Ephesians 6. 18)

You may have read in the Diocesan Newsletter that once a month I go to different churches and spend up to 2 hours praying for the Diocese. Some of you have joined me for some of the time, and one or two have asked me what it is all about...

I believe in the reality and power of prayer. I am not especially drawn to uniformity of practice, and indeed a variety of styles can often be wonderfully refreshing, and my goal is that we *pray as we can*, not to worry about what we cannot do. For these monthly times of Prayer for the Diocese it has developed into a generally unstructured time of prayer. Usually we are silent, and for myself I try to start with about 15 minutes of being quiet and open before God – not bringing specific requests or concerns, but waiting on Him.

My own practice is then to use a notebook (I prefer an electronic version) and I name every Parish, Ministry Unit, Chaplaincy and Anglican "presence" before God: the leaders, personnel, the situation as I know it, items for thanksgiving as well as problems for solving. I try to balance offering a list with giving time for God to inform my prayers.

I will pray for the non-church part of the Diocese, with specific intentions though it is much more general in nature.

I pray for our country – for our leaders and for prosperity.

And (unashamedly) I pray for a Christian revival. I rejoice and celebrate in the almost innate spirituality that is in many of the people and much of the geography of New Zealand, but we are Christian – followers of Jesus Christ, and I believe he has something for all people that can't be found apart from him.

I hope to continue to follow this habit, and am open to different ways of prayer – please do let me know what would be helpful for you. And please feel welcome to join: there is no requirement to stay all the time, or for a minimum – come and go as you are able. If you don't feel able to pray – come enjoy a time of quiet, and if you are not able to attend – set aside a few moments wherever you are and remember before God our Diocese and all who live and worship here.

The next date for Prayers for the Diocese is Thursday 24 January 3.30pm to 5pm at St John's Roslyn, 373 Highgate, Dunedin.

A service of Holy Communion is held in the Chapel at Dunedin Hospital at 10.30am on most Sundays. Voluntary Chapel Hostesses, Musicians and Bed-pushers contribute wonderfully to these services.

Warm your spirit, feed your soul, deepen your insight. Be gifted with peace, beauty and love to mind your life and the lives of others.

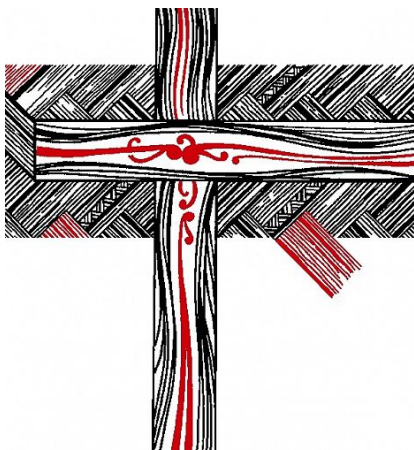

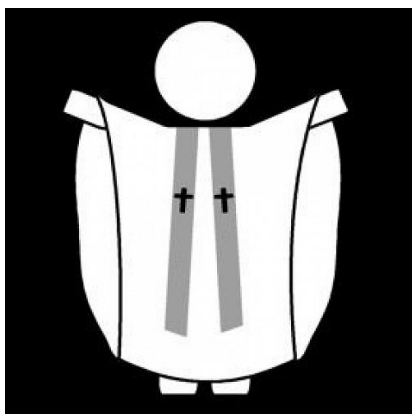

A four-week long Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) Introduction for Southland and Otago will be offered the 1st to 24th of March 2019.

The CPE Introduction will develop pastoral competence and identity through learning of self-awareness in reflection on care for others. Details are described in the flyer and course application form that are attached. Feel free to share this email (and attachments) with others and to post the flyer in your context of service.

Person-to-person work in one's own context of service is the "clinical placement" component of the CPE Introduction course. Approximately 15 hours a week of what one is already doing in service to others will count towards these hours. If more hours are needed, serving as a volunteer chaplain (counselor or spiritual care provider) in a parish, rest home, hospital, correctional institution, or educational context made be added.

After the CPE Introduction in March 2019 only those who want and need to complete a full unit of CPE will opt to complete the "Sequel: Part II of the unit of CPE" (the remaining seven weeks or 200 hours required for a full unit of CPE) which will be offered in early to mid 2020. If you choose to complete only the CPE Introduction in March 2019 that is perfectly acceptable. You will still have significant learning and experience reflection and feedback on your practice of pastoral care. However, the full unit of CPE unit credit can only be awarded when both the CPE Introduction and its "Sequel" are completed.

The March 2019 CPE Introduction course will meet on Friday afternoon and evening (or alternatively on Friday evening plus Saturday mornings.) I can adapt to the option that fits the scheduling needs of folks in the group.

The course will be located as near as possible to participants. Invercargill, Gore, Balclutha, and Dunedin are possible venues. Indicate your location in your email response. Some may need to carpool.

The cost for the 4-week course will be \$500.00 per participant. In the past participants have been able to obtain help with funding from the institutions that they serve.

The CPE Introduction is offered under the auspices of the New Zealand Association of Clinical Pastoral Education (NZACPE.) CPE is accredited by NZQA through Laidlaw College. The facilitator is Mary R. Huie-Jolly, ACPE Certified Educator, NZACPE Supervisor, PhD Otago University, MDiv Columbia Theological Seminary. The co-facilitator is Judith Stewart, Spiritual Care provider for Hospice Southland

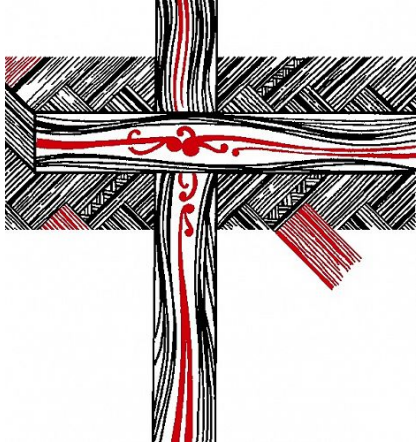

All it costs is your time...

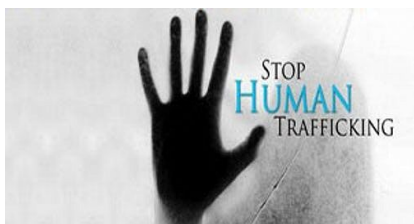
You can take the course for credit towards the New Zealand Diploma in Christian Studies or you can take the course for interest only, by attending the online classes and doing the readings.

The Semester 1 course will be **The New Testament**, taught on Wednesday evenings from March 13 to June 12 2019. This will be available completely online from home (or you will be able to view the recordings of the evenings if you can't make the live online class). A group learning option will also be offered in Dunedin and Invercargill and others may wish to meet together, if feasible.

Prayer and Reflection Evening for Victims of Trafficking

An invitation to join with other Christians in Dunedin to hear more about human trafficking on Tuesday 12th February 2019 @ St Patrick's Church, Macandrew Road from 7 pm.

February 8 is the Feast of St Bakhita, a Sudanese child who was kidnapped, sold several times, tortured and ill-treated and finally protected by the Canossian Sisters in Italy and freed. She became a sister herself and lived in Italy, dying in 1947. She was canonised in 2000 and is the patron of all those who are enslaved or trafficked.

The third largest trading operation in the world – after the drug trade and the arms trade - is the trafficking of human beings. In every country in the world, including New Zealand, women, men and children are sold into modern-day slavery or forced to work in inhuman conditions. Human beings are kidnapped, sold, fraudulently recruited into underpaid work and trafficked in countless ways. The practice is widespread and lucrative. Pope Francis has urged all people of good will to act in various ways to stop this illegal trade and to show compassion to its victims. In this country ANZRATH (Aotearoa New Zealand Religious Against Trafficking of Humans) has been initiated as part of a global network to draw attention to the issue in our own country, to educate ourselves and others and to support the victims of this cruel practice.

This year there is a wider invitation to all Catholics and those from other Christian churches who are interested, to join in attending this prayer and reflection evening. Feel very welcome to bring others who may wish to come. We would love to have you among us, to feel happy to participate in the prayer and discussion, to understand more about the ugly practice of trafficking and to find ways to act against it.

There will be a light supper to close the evening.



The Church of the Ascension Cadenabbia Lake Como Italy

The Church of the Ascension is one of the few English speaking churches in Italy in the Anglican Diocese of Europe. It is open daily and has a regular Sunday Morning Service in English at 10.30am.

The Church is also available for Weddings, Renewal of Wedding Vows, Baptisms, Retreats and all the normal services of the Church.

The Church was built by residence and holiday makers back in the 1890's, it is one of the important land marks of Cadenabbia and should you be walking the Greenways Walk it is mentioned as a place to visit. 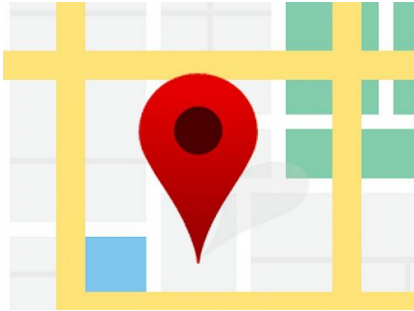
