## **Head of Junior School**

Ako time is important for a number of reasons. First and foremost, it allows students to develop positive relationships with a teacher in the school, who can support them outside of the classroom. This is an important relationship for students and



families to have, and the Ako teacher is your first point of contact in our

This relationship also allows the Ako teacher to support your student with matters like attendance, and making sure they hear all of the school notices that are relevant to them.

This is how the Monday and Friday 15 minute slots are used - to check attendance and share notices. This time also allows our House Leaders to run House Assemblies and encourage students to sign up for House events.

#### Ako Curriculum

The Period 2 slot, weekly on Mondays, is where the Ako-time curriculum is delivered.

The focus of this time is on two main things:

Hoodies are not allowed as part of our uniform. Students can wear a plain



**German Rapper/Lecturer Visit** In late March College was fortunate to have AnJay, a German Rapper/ Lecturer, visit from Berlin.

Teacher of German Tom Kitchen tells us that this was organised by The Goethe-Institut and Tui Tuia.

The Goethe-Institut is a non-profit German cultural association operational worldwide with 159 institutes, promoting the study of the German language

Around 246,000 people take part in these German courses per year. Tui Tuia | Learning Circle provides Professional Learning and Development services and programmes. Working alongside leaders, teachers, and school communities, they have a focus on improving outcomes for learners in collaboration with educators, whānau, communities and ākonga.

Tom said that AnJay took workshops with Year 9, 10 and 11 German classes, on how to write rap, saying he first performed some of his songs, with one just happening to be a world premiere (!), and then taught students how to write their own raps.



Firstly, this involves establishing a flow by creating a beat with numbers of

Student Successes

Again, we acknowledge further events, successes and experiences gained, which have happened over past times, and have yet to be acknowledged. In this newsletter we look at a culmination of two, traditionally, summer sports. 2022-2023 Water Ski Season Successes and

**New Zealand Water Ski Team Selection** For Ashburton College students Harriet Hill (Year 11) and Cameron Hill (Year 9) this Water Ski season was a very successful one.

Both skiers trained hard, with the three disciplines being trained for being

Slalom, Trick and Jump. During the months of November-March, training is for upwards of 15 hours a week, which is a sizeable commitment out of school hours and, as can be read below, is not without risk. The calendar season is extensive and extends across the country from mid-October through until April in Canterbury and early May in Northland-Auckland. The successes achieved by Harriet and Cameron are notable:

**Cameron Hill** For thirteen-year-old Cameron, having experienced broken bones (particularly ankles) in training over the last few years, this was his first full competitive season. With his bones fully healed he has found a love for the

Jump discipline, similar to his sister Harriet. Cameron competed in many tournaments over this season and increased his scores in Slalom to 2 at 55km, Trick to 1250 points and Jump to 22.6m.

**New Zealand Junior Masters Tournament** Cameron's highlight of the year was skiing at The New Zealand Junior

Masters Tournament in early February, held at Lake Crichton. This tournament brought together forty two of the best Under 21 year

olds from across the North and South Island to take part in the four-day competition, and camping onsite. Cameron was happy with his placing, coming away with Personal Bests in all three disciplines, and gaining a 6th placing in Slalom, 7th in Trick and 4th

in Jump. Bearing in mind that these skiers were Under 21 year olds, these results are impressive from a thirteen year old. Canterbury Regionals Placings – Overall 2nd Placed At this event, which includes skiers from around the South Island, he gained 2nd place in both Slalom and Jump and a third in tricks.

This led to him placing second overall in the Under 14 boys' section. The event was held at Lake Hood, from 31 March-02 April.

This has certainly been a very successful season for both skiers.
