RECTOR'S MESSAGE



The seasons are shifting as the shadows get longer, and we finish Term 1 with productive starts across the curriculum, and winter's activities now beckoning the boys.

We farewell **Louis Russell** as he heads back to the UK. Louis joined us for Term 1 to help in the hostel and Outdoor Education, while here on his 'gap' year, after finishing at Winchester College in Hampshire. Since arriving, Louis has done a superb job in support of the boys and staff, and he will be missed. Also from our Winchester connection, **Shaun Rooney** departs soon for his season playing cricket for Winchester as 2017 recipient of the Mark Parker Memorial Scholarship. No doubt Shaun will find his time in this prestigious public school and its community enriching, and be looking to score some good innings, batting his way around the South East of England.

Since our previous Newsletter, boys competing in Swimming and Rowing have excelled at the national level. In Swimming, Riley Taylor and Jack Sands were impressive in Wellington. Riley swam in a challenging nine events to make six finals. He won three silver medals: one in the 1500m freestyle, where he also took 44 seconds off his personal best, one in the 400m freestyle, and one in the 200m freestyle; a magnificent effort all - round. Riley's times for two of his events were fast enough to earn New Zealand Swimming Development Squad selection. Jack also produced high quality performances. He swam in eight events and made four finals, with a silver medal in the 400m individual medley being his most pleasing result. At the Maadi Cup on Lake Karapiro, our Rowers achieved their best season since 2014 with two Bronze medal finishes. Following a dedicated and determined season of preparation and competition, it was wonderful for the staff, coaches, parents, and team, to all enjoy the bronze won by Liam Parker and Harry Bampton in the Under 18 Novice Double, and bronze won by James Davidson and Jack Clayton in the Under 16 Double Sculls. In a fiercely challenging week, these performances, like those of our swimmers, put our boys in the company of New Zealand's finest. Our school community is immensely proud of them all, and the other boys who did their best alongside them on or in the water.

As is our custom, this term has finished with an Anzac focus. At Assembly on 12 April we were treated to a special gifting from Ruth May and Sarah Entwistle, the daughters of recently deceased **Stewart Entwistle**. Ruth and Sarah presented a copy of Stewart's moving book: 'We Will Remember Them': Rolls of Honour. Stewart was a respected contributor to our archives over the last decade as a talented historian, and loyal Old Boy. In this Assembly, Year 12 **Connor Rabbidge**, also shared a captivating account from his research into the life of **Benjamin Hinds Howell**, who attended the school from 1912 – 15. Howell survived the carnage of Passchendaele in 1917 – New Zealand's worst military experience in The Great War. Howell's story is a remarkable one; especially his survival after mistaken entry into German trenches during the struggle. It was all the more special to have Benjamin's son, George, present at the Assembly to represent his father and family. The Howell's trace their TBHS origin back to 1887 when Benjamin's father, William, was a founding Board member 1887 – 1912; known affectionately as 'father of the school'. And we were fortunate to have **Noel Davies** as guest speaker at our traditional Anzac Service the next day. Noel spoke with the perspective of an ex-serviceman, and as one who recalled the strength of feeling generated by the Service, as experienced by him and his friends, while attending long ago.

On a final note, thank you to all the PTA parents, Old Boys' Association members, staff and boys, who made our Open Day on 19 March such a successful showcasing of the school's character and curriculum.

A busy term has passed and we continue to encourage the boys to give of their best to all learning and achievement, and to come back for Term 2 ready to take the initiative for further progress, with our support.

POWER Tools Day

POWER tools was introduced in 2016 in response to a need identified by staff and senior students for 'life skills' to be taught to our students. The name and content reflect the Timaru Boys' High School PB4L programme values, and key knowledge and skills for our students' futures.

The boys completed five rotations during the day which covered the topics summarised below.

Money 101: Bank accounts, credit cards and hire purchase Insurance 101: Different types, why insure, jargon busters

Tyres 101: Changing a tyre

Money 102: Mortgages and investments


Man dress 101: How to iron a shirt and wardrobe essentials


The boys were requested to dress in interview-appropriate clothing and a significant number did this very well, generating some robust debate within 'Man dress 101'. If your son was involved in the POWER tools day, we encourage you to engage him in discussion about insurance, superannuation and mortgages from your perspective.

The boys have also been encouraged to change a tyre on a vehicle they may use now or in the future to develop confidence in this skill. We were also fortunate to receive outside expertise with Shane Dowling from Mainland Insurance and Don McFarlane from Timaru Budget Advisory Trust kindly providing their time and knowledge. We utilised the existing knowledge and enthusiasm from several school staff as well.

A second POWER tools day will be held late in Term 2 and will include content on legal matters, job seeking, taxation, men's health and other areas in which the boys have expressed a strong need. SISS Athletics

The South Island Secondary Schools Athletics Championships were held in Dunedin in the first weekend of April. The weather was perfect over the three days, ideal for athletes to gain personal best performances. TBHS had 27 athletes who were selected from the Aoraki Athletic Sports but only 24 competed in the South Island Athletics, with the team consisting of a mixture of seniors and juniors. This year saw four TBHS 4 x 100m relay teams qualify but because of a lack of athletes, only the Under 15 and Senior teams were able to compete. We also entered a 4 x 400 senior team which consisted of representatives from all age groups. All relay teams made their respective finals and attained top five placings

Gaining eleven places – three x 1^{st} , five x 2^{nd} and 3 x 3^{rd} placings, our combined results were the best we have had in a very long time and saw TBHS close with a ranking of 18^{th} in the South Island. The standout Athletes were:

Most of the athletes achieved personal bests with many achieving top eight placings or finals including: George Copland 400m, Shannon Drake Shot Put, Ethan Griffin 200m, Darryl Hamilton Javelin, Liam Johnson Hammer and Discus, Xavier Judd Long Jump and Triple Jump, Maka Mafilo Shot Put, Michael Munro 3000m, Jack Powell 400m,

Peter Rawlins Open Steeple Chase, William Rawlins 100m, 200m, 400, Shaun Reith Hurdles, Aleks Rempala Discus and Shot Put, Sam Richie 3000m and Hamish Yeatman 800m. These results are very pleasing, leaving us looking forward to the possibility of the South Island competition being held in Timaru in 2018.

Some athletes of the South Island team of 2017 have shown they have the ability and the potential to be very competitive at the Nationals at the end of the year.



Mobile Electronic Device (MED) Use

These procedures will be in effect from Term 2 onwards with a two week introduction period:

If students bring a MED to school, it is to be kept out of sight, switched off, and not used during class or form time.



MEDs are permitted

- In class at the discretion of the teacher for learning purposes.
- During break time or lunchtime.

If a student has a MED out in class when not permitted

- They will be warned that it will be confiscated if it is not put away immediately.
- If it is not put away immediately or there is a repetition, the student will be issued with a "Yellow Card" and the MED will be confiscated to be returned at the end of school.
- The MED will be returned at the end of the day by the teacher from the office.

Responsibility for MEDs

- If students bring MEDs to school they do so at their own risk.

Note

MEDs can include mobile phones, iPod, iPad, laptops, tablets etc.

ANTS Programme (Advanced and Naturally Talented Students)

Thursday 30 March provided an informative, exciting and extremely fun experience for the ANTS team, packed with great activities. The afternoon started very positively with a shared lunch provided by the school followed by presentations from Hayden McNulty, Tim Curry and Kit Sadler. These Year 13 students spent a week of their summer holidays at their chosen universities, taking part in the *Hands on Programme*. This programme is aimed at allowing students to experience what it is like to study at university.



Following this, we were challenged not only physically, but our engineering skills were also put to the test. The task was to build a catapult using only Popsicle sticks and rubber bands which would fire a single marshmallow as far as possible. Combining Junior and Senior minds was a winning combination as we had different input from both age groups.

Then there was a competitive orienteering game which involved Juniors and Seniors working together to answer a variety of questions, while running around madly, trying to complete the challenge in the shortest possible time. The questions ranged from school history to the colour of local street signs. After much blood, sweat and tears, (but mainly sweat!) we jumped straight into the next task.

To finish the afternoon, students were given a short fictional story and had to identify and solve problems based around the plot. Again, teamwork was key to completing this challenge.

The POWER values were put to very good use in all challenges. All in all, this was a very successful afternoon which involved a lot of laughter, collaboration and bonding between Junior and Senior students. A big thank you to all staff involved in organising this great event!

Literacy Corner





2017 Maadi Cup

Timaru Boys' rowers exceeded all expectations at the recent Maadi Cup competition, bagging two bronze medals and securing a number of A finals and top ten finishes.

Our squad of 21 travelled to Lake Karapiro near Cambridge for the competition which brought together over 2000 rowers, representing 126 secondary schools from around the country.

The week began with a parade through the streets of Cambridge before crews hit the water for six days of intense competition in sometimes difficult weather conditions.

The first two days were for heats and repercharges where the boats battled it out for quarter-final, semi-final and final positions. Our crews made 4 A finals and 6 B finals with many unlucky to miss

out after close and exciting racing.

Friday was the first day of finals and TBHS broke its 3 year Maadi drought with a bronze medal to Liam Parker and Harry Bampton in the Under 18 Novice Double. On Saturday Jack Clayton and James Davidson also made the podium for a bronze in the Under 16 Double. Lightweight crews were unlucky not to feature in the medals after fourth place finishes in the quad and double events.

2017 Age Group National Swimming Championship



Last week TBHS had four boys attending this event in Wellington. It is extremely difficult to qualify for this so the four qualifiers, Riley Taylor, Campbell Lindblom, Jack Sands and Matthew Moore, are to be congratulated firstly for making the cut.

Riley Taylor had an amazing meet. He swam in nine events and made six finals. He gained three silver medals: one in the 1500m freestyle where he took an amazing **44 seconds** off his personal best time, one in the 400m freestyle and one in the 200m freestyle. He also finished in sixth place in the 400m individual medley. Riley's times for two of his events were fast enough to gain entry into the New Zealand Swimming Development Squad – a wonderful effort.

Jack Sands also produced some high quality performances, swimming in eight events and gaining places in four finals. He gained a silver medal in the 400m individual medley followed by a fourth in the 1500m freestyle, eighth in the 100m backstroke and tenth in the 400m freestyle.

Matthew Moore swam in five events and made three finals. He gained a fifth in the 400m individual medley, an eighth in the 200m medley and a ninth in the 200m butterfly While Campbell Lindblom swam in the 400m freestyle.

Conferencing

Whole school conferencing will take place on Friday 5 May. On that day all students will meet with their conferencing teacher, who is their form teacher, for 15 minutes with their parents or caregivers. Students only need to come in for their conferencing time. Times will be sent out. Boys are required to wear uniform.

Senior Examinations

- These take place in Term Two Week Three Wednesday 17 May Friday 19 May.
- All students with examination based subjects will have examinations on these days. If students do not have an examination in a slot, they do not need to be at school. Students will be able to study at school.
- There will be three exam sessions per day: 9am-11am, 11.30-1.30pm, 2pm-4pm. Students will be told how long their examination will last by their teacher.
- 11BN will remain at school on those days.

A reminder that senior students, Year 12 and 13 (Year 11 may bring a moped or similar), must have completed a vehicle permission form before they bring a vehicle to school.
