Head of Junior School Message

What is the most important thing we do? I often ask my junior students 'What is the most important thing we do at AshColl?' The answer is,

of course, learning. It is easy to imagine learning happening in classrooms to build knowledge and skills in a myriad of subject areas. However, significant learning happens outside of structured class time, particularly when things go wrong.



Working with Teenagers

Working with teenagers is, on a daily basis, both challenging and rewarding. Most of us will look back on our teenage years and reflect on some of the most highly emotionally charged times of our lives - the best and the worst memories.

This is because the teenage brain is undergoing major development at this life stage, particularly in the prefrontal cortex, the decision-making part of the brain, responsible for the ability to plan and think about consequences, to solve problems and control impulses. While the prefrontal cortex is developing, teenagers often make decisions and solve problems using a part of their brain called the amygdala - the emotional brain associated with impulses, aggression, and instinctive behaviour. The prefrontal cortex is busy building up and making connections in the background during teenage years, but it does not come fully 'online' for most people until their mid-twenties.

Learning from Mistakes

When a young person makes a mistake in a Mathematics problem, we accept the error as an opportunity for learning. We appreciate that learning takes time, it requires repetition and practice, it may require additional or modified teaching.

But what if a young person makes a behavioural mistake directed by their emotional, impulsive amygdala on overdrive?

John Herner, a respected American educator, said

If a child doesn't know how to read, we teach. If a child doesn't know how to swim, we teach. If a child doesn't know how to multiply, we teach. If a child doesn't know how to behave, we...punish.

Learning from mistakes should be no different for behavioural errors than it is for academic errors. Behavioural errors present excellent opportunities for teaching and learning at the very time the teenage brain is being wired to solve problems and develop empathy. This is why Restorative Practice is at the heart of what we do at AshColl.

Restorative Practice

Restorative Practice is about restoring relationships, social growth and meaningful consequences which involve the wrongdoer in repairing the harm. The focus is centred on the victim and their needs, is healing, and makes the wrongdoer accountable for their actions.

Restorative Practice models adult conversations that are respectful, calm, and honest. They empower the victim, build empathy, and de-escalate

A restorative meeting has four main parts: 1. Tell the story – what happened?

- 2. Explore the harm who has been affected and how have they been
- 3. Repair the harm what needs to be done to put things right?
- 4. Move forward how can we make sure this does not happen again?

Putting things right is a priority and forms the basis for meaningful consequences of the behaviour, rather than a random punishment dished out to 'cancel the crime'. Restorative Practice is no 'slap over the wrist with a wet bus ticket'. It works

alongside interventions at the highest level of behaviour management such as stand-downs and suspensions.

However, unlike a punitive approach which focuses on the punishment, Restorative Practice allows our young people to return to their learning with relationships restored and their mana intact.

Restorative Practice 'works to strengthen connections between people within a community'.

This approach is highly confrontational to wrongdoing but, at the same time; fair, honest, and highly supportive of all people involved. This approach is based in the art of listening and the search for shared understanding of how people are affected by the actions of others' (Bill Hansberry, 2004). Restorative Practice is the way we do things at AshColl because our

young people are worth investing in. Rurea, taitea, kia toitu, ko taikaka anake.
