Message From The Principal

Beginning for Rebuild

Last week was away to a great start with the beginning of our new build.

This was signalled with a cultural blessing and a ceremonial earth-turning. The latter was carried out by Lilly Allen and Logan Bradford, who have the distinction of being the very youngest students at Ashburton College. Their involvement was a simple way of signalling that schools always have students at their core.



My thanks are given to everyone who joined us for the morning. The main contractor has now been confirmed as Hawkins Construction. To be considered for these large school builds a firm needs to have a proven track record in their construction, and be on the Ministry of Education's preferred contractor's list.

The first block is due for completion later next year, with the thirty-two classrooms to be in use in 2024.

Winter Sports Tournament Week

Last week saw the annual Winter Sports Tournament Week take place. College had teams involved in Rugby, Netball, Hockey, Basketball, Football and Equestrian. These teams were competing all over the mainland from Invercargill to Nelson. It's a great experience for our young athletes. College Derived Grade Exams

Next week sees the round of school exams which are known as 'derived grade' exams. These exams give an indication of students' progress towards the external exams but are also important, as the results from these exams are the grades allocated to students who are unable to sit the NCEA external exams in November. Most years we have a number of students who are unable to sit exams for a valid reason, such as illness, a bereavement in the family, or an accident; (note: sleeping through the alarm isn't a valid excuse!). For example, last year, a student was hit and injured from an electric scooter accident, while walking to school to sit their exam. I am also very confident that all the students who needed derived grades in November were no doubt thinking 'they would be fine' at the time of the College Derived Grade exams.

Our senior school reports were sent to families on Friday 26 August. These report on progress towards end-of-year results. The vast majority of our seniors should be fine but, clearly, some are going to have to put in a 'finishing burst' as the end of year approaches.
