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Chair and CE Report 2020

Tēnā koutou, tēnā koutou, tēnā koutou katoa **Greetings, greetings, greetings to you all.**

We are pleased to present the annual report of the Otago Community Trust for the year ended 31 March 2020. It has been a great privilege for Trustees and staff to meet a wide range of groups and individuals and visit some of their projects and initiatives this year.

In recent years Otago Community Trust has been asked by members of the community to consider transferring the Milford Sound area which lies within the Southland District Council boundary to the region covered by Community Trust South, our sister Community Trust. During the year, the Trust alongside Community Trust South, undertook considerable community consultation to explore a boundary change and we were pleased to have received from the Governor General approval for this change recently.

No one could have predicted that our year would have ended in such dramatic circumstances. COVID-19 has had a huge impact on almost every area of our lives and continues to significantly impact our communities. However, through this we have seen just how incredibly strong, dedicated and compassionate the people of Otago are.

Our Grants for 2019 – 2020

We are pleased to report that trustees last year approved grants totalling just over \$11.5m and our small dedicated grants team processed over 650 individual grant applications.

As well as many one off large and small community grants, and recurring grants to regional sport bodies and social service agencies, the Trust made several significant grants to community organisations across the region.

A further \$801,992 was approved for three Learning Impact Fund initiatives, a \$500,000 grant was awarded to the Clutha Gold Trail Charitable Trust to support the extension of the trail from Lawrence to Waiholā. Order of St John South Island Region received a \$475,000 grant to support the new multimillion dollar hub ambulance hub in Cromwell. Tennis Otago received a \$365,000 grant that will assist in the re-development of the Logan Park Tennis Centre and we are pleased to have granted over \$100,000 to strengthen capability across our Arts and Social Service sectors.

Looking Ahead

From an investment perspective it has been a challenging year for Otago Community Trust's

investment portfolio, and whilst our reserves remain robust, the Trust reported a negative return for the year of -1.2%. As at 31st March 2020, Trust funds sat at \$270.7m down from \$287.8m in 2019. Whilst international markets have subsequently bounced back the Trust is conscious of the need to safeguard the assets of the Trust during this period of market volatility. The grants budget for the 2020-21 year therefore has been provisionally set at a slight decrease on recent years at \$9m, which includes an allowance to our COVID-19 Response Fund of \$2m.

Moving forward our focus on assessing and monitoring the impact of our funding will continue. The ongoing ripple effects of COVID-19 means that in the coming months the trustees will review our long-term strategic priority areas to ensure that we are able to proactively support our communities during these challenging times.

Farewells

This year we will farewell Ross McRobie, and we take this opportunity to thank Ross for the tremendous work he has done during his tenure both as a trustee and more recently as Chair. Ross has been a dedicated member of the Trust from day one. Staff and trustees value Ross's passion for the community and the time and energy he devoted to the Trust. We also acknowledge the services of Kate Hazlett who is due to retire from the Trust. Kate has been a strong advocate for our smaller rural communities and her contribution has always been greatly appreciated.

Lastly, as we move forward in uncertain times, our commitment to you is that we will continue to responsibly manage and wisely share Trust resources to ensure that Otago communities are strong, healthy, and vibrant. On behalf of the staff and trustees, we would like to thank everyone who works so hard to ensure sustained, positive impact for Otago. We look forward to working together with our communities and rising to the challenges ahead.

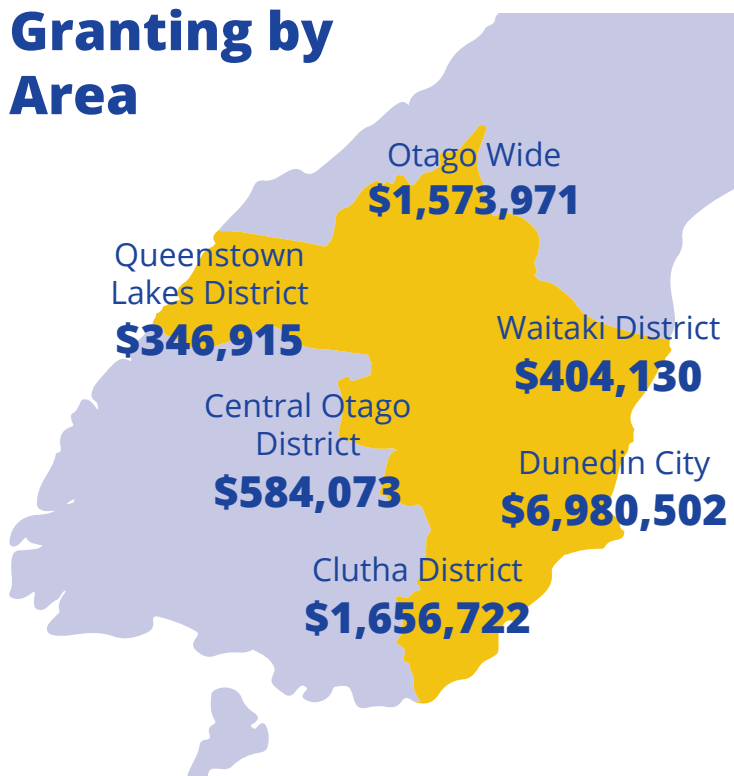

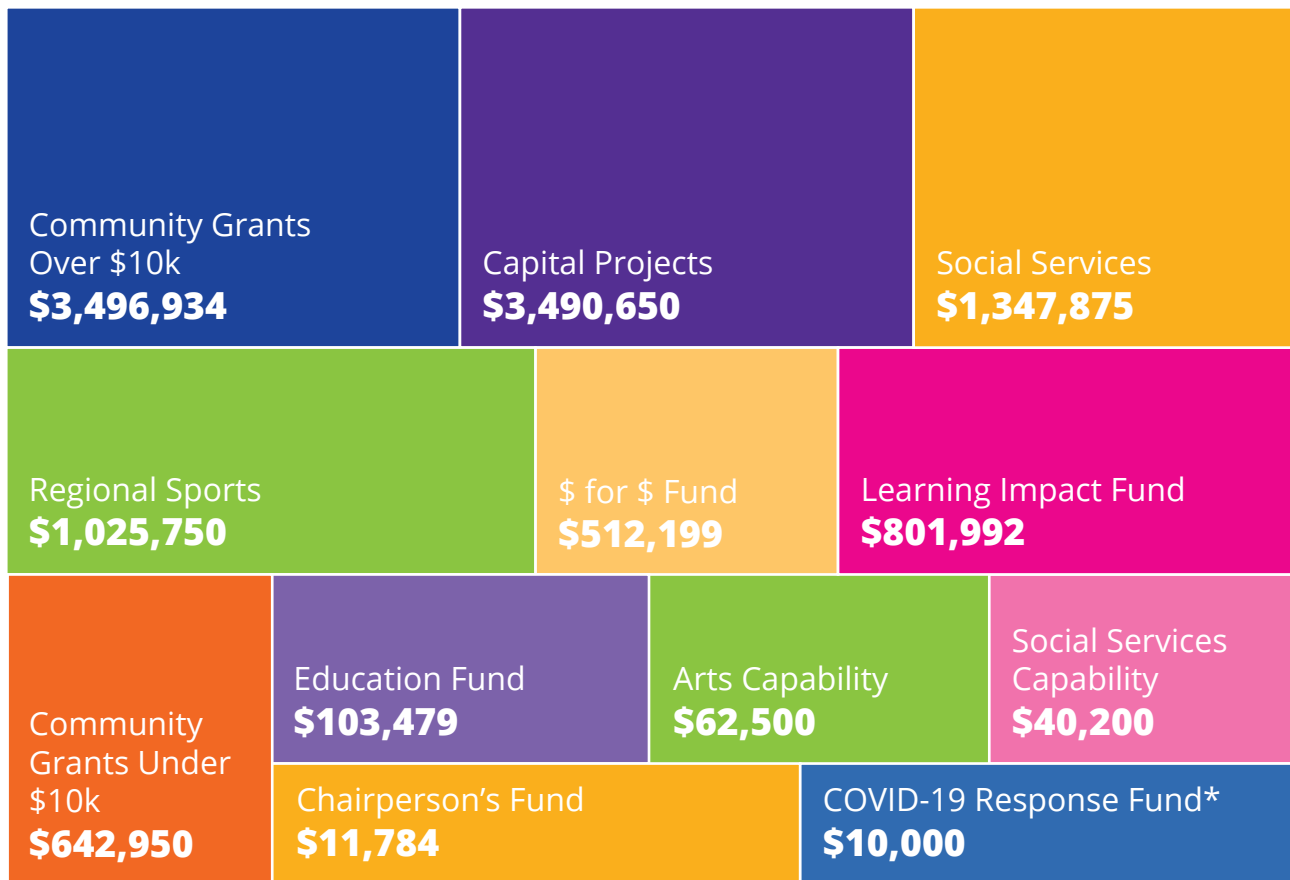

as at 31 March 2020



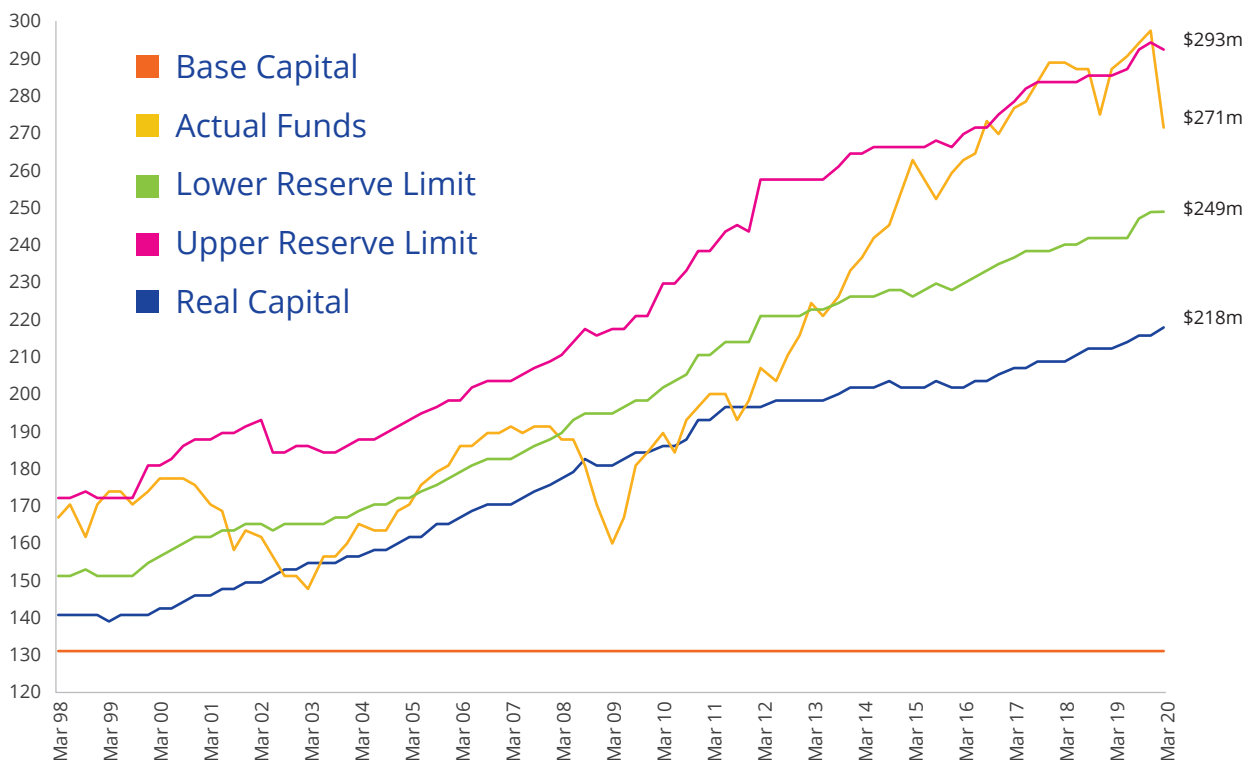

Celebrating Community Diversity

Otago Community Trust was pleased to be one of the many funders to support the Central Otago District Arts Trust, alongside the Teviot Valley Community Development Group to complete an intercultural public art piece in Roxburgh - which speaks of the Valley's heritage and values.

Internationally renowned artist Flox took a series of workshops where attendees were encouraged to verbally and visually represent their cultures and what the Valley means to them, at the same time as learning the practicable skills of street art. Ideas gathered from these workshops, along with the those researched by Flox and Trustme, were used to inform the final design of the public art piece.

Bracing for learning impact

Otago Community Trust was pleased to award a \$59,187 Learning Impact Fund grant to support Weston School in North Otago with the advancement of its Makerspace Project for both classroom digital technology programmes and programmes to support gifted students in February of 2020.

The Learning Impact Fund was established by the Otago Community Trust to encourage new thinking and support educational projects which lift student achievement across Otago. While the three-year fund has closed, the Trust now will begin its journey working alongside schools to evaluate the success of this strategic fund.

As at 31 March 2020 a total of \$2,092,282 has been invested across nine separate Learning Impact Fund initiatives.

Native Habitat Restoration

Te Kākano Aotearoa Trust is a Wanaka community-based native plant nursery that specialises in propagating plants of local origin (Upper Clutha region) and uses these plants for localised native habitat restoration.

Having been overcrowded for several years the team at Te Kākano set out in early 2019 to increase the capacity of the nursery, as their seedlings, plants, volunteers, school visitors and education programmes all needed more space to flourish and develop.

The completed expansion project has now increased the capacity of the nursery by at least 50% allowing Te Kākano to engage with the community in more planting sessions, further contributing to habitat restoration and the diversity of the eco-system in the Upper Clutha basin.

Otago Community Trust supported this expansion project with a \$7,800 grant alongside a number of other funders. Te Kākano is involved in more than 20 restoration projects around the Upper Clutha, and has a strong and growing volunteer base, planting roughly 4,000 to 4,500 plants a year in the area.

Inclusive Sport Participation

ParaFed Otago is the leading sport and recreation organisation in the Otago region for those with a physical disability. Recognising its invaluable role in getting young people with a disability engaged in sport, Otago Community Trust contributes annually to ParaFed via our Regional Sports Development funding. This annual cornerstone funding has allowed ParaFed Otago to take some significant steps towards improving the sustainability of the activities they can offer to people with a physical disability.

In addition to Regional Sports funding in early 2020 Otago Community Trust was also pleased to award a smaller \$10,000 grant to assist ParaFed Otago with the cost of purchasing rugby wheelchairs. Despite a small delay in securing these new chairs due to the COVID-19 lockdown, ParaFed Otago athletes are looking forward to thoroughly testing out these new quality chairs which will ultimately enhance their on court experience and enable them to compete equally, in what is a very popular ParaFed activity.

Supporting our vulnerable young people

The Otago Youth Wellness Trust (OYWT) works with the Dunedin community to make a positive difference to young people. OYWT provide a holistic wraparound service for young people (aged 11-18), who need support for issues affecting their wellbeing. These can include health, education, welfare and justice. Pride is taken on delivering comprehensive, flexible, and responsive support to the specific needs of each individual young person.

Otago Community Trust is proud to have committed \$320,000 in multiyear funding to Otago Youth Wellness Trust to support their core wraparound services and care innovation. OYWT was also the first community organisation to receive a COVID-19 Response Fund grant in March 2020 allowing their team to continue to work remotely and support those in need during lockdown.

Notes to the summary consolidated financial statements

For the year ended 31 March 2020

These are the summary consolidated financial statements of Otago Community Trust (the "Trust") for the year ended 31 March 2020.

The specific disclosures included in these summary consolidated financial statements have been extracted from the full annual consolidated financial statements dated 23 June 2020. The full annual consolidated financial statements were approved for issue by the Trustees on 23 June 2020 and have been prepared in accordance with Tier 2 Public Benefit Entity (PBE) Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the New Zealand External Reporting Board (XRB). They comply with New Zealand Equivalents to International Public Sector Accounting Standards Reduced Disclosure Regime (NZ IPSAS with RDR) and other applicable Financial Reporting Standards as appropriate to Public Benefit Entities.

An unqualified audit opinion has been received on the full consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020. A copy of the full Trust consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020 may be obtained by contacting the Trust on 0800 10 12 40 or emailing info@oct.org.nz.

This summary financial report cannot be expected to provide as complete an understanding as provided by the full consolidated financial statements of the Trust.

This summary financial report has been examined by our auditor for consistency with the full consolidated financial statements. An unqualified audit opinion has been received. These summary consolidated financial statements were approved for issue by the Trustees on 23 June 2020.

Basis of preparation

Otago Community Trust is a public benefit entity and was incorporated as a Charitable Trust in accordance with the provisions of the Community Trusts Act 1999.

These are the summary consolidated financial statements of Otago Community Trust and its wholly owned subsidiary Fillmor House Limited and they comply with PBE FRS 43: Summary Financial Statements. The presentation currency is New Zealand dollars, rounded to the nearest thousand dollars.

The full consolidated financial statements upon which these Summary Financial Statements are based, have been prepared to comply with the Accounting Standards Framework for Public Benefit Entities and the Financial Reporting Act 2013.

Specific accounting policies

All specific accounting policies have been applied on the same basis as those used in the full consolidated financial statements of the Trust.

Notes to the summary consolidated financial statements continued...

Changes in accounting policies

The accounting policies have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these summary financial statements.

Income Tax

The Trust's 100% owned subsidiary Fillmor House Limited obtained charitable status on 31 March 2017, income derived from this date forward is exempt from income tax.

Events after the reporting period

The outbreak of COVID-19 and the subsequent quarantine measures imposed by New Zealand and other governments as well as the travel and trade restrictions imposed by New Zealand and other countries in early 2020 have caused disruption to businesses and economic activity.

As a result of the global economic effects arising from the outbreak of COVID-19 there has been significant volatility in local and global equity markets at year end as well as post year end. This has adversely impacted the market value of the managed funds in our investment portfolio as at 31 March 2020. Subsequently (per the April 2020 investment performance report) the market value of the managed funds increased by \$12m.

No other matter or circumstance has occurred subsequent to year end that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect, the operations of the Trust, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the entity in subsequent financial years.
