We encourage all members of our school community to think in terms of 'I can't do this <u>yet'</u> or 'I am working towards' The opposite of a growth mindset is a fixed mindset. This way of thinking tends to underpin statements like 'I can't' or 'I'll never be able to'.

Supporting students to approach their learning with a growth mindset is an important part of what we do, and this helps students to be engaged in learning for life.

Feedback and Feedforward

A key part of learning and continuous improvement is 'feedback' and 'feedforward'. Individuals who seek feedback on their performance and then apply that feedback, tend to make the most progress.

l encourage students to take on board and apply the feedback that they receive from their teachers. Actively seeking feedback will also stand students in good stead for their lives beyond school.

Presentation Assembly and Head Students' Inaugural Speeches

It was a pleasure to be able to hold this assembly outdoors, in pleasant weather on the Chessboard, on Wednesday 16 February.

As has become somewhat customary over the past two years, the assembly was held for recipients of badges only, being mainly Year 13 students, and a small number of Year 12 students. The event was, however, live-streamed to all Ako classes, which were

operating at the same time as the assembly. This allowed for students to hear the speeches and view the presentations.

Deputy Principal Helen Shore-Taylor welcomed all to the assembly and introduced the Principal, Ross Preece. Ross congratulated students for their courage in putting their name forward for leadership positions, and noted what a positive event the early-year Leadership Camp was, as reported on in last week's newsletter. Ross highlighted that they were following-on from the last two years of student leaders who had provided a brilliant job of supporting their peers, adapting to online methods as required by COVID

In conclusion, Ross stressed the importance of each student supporting their team and committee as they moved forward into a year which had already presented challenges.

The Head Students for 2022 then made their inaugural speeches, with all noting the privilege they felt at being in their roles, and saying how much they were looking forward to working with students and staff. Jorja Roulston, Head Girl

'we are the school, we are the students and we are the future of this Millar cited the majority who believe this is a great school a school with so many cultures, a school that doesn't care where you

come from, a school with all the opportunities in the world A real-life example of pride was when the AshColl Boys' 1st XV'gets smashed' by a big Christchurch team but rock back up to training, where everyone is

so motivated, ready to get stuck in and train harder. Miller said 'they show up and get ready to play the next game because they believe that every game is an opportunity'.

There's no bigger motivation than failing! He acknowledged that COVID is making things tough for a lot of us, but we

have to make the most of what we've got, saying 'we only have one shot at this journey called life so, whatever you do, you have to give 100% and never let anyone drag you down'.

In conclusion, he acknowledged the other three Head Students and the

Student Executive, but saying that it's early days yet and easier to talk-the-

talk than walk-the-walk but saying that, from their few meetings so far, he has huge confidence that, as a group, they will be able: to walk-the-talk and strive to make this great school even greater.
