Rapaki Inquiry (The Arts)	Our Inquiry is based on The Arts this term and how the identity of Rapaki is reflected through the arts. We will extend our inquiry further into our own identity and how we can showcase this through various techniques used by Maori and Maori artists as well as other art forms.	
PE	Emily continues to work with our students coaching and mentoring their physical education skills. This term she is teaching Touch Rugby skills. Last term they enjoyed learning hockey skills. We also have Mainland Football's Ren Cameron continuing to work on football skills with all students from Year 3 - 8.	
"KiwiCan" Every Monday	This term is all about resilience. Students will be learning about 3 different modules under this theme. They are: 1. Understanding Emotions 2. Self-control/Self-Discipline 3. Dealing with Challenges The KC leaders will run energizers and a variety of activities through different teaching techniques to cover learning intentions such as: * identifying emotions in ourselves and in others * describing emotional triggers * practicing how to remain calm when we are upset * learning and practicing simple self-management strategies *identifying and overcoming challenges and understanding the effects of harmful behaviours on ourselves, others and the community	

Health	As part of Lyttelton Primary Schools Health Curriculum this term we will be teaching the <i>Keeping Ourselves Safe programme</i> . This was developed by the New Zealand Police as a National Prevention intervention. Some of the issues dealt with include: • a range of safe practices that they can use when interacting with others • what they can do if they have been or are being abused • what happens when abuse is reported Please read this link for further parent and whanau information. We will also be teaching <i>Relationship and Sexuality Education</i> in Weeks 4 - 8. We will be holding a parent evening to inform you further on this process on Monday 12th August. Numeracy	The strand focus this term is Statistics. Our number focus will be Ratios and Proportions and Problem Solving, followed by Multiplication and Division. Students continue to work on e-ako on the NZmaths website which allows them to log in at anytime during school or home and work on given material. This is especially good for practising times tables and basic facts knowledge.
Kapa haka and Cultural Festival	Kapa haka students continue to rehearse for their Cultural Festival performance on Friday 13th September at 12.30pm. The Wearable Arts designers are creating some wonderful costumes. A small group of children are practising a beautiful Indian dance under the tuition of Aabha. We will be taking our whole school to support our tamariki. If you wish to come along and haven't purchased tickets through the school you can do so through Ticketek.
Languages	We continue to develop our Te Reo and hope to utilise our mihi during our visits to Rapaki. Each Thursday morning from 8.50 - 9.30 am Totara continue to receive instruction in Spanish and Japanese from two Cashmere High School teachers; Lylian Carasco and Taka Kuze. This half year they swap and Year 8s will learn Japanese and the Year 7s will learn Spanish. We require Totara students to be at school by 8.45 am at the latest on Thursdays in order to be prepared for the lessons.
