Digital Fluency Intensive

This week we launched two new online <u>DFI Cohorts</u>. Seventy teachers and principals from across all of our clusters are spread across two cohorts that attend weekly full day sessions. During this time of Distance learning 118 teachers have participated in the Digital Fluency Intensive. Our first two cohorts will wrap up over the next fortnight.

Devices and Infrastructure

Fusion continues to be busy supporting Manaiakalani schools and their families both remotely and on-site. The student support line has been a big hit with over 180 calls from students and whanau made and successfully resolved. 80 site visits have been made during the lockdown, predominantly helping set up devices for students to continue their learning remotely.

Over lockdown, Fusion have implemented security and process improvements to Manaiakalani schools and will continue to do so over May. They are working to ensure school infrastructures are all still operating and ready once schools open again under Level 2.
