About Me: My name is Pari Teli, I'm 16 years old, and in Year 12. My interests involve drawing, writing, reading, and advocating/creating meaningful change.

My previous leadership experience:

Primary school: I was in the Health committee, alongside the PB4L (Positive Behaviour for Learning) committee. I was the class representative, part of the Enviro-Group and Student Council, alongside part of the Pasifika and Kapa Haka group. I was also awarded DUX in Year 8.

I was sorted into the Social Development riipu, which centered on improving the quality of life for each and every New Zealander, so they can reach their full potential. Each riipu came up with three policies, which were later compiled into the final 'Youth Declaration', a document that aims to highlight the policies to those in power; MPs, CEOs, councillors. My riipu's policies were centered on 'equity around the welfare system', 'homelessness and state housing enhancement', and 'societal inclusion', all of which were written with Tikanga Maori values in mind.
