Make and Learn your own Mihi for Waitangi Day

Last September during Te Wiki o te Reo Māori - Māori Language week, we were encouraged to join in a Māori Language Moment. This weekend, why not go a little further?

To help revitalise and revive te Reo (and get even better at those moments of te reo in our liturgy and karakia - prayers), its good to have opportunities to ako (learn) and korero (speak) all year round.

This Waitangi Day there is a new challenge for New Zealanders: learn how to introduce yourself in te reo Māori. The #MyMihi moment will help you to take another step in your te reo journey.

Here's a simple, short mihi structure for you to learn so that you can level up from 'kia ora'. Watch Sonny Ngatai present <u>3 easy steps here</u>.

Sadness and Gratitude at Secularisation

On Friday 29 January the St Michaels and All Angels' Church was farewelled at Clyde, after 157 years of a visible Anglican building presence.

A group of 34 parishioners, Anglicans from other areas, people with strong connections to the former St Michaels and friends gathered to say goodbye to the building set

aside for worship since October 1877. For Parish Priests Rev'd Penny Sinnamon and Rev'd Carol Masters, along with Parishioner's from Dunstan parish the represented an important moment as they continue to prepare to hand the buildings in Clyde over to **new owners on 26 March 2021**.

Bishop Steve led prayers recognizing the mixed emotions of this kind of event: sadness, grief, gratitude along with disappointment and anger. There was an opportunity for people to voice their memories and feelings during this final service. The scripture reading was from the prophet Jonah while stuck in the depths of a large fish (Jonah Chapter 3. Steve reminded the congregation that Lament is acceptable expression of Christian faith, along with all other kinds of emotions, as well as the observation that the story of Jonah starts with the call of God and ends with the demonstration of God's mercy.

He also relayed a message from Archbishop Philip Richardson who was also secularising <u>St</u> <u>Cuthbert's Church in Manaia</u>, and prayers were said for this community.

During the service the congregation joined in two verses of "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross" from memory, with the words and imbedded harmonies making this a fitting accompaniment to the occasion.

The Rev'd Carol Masters (who is retiring shortly) also shared memories after the service of the first ever sermon she preached - which was at St Michaels and also based on the Prophet Jonah: a fitting way to remember beginnings and endings in this special place.

After the official words of secularisation (attached below) people connected and talked with each other. It was a chance to say more than what was said during the service. There was also a remarkable sense of people who had been affected in different ways making peace with each other and seeking forgiveness.

Although this was an "ending" of a particular presence in Clyde, faith carries on as the Parish considers ways that they can continue to spread the love of Jesus Christ in Central Otago.

Diocesan Council and Trusts Board Meeting 26 January 2021

The Diocesan Council and Trusts Board meet monthly as the Standing Committee of the Diocese of Dunedin.

Diocesan Trusts Board

Anglican Family Care - Annabelle Cullane, Ruth Zeinert and Joanne Kingi were appointed to the Board for 2 year time

periods.

• **Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board** - Dr Tony Fitchett has renewed his term on the DDTB for a further three years, Alan Dunbar has stepped down and the Trusts Board appointed the Rev'd Dr Tony Martin has been appointed into his position. We have been advised that one further Trustee will be stepping down at Easter, so applications for this Board will be opened again. The Trusts Board encourage people to prayerfully consider this and would like to see a greater diversity of competent people on the Board to help steer this for the future.

Diocesan Council

- Maori Translation for (sections) of the Diocesan Vision Statement this has been finalised and will be placed on the website (see attachment below). We appreciate the help of local Anglican Kaumatua (Monty Montgomery, Fr. Wiremu Quedley) and Archbishop The Most Rev'd Don Tamihere who have assisted to translate key concepts into te reo Maori.
- **Buildings and Properties:** St Michael's Clyde has been sold through a tendering process, with new owners taking possession on 26 March 2020.
- **Bishop's Update** Bishop Steve updated the council with a variety of clergy movements which are resulting in further thinking around any new arrangements: Rev'd Sue McCafferty finishes at the Taieri Parish at the end of January and Fr. Hugh Bowron finishes at Caversham at Easter. St Matthews and the Peninsular Parishes are still in the process of looking for new clergy. A recent ecumenical service at Middlemarch was very encouraging and we are looking at ways that we can cooperate more in this way here plus in some other rural localities. With some of the changes and vacancies on the horizon this year it is a good opportunity to look at different models for ministry, and we are looking forward to **Rev'd Anne Van Gend's appointment** (Diocesan Community Ministry Enabler) as as part of this process. During the Bishop's report Diocesan Council discussed how the Ministry and Mission committees could assist with formulating this further, as well as getting some grass roots input into this.
- The Diocesan Ministry Educator. Michael Godfrey reported on the Diocesan ministry Retreat, which was impacted by one presenter who was unable to attend due to illness. The final Boundaries course for 2020 was held in Cromwell, with these sessions having good engagement (and some tweaking will be done). Lisa Barlow was ordained a deacon in December (the first of the ones Michael has seen through the process) and there are more considering similar pathways. Michael has continued to be involved/have contact with various services and groups and attendee the St Thomas Omarama Management Committee where the decision was made to close the Presbyterian Church there. This will need to be looked at in the future (Community Ministry Enabler) to look at on-going Faith Community presence in that area.
- The Diocesan Child, Youth and Family Educator John Graveston has met with children and youth leaders over November and December, and the Young Adults group finished 2020 with a final study followed by a dinner at Luna. John attended a Diocesan Youth Facilitators meeting in Nelson in November as well as a Helping Hurting Teens workshop (we are considering inviting the speaker at this, Neville Bartley, back to do a workshop with us). John attended Synod, the Diocesan retreat and has also taken some annual leave. Vulnerable Children's requirements for the risk register is in process.
- **Diocesan Registrar's Report** Andrew Metcalfe reported on progress (and viewing stats) for Faith Community videos:

- The <u>About Us page on the website</u> has been changed to reflect our Vision Statement.
 Revised privacy legislation is on our radar, and Andrew reported on a Charity Law,
 Accounting and Regulation conference attended in November (see <u>separate article</u> on this).
 Other items in his report were dealt with below.
- Stewardship Committee this has been meeting and has affirmed the tasks set out in the Terms of Reference (see Governance Structure document attached below). The committee recognises that these tasks cannot be undertaken in a vacuum, and will require close cooperation and co-ordination with Dio Council, Dio Office, Parishes, Ministry Units, other Diocesan Organisations and the Diocesan Trust Board. The primary purpose of the Stewardship Committee will be to enable ministry, in other words to understand clearly what it is that God is calling us to do to build the Kingdom of God in this Diocese, and then work out what that means for the finances.
- **Diana Abercrombie** has had to step down from Diocesan Council. Lay members of Council will be considering another Synod Lay representatives who can be co-opted into this position.
- Decisions made during the meeting: The meeting approved Anne Gover, Lauren Pegg and Damon Plimmer to join the Bishop as part of Title D panel; A change in the form of annual returns and statistics gathered was reviewed and will be taken to Synod this year (these will reflects a change reporting requirements for charities, and will connect us more clearly to the Five Marks of Mission); The 2020 Yearbook was confirmed and the Bishop authorised to sign minutes from Synod 2020; Approval was given for the Diocese to purchase two late model second hand hybrid cars from existing funding set aside for this for Educator(s) and Enabler use; in principle the Council agreed that the Diocese should support in principle the migration of parish accounts to a cloud based system (this is in early thought stages); a decision was made to take some suggested changes to statutes 11 and 27 (resulting from a resolution passed at the November meeting) to Synod this year around clergy removal expenses and clarifying Diocesan funding for anystipendiary curates; suggested changes to the Standing Resolutions were also agreed and will be taken to Synod and; Diocesan Council agreed a procedural motion for material related to Synod to be available on line and in paper version for those who request it.
- Items for general discussion Diocesan Council will reflect on the outcomes of an Away day in December at its next meeting and is looking to improve some of the ways they operate. The session of Synod that dealt with Selwyn College Te Maru Pūmanawa was will also be discussed then, with Diocesan Council starting to work on the actions that need to arise from this.

SCOPE What is Scope?

Scope stands for Strandz Communities of Practice for Everyone. The Oxford University Press defines 'scope' as "the extent of the area or subject matter that something deals with or to which it is relevant" with synonyms including freedom, opportunity, room, range, breadth, spread, horizon. A 'scope' (noun) can also be a target, an instrument for observing, viewing, or examining, or a length of cable extended when a ship is at anchor.

These definitions and synonyms reflect a group that has the freedom to observe and explore, while being supported by a strong anchor in Christ.

Who can join Scope?

Scope is available for leaders within the Anglican Church of Aotearoa New Zealand and Polynesia in 2021. Unfortunately, we don't have unlimited capacity to open it wider afield yet, but if you are from another organisation or denomination, and would like to know more about Scope, feel free to get in touch!

Applications for Social Service and Disadvantaged Youth Funds Grants are now open

The Social Justice Committee (SJC) has opportunities from time to time for parishes and other Diocesan organisations to apply for grants. A further funding round is taking place

with the closing date of midday Friday 11 Feb 2021.

Please note that funding is limited and the Social Justice Committee may not be able to recommend assisting all applicants with their total costs.

Grants are made by the Diocesan Council on the recommendation of the Social Justice Committee and are expected to be sought on a quarterly basis, with the ability to consider urgent applications outside that time-frame on a one-off basis.

In November 2020 the following funding applications submitted during the last funding round were approved by Diocesan Council: **Leslie Groves Society** for a Tovertafel projector and games (specialist dementia resources); **Parata Anglican Charitable Trust** for a pressure mattress and cushion; **Home of St Barnabas Trust** for a combi catering oven and: **Taieri Parish** 12 months funding for their Friday Light Coordinator.

Child Care Funds

No applications are sought this quarter for Child Care funds but instead see next paragraphs.

Social Service Funds

Applications are now able to be made for grants from the **Social Service funds** under the control of Diocesan Council. **Please note that most of the funding available in this category are for projects that come under the definition of aged care.**

Disadvantaged Youth Funds

Applications are now able to be made for grants from the **Disadvantaged Youth funds** under the control of Diocesan Council. The Diocesan Council has recently obtained legal advice that monies held in this account may be used for that purpose, and has resolved that **"youth" means those aged between 10 and 24 years of age, i.e. over 10 and under 24 years old.** The term disadvantaged will be given its usual, wide, meaning.

The closing date for applications for all grants is midday 11 February 2021.

Join the World Day of Prayer 2021

A series of devastating tropical cyclones form the backdrop to this year's World Day of Prayer services to be held on Friday, March 5. Services are being organised by local committees throughout the country. All are welcome.

Through the **resources** they prepared for this global event, Vanuatu women share their faith in God's love and address some of the many challenges they face. Vanuatu is vulnerable to frequent disasters like last year's Cyclone Harold, climate change, and now with Covid-19, the significant loss of income due to the collapse of tourism. Like women everywhere, they face the everyday struggles of providing healthy food for their families, educating their children, and in a growing number of cases finding employment or adequate livelihoods.

The service and accompanying Bible study include their reflections on the story Jesus told about building houses. In a

land rocked by earthquake and cyclone, covered in volcanic ash, or threatened by rising seas, the decision about where to build can be critical. <u>"Building on a Strong Foundation"</u> offers time for reflection and prayer.

"This service comes from the Pacific and explores familiar themes. It is an opportunity for us all to share with ni-Vanuatu resident in Aotearoa and show our concern for the world we share," says Pauline McKay, National President.

Artist Juliette Pita from Erromango island captures the prayer of the ni-Vanuatu in her painting 'Cyclone Pam II: 13th of March 2015'. The image is of a mother praying over her child, protected from the large waves by a palm tree held firm by its strong roots. During the cyclone, artist Juliette Pita took refuge in a container with her neighbours. When they opened the door the following morning everything had been destroyed except for her studio, a traditional hut made from palm trees. Juliette says God answered their prayers and nature protected them from harm.

Offerings from the services will go to Christian World Service for a new food security programme of the Vanuatu Christian Council, the Bible Society of Vanuatu and the Interchurch Council for Hospital Chaplaincy as well as costs.

From the Diocesan Ministry Educators Desk: Lent 2021

Lent is fast approaching, we have updated this article with some resources we are aware of.

I have been asked about Lenten resources for 2021. You will note that this is a fairly early Lent, so if you are ordering resource material time may be tight.

I am so far aware of the following:

A. The Diocese of Waiapu is preparing a series suitable for small groups and/or individual study: <u>Turning</u>

Turning:

turning towards God

turning towards God's world, starting at the margins

The six-week progamme is addressed as follows (by weeks):

- 1. Welcome (to Lent, to this theme)
- 2. Turning towards God repentance and reconnection
- 3. Turning towards God attending
- 4. Turning towards God's world

Applications for membership of the DDTB will be considered by the Diocese of Dunedin Trusts Board on 9 March 2021. Please send any applications for this before 2 March 2021. We would like to hear from anyone who is

interested in becoming a Trustee. We are especially interested in people who have an interest and (preferably) experience in governance and who can add to the diversity of this Board.

The board has two main roles:

First, it manages two investment funds (the Income Fund and the Growth Fund) as trustee for diocesan institutions, e.g. social services, residential and community based services, educational institutions and so on. These bodies deposit funds with it. The total funds under management in the two Funds is currently over \$32 million dollars.

The second major responsibility of the Board is the legal ownership of all Diocesan properties: it acts a trustee for all Diocesan institutions including local churches and parishes, who are the beneficial owners, i.e. they make use of these resources for their mission and ministry. In this capacity, the Board arranges insurance of properties. It has also taken a leadership role in the assessment of properties for seismic stability.

The Board meets monthly, as does its subcommittee known as the Investment Committee. The Investment Committee monitors current investments to ensure the best returns possible and that they meet ethical business standards. It frequently conducts business by email outside of its monthly meetings as necessary. Board members are able to meet remotely (teleconference, video conference) for anyone who is not in the immediate Dunedin area.

Diocesan Property Consultation 2020-21

Our property consultation is now open wide with an opportunity for people and groups to have their say via an electronic survey before the end of February 2021.

Survey Link (see below for more information) Why are we doing this?

The Diocesan Council has been becoming increasingly caught up in property matters but without having an agreed pathway for how to handle many situations apart from what is set out in Statute 3.

In the Synod held in 2019, the following motion was carried: That this Synod affirms the Diocesan Council intention to undergo a consultation process around the sale or other use of properties, buildings and other assets within the context of future mission within the Diocese.

Some workshops have taken place in Archdeaconry groupings. They have been open to Clergy and Lay Synod reps as well as Parish Wardens, with substitute places available to any Vestry members who have an interest or contribution to make around this property discussion. As this year has been challenging to organise physical meetings, we are also offering a survey option to help us complete the consultation.

This will help develop a strategy on how we use our property assets to advance God's kingdom.

The survey has the following questions:

- In your setting, what is the most important consideration when thinking about property and how it can aid your ministry in the future? (think of this in terms of where you think your Parish might be at in 10-20 years time)
- What is your take on the Strategic Property Criteria? Anything not quite right? Anything missing? (see pages 7-8 of the Diocese of Dunedin Strategic Property Strategy Consultation

- Paper 2020)
- If you were to rank in order of importance the suggested Strategic Property Criteria, what would this be? (individual exercise)
- What weight would you give to each criterion? (each person will be given 20 dots to "spend" as they want by placing these next to each criteria displayed in the room or entering the numbers into the survey).

After the workshops and the survey has been completed, the combined feedback will be collated and given back to Diocesan Council for consideration. **We would like to have everything completed by the end of February 2020.**

We hope at the end of this process to have some information that will assist the Diocesan Council and Faith Communities in their decision making around property, with the potential for motions/bills related to property to be taken to a future Synod.

Secret Revealed for Successful Charities

The Diocese of Dunedin has a huge variety of organisations, all wanting to thrive. What is one secret of success that we can learn from?

The Diocese of Dunedin includes a whole variety of organisations - from Parishes to social service agencies in Dunedin and Invercargill, rest homes, a psycho-geriatric

hospital, a girls' school and a University hall of residence. Being successful means making a real difference in our communities, often having a larger impact that our size would indicate. But, often we are not thriving as we could be.

Late last year at a Charity Law, Accounting and Regulation Conference, Craig Fisher, a consultant with RSM New Zealand (specialising in governance, audit and assurance advice as well as restructuring, growing, and developing organisations) spoke about this. His context was "knowing when it may be time to call it quits" and how an organisation may plan for the future by considering collaborations, mergers... or closing down.

This might sound a bit alarming, and we are certainly not suggesting that we all call it quits (!), but there was some excellent advice given about what makes for growing, thriving organisations that is worth sharing more widely with our Boards and Parishes. None of us want to be in the position of calling it a day, but it's important to be thinking of the future... and sometimes that may some things that in their existing forms need to finish, with new things replacing them.

So, what's important to consider?

Successful charities are all about the why, not the how.

They know **why** they are there and **why** they do what they do. Organisations that are not so successful get caught up more in the **what and how**, risking losing sight of the bigger picture, that is, **their purpose**.

When did you last spent time asking things like:

- Are we really being effective?
- What could we be doing differently?
- Could others do this better than ourselves?

There is a difference between being effective... and being busy fools! This is why it's important to pause, reflect and ask: are we doing the right thing?

COVID-19 has had a huge impact on the charities sector and has been likened to a blowtorch i.e. amplifying and speeding up existing issues organiations have been facing. Business-as-it- was in the past has gone and we are starting to realise that some things won't go back to the way they were.

Think of it like a tornado: it will destroy some buildings but leave others untouched. COVID-19 has had this kind of impact with some being literally brought to their knees and others experiencing record results. It is a very unequal impact.

The Charity Sector in Aotearoa-New Zealand

Overall we are characterised by having large number of small entities that are often poorly resourced.

- They tend to be more operationally focused rather than strategic (focused on day to day running, doing what they have always done vs thinking ahead, altering course to meet changes)
- Often they can have weak financial models and positions
- Often they can underinvest in Information Technology and in people

This is why many people are seeing COVID as a "burning platform for change"... although there often people around us (even ourselves!) who won't change even if the situation gets really desperate...

There has been an extraordinary amount of money put into the public and private sectors since the pandemic began. We are doing pretty well health wise (barring another out break and current virus mutations), but we risk becoming complacent and thinking things will just go back to normal. Predictions are that 2021 will be even more challenging.

So... there are seven questions that are important for charting the future:

7 Hard Questions

- 1. What is our purpose?
- 2. Do we really have the right to exist?
- 3. Do we still need to exist?
- 4. Should we have an end date?
- 5. Should we continue to try and go it alone?
- 6. Are we thinking broadly enough about who we collaborate with?
- 7. Can we reimagine the future?

The secret is to spend time reflecting and asking questions like these

Hard questions... but important to ask. If our Parish or Organisation is all about solving a particular problem (maybe think of it as a "wicked problem"), how will we know when we have achieved what we have set out to do? The prospect of shutting up shop might feel like failure... but it could actually be the ultimate measure of success - job done! **But only if we are truly focused on our purpose**... and not ending up in failure because we have completely missed what we need to be doing, and instead "doing what we have always done".

Part of the dynamic of asking these questions is that it helps us to really look at our impact: how can we see and measure what we are doing? It's not all about being busy...

If we are not collaborating, we run the risk of doubling up on what others are doing, or actually adding to the misery of a situation. A classic example is when there is a family with identified needs who get three knocks on the door from three agencies offering food... and then none for the next three weeks. Think of the difference if those three agencies had collaborated or even joined forces in some way.

Final Thoughts

Reflecting on the future in this way is hard - and can be really challenging, especially if we and others lives and livelihoods are involved. But it is a (now not so secret) technique that really makes a difference.

We want to encourage all Diocesan Organisations and Parishes to spend time whenever they meet together to think more strategically - being wise and more effective, rather than getting caught up only in what you are already doing.

Coronavirus Covid-19 Level 1 Update

At Level 1 we need to continue to take care of each other and ourselves. We have updated our Level 1 information to remind each other what we need to do....

Although all Church Services and Pastoral care can take place with no restrictions, we need to keep hygiene measures in place. All of us need to keep track of where we have been and who we have seen using the Government Tracer App or our own records. Let's continue to be mindful of others around us in church settings.

We are aligning ourselves with advice-resources from the <u>Government on Level 1</u>, and have also developed our own <u>Policy and Guidelines around Level 1 in our Pandemic Response Framework</u> We are still in a pandemic alert system and need to watch we don't become complacent.

Key points for all of us

- While not requiring physical distancing in church, we are encouraging this to continue, especially being sensitive of other's needs (physical distancing) in pews. <u>All church buildings</u> <u>and premises must display the NZ COVID Tracer poster</u> to help with contract tracing if required.
- Remember, while we have access to communion in both kinds, we are not practicing intinction (dipping the wafer into the wine) feel free to acknowledge the cup if you don't want to drink from it: taking the wafer only (communion in one kind) still counts as receiving in both kinds.
- Make sure you have access to face-masks if this is required in the future e.g. Level 2 (if
 there is any community transmission) or for places where physical distancing is difficult in
 Level 1. Have a look at current advice on the use of these. Please follow Government
 recommendations for mask use when using public transport. Have a look at the posters
 attached below on how you can make your own masks and check out these videos.
- Some at-risk people may not be comfortable being with a larger group of people offer other ways of staying in touch with them i.e. the phone, a video messaging system or

something similar. It's OK for anyone to wear a face mask for your own or other's protection. **Be kind.** Make a difference by checking-in on others, especially the elderly and vulnerable

- We are continuing to maintain high standards of public health (around cleaning, providing hospitality and so on).
- **Look after anyone that needs help**. Drop supplies to those at home sick and ensure you have no physical contact.

The Golden Rules for everyone at Alert Level 1

- 1. If you're sick, stay home. Don't go to work or school. Don't socialise.
- 2. If you have cold or flu symptoms call your doctor or Healthline 0800 358 5453 and make sure you get tested.
- 3. Wash your hands. Wash your hands.
- 4. Sneeze and cough into your elbow, and regularly disinfect shared surfaces.
- 5. If you are told by health authorities to self-isolate you must do so immediately.
- 6. If you're concerned about your wellbeing, or have underlying health conditions, work with your GP to understand how best to stay healthy.
- 7. Keep track of where you've been and who you've seen to help contact tracing if needed. Use the NZ COVID Tracer app as a handy way of doing this.
- 8. All public venues (Businesses, churches etc.) should help people keep track of their movements by displaying the Ministry of Health QR Code for contact tracing.
- 9. Stay vigilant. There is still a global pandemic going on. People and businesses should be prepared to act fast to step up Alert Levels again if we have to.
- 10. People will have had different experiences over the course of the pandemic. Whatever you're feeling it's okay. Be kind to others. Be kind to yourself. Ask for help if you need to.

Are you potentially an at-risk person?

There is guidance for people at higher risk of COVID-19. It includes advice under the different Alert Levels, who is at higher risk, and how they can protect themselves. **Information for at-risk people**

Anyone who has returned to New Zealand from overseas must abide by NZ government requirements. Currently this is to remain at a Government organised quarantine facility. This involves self-isolating by staying indoors and avoid contact with other people for 14 days from the date of arrival and then follow lock down procedures until advised otherwise.
