RECTOR'S MESSAGE



In Assembly recently, five International students shared stories from their home life and home countries, and talked about their New Zealand ambitions, to a captivated audience. The photos of the boys' home schools and home cities, each in stark contrast to ours, made big impressions. We currently have boys from eleven countries learning in our school. Through each of them the world comes to us and our young people. Our boys can form lasting friendships in return. While the TBHS identity is gradually globalising, our Maori identity remains vital and will be celebrated from 11 – 17 September in Maori Language Week.

In teaching and learning, staff were trained on Friday 25 August in new ways to help boys access and move through advancing levels of understanding. This can be done using a model called SOLO (Structure of Observed Learning Outcomes) – as presented to staff by internationally acclaimed, **Pam Hook**. We look

forward to using SOLO across the curriculum over the next few years to increasingly give boys better knowledge of where they are placed in learning levels, and what they need to do specifically, to take the next step up - including in NCEA.

Waitaki Day went very well last week with an 11-5 win on results to Timaru Boys' down in Oamaru. The Waitaki Assembly to launch the Day was all the more special thanks to our guest speaker **Don Hutton**, son of William (or Snowy) Hutton who famously sang 'Drake's Drum' for the first time way back in 1913, to usher in a new era of rugby success against Waitaki. Don not only encouraged the boys for their games but was kind enough to gift valuable memorabilia from his family collection.

Winter sport is all but over and the Winter Sport Prizegiving is coming up. One team does deserve special mention: the First XV. This team has had an incomparable season when considered with other First XVs that played in the Crusader Competition over the last 16 years. Capably led by **Cullen Grace** and effectively coached and administered by **Gavin Miller, Mark Cvitanich, Eddie Grace, Regan Joyce, Chris Leonard (Bubble)** and **Rod Sparrow**, the team has continually broken new ground. To finish as finalist against Christchurch Boys' from the 15 teams was an outstanding achievement. The long hours of hard work were rewarded. Those who made this possible, from the players and coaches up front, to the long chain of parents and supporters backing them, can be satisfied with 2017; a truly extraordinary season.

Thank you to **Keri Whytock** and the supporting staff and Ball Committee for providing a very good Ball for Year 12 and 13 last Friday. The vast majority of boys and their partners were impeccable in their approach to it, and respecting of the expectations communicated in preparation, and requested for the night.

This week we farewell **Gary Ivamy** as he takes up a new position at Fonterra. Gary, as many of you will know, is our Director of Sport, Dean, Head Housemaster of Thomas House, and Staff Representative to the Board. He was a Careers and Transition teacher previously too. Gary has coached Football, Volleyball, Rowing and Cricket, and been in numerous steering groups connected to sport. He has been generous in his help for boys, families, staff, and community organisations whenever needed. We know Gary will do a great job at Fonterra and wish him well.

Prefect selection for 2018 will be managed differently. We are going to be naming the 2018 prefects and prefect leaders before seniors leave in 2017, rather than early next year. This will enable our student leaders to begin to adapt to their new roles over the summer break, and for student leadership to be in place for the first day of the new school year.

One of the tasks required the use of the Careers NZ website (www.careers.govt.nz). This is an excellent starting point for exploring interests and considering next steps. Your son should be able to share his experience and ideas from this process with you.

Tertiary institutes enrolments are open and representatives from around New Zealand have been visiting the school to help students with course planning. Halls of Residence applications are well underway, and many scholarship applications are approaching due dates. Please visit the website of your intended place of study to find out more about both. Scholarships are not just for the academically elite, there are many suitable for those with other strengths or intentions to study in specific areas.

For students returning in 2018, please pay attention to the notices for information and application dates about targeted courses such as Gateway, and Dual pathways with ARA, as these provide some very specific learning for our students. Successful Waitaki Exchange for Timaru Boys' High School

The annual Winter Sports Exchange between Timaru Boys' and Waitaki Boys' took place in Oamaru, a successful outing for Timaru. There were good wins across all sports on a day when the weather really turned it on.



Timaru Boys' High School **Rugby 1**st **XV** gave their Waitaki counterparts a rugby lesson with a record breaking 85-12 victory in Oamaru. TBHS ran rampant, scoring in fourteen tries to two, having led 40-7 at the break, to retain the Sel O'Neill Shield. Waitaki did score the first try of each half but were largely starved of the ball by the TBHS dominant pack. Prop **Thomas Edwards** earned TBHS's first try, waltzing in after a quick tap. TBHS then started to spin the ball wide with lock **Hamish Robertson** appearing out wide to score, followed by wing **Tevita Eukaliti** and fullback **Hayden McNulty**. Tevita Eukaliti then made a great run down right wing before left wing Hamish Smack finished off in opposite corner.

The Waitaki Exchange, in its 134th year, is the longest uninterrupted inter-school rugby duel in New Zealand. Despite TBHS's comprehensive win, Waitaki still hold the overall advantage with 68 wins to TBHS's 56, alongside 10 draws.

Cam Anderson now has the Timaru Boys' goal scoring record for 1st XI Football, sitting in front with 39 goals after bagging two in their 4-0 win over Waitaki in Oamaru. Anderson was tied on 37 with former TBHS star Tom Deeley, who is currently playing football at Lees-McRae College in the United States, and needed just one more against Waitaki to move to the top of the goal scoring charts. Cam passed the record in style as Taylor Donaldson, himself and Mitchell Skudder-Dey all combined beautifully to help him break the record as he guided one past Waitaki Boys' keeper Joel Brosnan in the second half. Harry Pierce and Henry Baxter were also goal scorers on the day.

The Timaru Boys' HS **Senior Basketball** side had an impressive win in this traditional, hard-fought encounter. The team managed to reverse last year's big loss at home, winning 72 -64. The win is a good lead up for the team as they will compete in the South Island Premiership Tournament in Dunedin this week. The win was accomplished with a solid team effort, led by rapidly improving play from centre, **James Watt**. He anchored the defence with his rebounding and shot blocking. Timaru Boys' full court pressure defence worked well and scoring opportunities opened up. **Oli Browning** connected on three long range three point shots during the second quarter, giving our side an eight point lead which they then maintained throughout. **Todd Phillips** and **Ben Aicken** also made key baskets and James Watt added to the highlights with four impressive dunks.

The **Junior Basketball** had a hard loss against the impressive Waitaki team which will be one of the favourites in next week's South Island Junior Premierships in Ashburton. The Timaru side struggled against their larger, well drilled opposition and eventually lost 107 to 44.

The Timaru Boys' **2nd XI Hockey** came up against the Waitaki 1st XI. Timaru went out to a 3-0 lead at half time but could not extend it in the second half as Waitaki came back with a second half goal. **Reuben Dockrill, Hayden Kennedy** and **McGregor Isbister** stood out for Timaru in a good hit out before tournament.

The **Junior Football** had a convincing 7-1 win over their southern counterparts. **Bailey Chambers** was lively up front with **Flynn Linton** controlling the game in midfield, while **Peter Rawlins** was impressive every time he touched the ball.

Archery was a new comer to the exchange and Timaru were particularly convincing in winning 224 to 170. The targets were set up outside which is unusual for inter school archery. Competitors shot from a distance of 10 metres with the sun in their eyes and a slight cross breeze. As the bows had open sights it took the competitors a few shoots to 'get their eye in' and adjust their aim to be on target. Two rounds were shot, consisting of three arrows each. After this, each

competitor had one final shot in order to elevate their team's scores. The top score of the day went to **Jack McLennan.**

Debating also resulted in an impressive win to Timaru. The moot was *that the current bill on Euthanasia in New Zealand should be passed*. Timaru took the negative response. The winning margin was 327 to 301. **David Ellis** was confirmed best speaker.

Stephen Garner cemented himself as the best Squash player in the school, whilst being the youngest player in the team. He won well against the WBHS #1 by playing to a predetermined game plan and sticking to it. He showed discipline, maturity and skill in doing so. And led the team to a 2-1 win.

The **2**nd **XV Rugby** had an easy win by 65-7 to cap off a great season for the team. **Jack Millar** and **Jaydon Phillips** looked particularly impressive with the ball in hand.

The **16s Rugby** had an equally comprehensive win over the Waitaki counterparts by 63-0. **George Guerin** showed good pace in a great team effort.

Hugh Cameron, **Jed Syme**, **Jack Pudney**, **George Mulder** were the standouts for the **Colts** who were inconsistent in their 41-38 loss. The team will need to work on a better all-round effort with tournament coming up.

The 14s were outclassed by Waitaki losing 62-12. The team struggled with injuries throughout the game.

Chess won by 9 and a half to 6 and a half. Badminton lost 6 0.

As part of the BCITO course, students engaged with a range of materials used within the construction industry, along with the processes that turn them into a finished product.

Sustainable materials have been used that will complement the existing surroundings as well as stand the test of time. A steel mould for the ends was firstly produced then used to pour the concrete into, while locally milled macrocarpa was sized and dynabolted to

the seat ends. Students can be rightfully proud of their achievements as each bench seat will display a small plaque with their names on it.

PACE Outline (Programme for Achieving Careers and Employment)

This programme has been designed and implemented with the focus on Year 11 students who may struggle with attaining their Level 1 National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) in mainstream classes, and to enable a transition into Year 12, other study options or the workplace.

The class structure is based around a homeroom setting as the class stay together all day, building a secure and supportive environment for the students. The class teachers have a desire to work alongside these students, aware that they may require different strategies for their learning programmes.



A student that is accepted into the PACE programme will be required to have a desire to achieve Level 1 NCEA, a willingness to consider, investigate and plan for their future career, and a commitment to attend 90% or better over a term. Self-management of learning and assessment is important.

The outcomes of the PACE programme are as follows:

- Complete the Literacy and Numeracy standards required to gain NCEA Level 1
- The opportunity to gain 80 credits required to gain NCEA Level 1
- Complete learning with real practical applications
- Investigate pathways in Year 12 and beyond school to support vocational direction

The class is run through a six period day and subjects taught are as follows:

- Mathematics 10 credits (Numeracy)
- English 10 Credits (Communication Skills Literacy)
- Physical Education
- Food Technology
- Science
- Workshop Technology
- Transition

There are a number of other courses the students will be completing as the year progresses, these include:

- Geraldine high rope course
- Carpentry (Ara)
- Engineering (Ara)
- Machine Shop (Ara)
- Introduction to Welding (Ara)

The students will have the opportunity to complete approximately 90 credits (this will vary slightly depending on their external course choices) The courses have been created to meet the needs of this group of students. English, Science

and NCES (National Certificate of Employment Skills) all lead directly to Year 12 courses. Mathematics, workshop and Physical Education will also link into Year 12 options, depending on the level of attainment gained.


