Dear Prospective Students, Parents/Caregivers and Whanau.

Hillmorton High School is an urban co-educational school situated in the South-West of Christchurch.

The school is a medium-sized Years 7-13 school. The size means that we are able to provide your student with a caring, intimate environment, where they are known as an individual.

We are fortunate to be able to offer a broad range of learning experiences, subjects and environments to meet your child's educational needs.

Students attending Hillmorton High School come from a variety of ethnic, social and academic backgrounds, with the majority

of students living within this south-west area of Christchurch. Hillmorton is a community school – many former students living in the area now send their children to the school.

Our school's population closely mirrors the wider social fabric of New Zealand society. The international students who chose to come and study at Hillmorton, add a further cosmopolitan element to the school.

Our strong focus on celebrating diversity and community, allows Hillmorton students to develop the necessary skills that enable them to lead successful, productive lives in a global society, in the 21st Century.

We celebrate our background based on the Treaty of Waitangi with a bi-cultural focus. We have satellite provision for students enrolled at Van Asch Deaf Education Centre. Students attend some classes with Hillmorton students, receive specialist support and have the opportunity to be involved in the wider life of the School.

We offer a broad range of subjects and activities at Hillmorton. Students are able to be involved in such activities as ICAS and Cantamaths.

We celebrate culture and the arts where our students achieve excellent results. Dance (Toi Kanikani), Drama (Toi Whakaari), Music (Toi Puoro) and the Visual Arts are offered as subjects. and student work is used as national exemplars.

Many opportunities are provided for student performances - J Rock, Stage Challenge, production, choir, Theatre Sports, involvement in Polyfest and Cultural festival to name a few.

A broad range of sporting activities is also offered, with participation rates in interschool sport being high. Students in Year 7 and 8 also enjoy participation in Hagley Sport, Koru Games and other sporting competitions that are provided for this level locally and nationally.

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DEVELOPING LEADERSHIP & INDEPENDENCE

Leadership opportunities are abound in a school this size.

The school has a commitment to servant leadership. Students at all levels, provide valuable leadership within the school in the form of service - a diverse range of activities is undertaken. 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Hillmorton High School has a proud reputation as an effectively functioning school community. In part, this is because there is a considerable emphasis placed on establishing positive relationships between students, staff and home.

Behaviour guidelines are clearly established and consistently enforced, so that students have a clear understanding of our expectations. In this way we establish a safe and positive learning environment for all students.

The school is divided into, a Middle School, Years 7–10 Years and a Senior School Years 11–13. Since becoming a composite school, many of our students enter at Year 7 and remain at Hillmorton for their secondary schooling.

There is strong leadership at all levels with the Principal, Deputy Principals, Deans, a Head of Middle School, Heads of Departments and all staff. Student leadership is also considered important with opportunities from Year 7 through to Year 13.

SUPPORT FOR YOUR CHILD

TUTORS

Each student is placed in a whanau house tutor group with a tutor. Meeting regularly, the tutor is another adult in each student's school life helping them to settle into school and supporting them on a variety of matters such as ensuring good attendance.

CAREERS AND TRANSITION STAFF

As students move from secondary education to that next step on their journey whether it be university study, a course, or work, they are supported by Careers and Transition staff. Our career development programme begins in Year 7; students gradually realise the variety of pathways available to them.

STUDENT SUPPORT

Specialist support is available both in the classroom and in our Student Support for students who may require extra support to enable them to experience success. A strong feature of our School is our ability to help students with specific learning disabilities.

UPLAND

Upland is our specialist area for those students with serious multiple disabilities. These students are supported by specialist staff both in their Upland classes and in mainstream classes to achieve success and meet their individual goals.

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HERITAGE

THE ENVIRONMENT

The school site was once a very large swamp extending from Lincoln Road to the Cashmere Hills.

This swamp was teeming with life: eels, native trout, freshwater crayfish and was a rich food source for Maori. The raupo which grew in the swamps also provided material for a unique boat/raft called the makihi.

The name of the Upper Heathcote was Waimakihi and the settlement near Sunnyside Hospital was called Omakihi.

THE NAME HILLMORTON

Throughout the years there has been controversy over the spelling Hillmorton or Hillmorten.

R.M. Morten owned land in the area and some people believe the area was named after him. However, the Lands and Survey Department ruled that Hillmorton was correct as it was the name of Rev Joseph Twigger's farm of 1876 which was named after Hillmorton near Rugby, England.

THE NAME HOROMAKA

Horomaka was a famous Waitaha ancestress who was married to an equally famous man. During a battle alongside the Upper Heathcote River she was killed and her body was left there.

Rikki Ellison, the Rangatira from Taumutu (he is represented on our waharoa) designated the area of land between Hillmorton and Hornby to be called Horomaka.

THE SCHOOL CREST

The school crest, a Bengal tiger, was taken from the family crest of Sir John Cracroft Wilson – owner of the nearby Cashmere estate.

The tiger was chosen because it symbolizes beauty, strength and fiery determination.



THE ORIGINAL LATIN MOTTO

The Latin motto "Virtus Sibi Praemium" translates as 'a good character brings its own rewards.'

It also appears on the Cracroft Wilson Crest.

THE KORU AND MAUNGA

This design represents – New Life/New Beginnings.

The Koru symbolizes a new beginning of learning things Maori at Hillmorton, a recognition of how Maori identify with their culture.

The black triangle is a mountain. The blue is the river flowing from life, the foetus, the beginning of life that appears in unfurling of the Koru.



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
