
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

# St Luke's - the chapel in the bush Richard Johnson — March 21st, 2022

In the last year, the bush surrounding the little Anglican church of St Luke has been transformed from a weed infested eye-sore, in a community restoration project.

Dot Muir, warden of the church, said that for some time neighbours around the church had been quietly working in the bush to clear weeds, and this ramped up last year to include members of the congregation.

"We had a vision of creating a chapel in the bush, but first we had to do a lot of work around the church and in the bush, "said Dot. Weeds were cleared, exotic and invasive trees, including willows and sycamores, were removed, and natives planted. A parking area behind the church was cleared and spread with dunnite. A large cleared area in the bush was covered with wood chip to form a space which can be used for play groups or outdoor meetings.

## **Chrism Eucharists 2022**

Bishop Steven Benford — March 27th, 2022

A warm invitation to all to join with me at a Chrism Eucharist this Holy Week.

Sisters and Brothers in Jesus Christ

Having just entered the second half of Lent it is time to turn our attention to the Annual Chrism Services held in the Diocese, and I would like to invite you to consider making time to attend one of them.

The Chrism Mass is a wonderful opportunity to both remember and renew the commitment we made as servants of Jesus Christ. I have planned two Chrism Services – one at All Saints, Gladstone, Invercargill, on **Tuesday 12 April 6pm** and a second at the Cathedral on **Maundy Thursday 14 April at 12 noon.** 

While there will be opportunities for ordained and lay to renew their commitment, this year I am not asking for clergy or lay ministers to be robed and to process, but to take a place in the congregation. I expect there will be singing, communion, and an opportunity to be anointed – but we will have to be guided by circumstances nearer the time.

The Oil of Chrism will be blessed and there will be a chance to fill your church and personal containers. In addition to the Oil of Chrism, and this will be a change to recent past practice, there will be two further oils blessed and available afterwards: the Oil of the Sick and the Oil of Catechumens (for use at baptisms).

If you have oil from previous years, it might be the time to refresh stocks. While I am not superstitious about this, I am sure none of us would want to cause any offence and so I would ask you to dispose of old oil in a respectful and sensible way. It is perfectly acceptable to burn it or pour it into the ground.

COVID, and contingency planning for COVID, is still affecting much of what we do, and this is written recognising all arrangements may have to be revised at short notice.



# We are all equally human Andrew Metcalfe — April 5th, 2022

This debate has been present in New Zealand mainstream churches since the 1970s and has raged since 1991.

#### We are Ukraine

Heinke and Peter Matheson write:

It is important that we keep informed about the war in Ukraine, and attempt to enter into the human tragedy that is being enacted before our eyes. Yet it is also disempowering and dispiriting, in the literal sense of that word, to be a mere onlooker. This is no TV drama. Real people are suffering utterly terrible things. Other real people are planning a campaign which sends bombs and missiles down on everything from apartment blocks to maternity hospitals.

# So what do we do, what can we do, we who are so far away, we who hold none of the levers of power?

This is Lent, when we walk with Jesus of Nazareth towards Jerusalem. Radical evil was rampant then, too. And we know there are no easy answers.

Traditionally prayer and fasting have been an essential part of the Christian armoury. They both take us into the heart of the suffering and lead us beyond it. We are planning this modest fast every Friday as a way of bringing our bodies as well as our minds into play. Fasting disrupts the usual pattern of our day, and gives us a tiny insight into the total disruption of the lives of our brothers and sisters in Ukraine, children torn apart from their mothers and fathers, and seeing things no child should see. It is wonderful to observe the response of Polish and German folk among others opening up their homes to those in flight.

By fasting we can open up our hearts. The money saved from our usual meals can go to CWS or other aid agencies. WE CAN DO SOMETHING. It has been such a privilege to get to know some of our Ukrainian neighbours here, and to stand in solidarity with them. One small gesture is that in Dunedin we are wearing armbands which read: WE ARE UKRAINE. Fasting cements the link with Ukraine.

To do without solid foods for one day is a tiny thing. The Kingdom, however, is all about mustard seeds.

We look forward to hearing from all participants what the fasting has meant for you, what songs, gestures, new initiatives it has generated. We hope and pray that this war will not drag on too long, but the signs are not good, so we may be joining you on Fridays for some considerable time.



- We have an order of service that can be used for all services (attached below).
- Hymns and readings for each service are also attached (these will be updated for each specific date).

#### Who can join us for any of our services?

Any group (or individual) who can gather around a screen!

- a. In places where church services are only occasional, maybe two or three of you could meet together in someone's home and join us from there.
- b. Faith communities who don't "need" this but are open to trying something new may like to join us to support smaller groups. (Alexandra was an example of this).
- c. Ministry teams of small churches may simply like a week off from finding a priest and filling a roster.
- d. Individuals who, for whatever reason, cannot attend a regular service are also welcome to join us and share in spiritual communion if we cannot get the reserved sacrament to you.

If you let us know in advance, we can ensure reserved sacrament gets to any small gathering. If you are wanting to meet in your own church, Anne van Gend can work with you to provide and set up whatever equipment and internet connection is needed.

This is not meant to be a plan to replace communal, in person worship, but is offering an alternative to both assist some who can gather together but lack a preacher or priest, and for those unable to meet with others.

### Why Do this?

This is part of our ongoing commitment to find ways to support and minister with all those across our Diocese, with further services being planned for the 4th Sunday in April and possibly beyond. We are all aware that there are communities and individuals across our Diocese for whom running or attending a Sunday service can be difficult. There are the regular issues of finding a priest, filling a roster, overcoming distances and so on. With Covid-19 are added barriers, for example physical vulnerability or people needing to self-isolate.

# New Zealand COVID-19 Protection Framework (Traffic Lights): Diocese of Dunedin Response

#### **Highlights for All Levels**

#### **Level Red**

- All churches and faith communities advised to have contingency plans
- Limit of 200 people at any indoor gathering
- Face masks must be worn at all gatherings
- Meetings in private homes do not require face masks (but we recommend groups reach agreement on this)
- Medical grade masks must be worn by all leading and serving in worship services
- Strongly advising communion in one kind (bread) only and that people return to their seats to consume the bread.
- There is no requirement to scan in or for a business to display a QR code poster or have mandatory record keeping, but we are recommending this is kept in place for our settings.

#### **Level Orange**

- There is no limit for outdoor gatherings.
- There is no limit for indoor gatherings.
- You do not need to wear a face mask outdoors.
- Other face mask rules remain unchanged.
- There is no requirement to scan in or for a business to display a QR code poster or have mandatory record keeping.

#### **Level Green**

- There are no restrictions.
- We encourage you to keep up good health behaviours.

• There is no requirement to scan in or for a business to display a QR code poster or have mandatory record keeping.

#### **Good Health Behaviours**

#### These include:

- Wear a face mask
- Do it for each other
- Stay home if you are sick
- Wash your hands or use hand sanitiser
- Cough or sneeze into your elbow
- Clean or disinfect shared surfaces regularly
- Improve ventilation
- Keep your distance from people you do not know
- Keep track of where you have been
- Stay up to date with your vaccinations

#### **Our Response**

#### A note from Bishop Steve

Tēnā koutou Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

The letter to the Hebrews reminds us about having faith and "The Message" translation of Chapter 11 verses 1 and 2 reads:

The fundamental fact of existence is that this trust in God, this faith, is the firm foundation under everything that makes life worth living. It's our handle on what we can't see. The act of faith is what distinguished our ancestors, set them above the crowd.

Over the past 2 years we have all been affected by something we can't see, but as the current variation of COVID-19 makes its way around our communities, we continue to hold onto another firm foundation of faith that influences our response to everything taking place.

Of many lessons we have learnt, we now know so much more about how to keep ourselves safe than we did two years ago. There is nothing like a pandemic to sharpen up some of our health and safety practices!

As our country's response changes and New Zealand opens up itself more to each other and the wider world, I want to encourage us all to stay tuned into our own local communities needs and respond as we need to. This means that even though there may be fewer restrictions on what we are required to do, we will continue to keep our most vulnerable members safe by practicing good public health measures. This will ensure that our faith communities don't become "super spreader" sites. In many ways, this is similar to the Alert Level 2 precautions we had in place, where we figured out better and safer ways to worship.

If your faith community is feeling vulnerable and needs to take it easy around "opening up" completely i.e. you want to remain with vaccine pass only services for a while longer, you have my support for this. Alternatively, if you feel the time is right to move to a less restrictive setting (mixed serves where no vaccine passes are required), then you have my support for this as well. **Please advertise clearly what you are doing - and let Andrew or Nicola in the office know so we can update our on-line worship page.** Have your contingency plans in place if you have to change how you do things for a while: the office is happy to assist with Zoom links if you need to go back on-line for any gathering.

For those of you who are continuing to follow our advice around having Eucharist in one kind only (bread) you may like to take the opportunity this Easter to share the wine again, but with clear messaging that this is only for those who want to do so (please see below for more guidance around this).

Thank you for all that you have been doing to keep each other safe and caring for so many around you. As I write this our season of Lent is drawing to a close, we look forward to the day of resurrection where we recall how Christ has indeed overcome the old order of fear, sin and death. Thanks be to God!

#### **Our Guidance**

This guidance seeks to enable Faith Communities in our Diocese to maximise three key goals in an imperfect situation:

- to be as safe as possible;
- to be as inclusive as possible; (where "inclusive" is about welcome, pastoral care, sacramental ministry, and best-effort community participation); and
- to be as adaptive to local circumstances as possible.

Our response to the New Zealand COVID-19 Protection Framework ("Traffic Lights") framework put in place by the NZ Government is that:

- 1. All Faith Communities (parishes, regional deaneries, local churches and Cathedrals) must follow Government regulations.
- 2. Local arrangements (as permitted within the regulations) for services and other gatherings in each Faith Community are to be made by the Dean/Vicar(s)/Priest(s) in charge **and** Vestry/Church Committee/Greater Chapter.
- 3. "Gatherings" includes all meetings of groups, children's ministries, youth ministries, and ministries to the elderly which take place on church premises such as a church, hall or church lounge, or which take place in another venue hired by the church, such as a local community hall or a campsite for the purpose of holding a camp or retreat. They also include church gatherings in private homes (as already covered in our existing Action Plans).
- 4. There are no restrictions to attending indoor gatherings of up to 200 people, but some may continue to offer Vaccine Pass Only services. Faith Communities who wish to offer a service or services or other gatherings, for which each attendee needs to present a vaccination pass, are encouraged to do so. <a href="Download the NZ Pass Verifier">Download the NZ Pass Verifier</a>
- **5. Each Faith Community must advertise its own services clearly** (e.g. on their website, social media, church noticeboards, newspaper advertising, via the <u>Diocesan Website</u>) so that attendees understand whether the service or gathering they are planning to attend will or will not require a vaccination pass to be presented by each attendee.
- 6. In any situation where doubt as to the application of these guidelines arises, or difference of viewpoint within a Faith Community cannot be resolved, consultation with the Archdeacon should take place. Where necessary the Archdeacon will consult with the Bishop. **The Bishop's decision on any**

#### **Principles for Worship at All Settings**

- a. At the Red and Orange settings, the wearing of face masks is required in all indoor gatherings, including when singing.
- b. **In services with Singers in a choir or music group**, participants may sing without a mask, providing the choir or music group is at least 2m distant from other persons present in the service.
- c. All Workers and volunteers (Clergy, people with a lay license) must wear a medical grade facemask (for example a Type IIR/Level 2 mask or above) while working in public facing roles. These include the widely available 'blue' medical grade mask.
- d. **Face masks may be removed temporarily** by a person leading parts of the service, reading Scripture, leading intercessions, giving notices or preaching; the presider at eucharist/communion and any assistant at communion may be masked through the Great Thanksgiving when not speaking and during distribution of communion to the people.

#### e. Eucharist/Communion

- All presiders and servers must practice good hand hygiene. This means washing or sanitising hands before ablutions (ritual purification) and handling/distributing any sacraments.
- Eucharist in one kind (bread only) at Red until Easter 2022. This recognises that we are in a situation where community transmission is taking place of COVID-19 or any highly contagious variant. Make sure that when communion is offered that people are under no compulsion to take it some may be more comfortable with receiving in one kind only or requesting a blessing.
- We recommend people receive the Eucharist while standing. This avoids any contact with altar rails.
- Any president at Eucharist/Communion can restrict communion to one kind only if there are any concerns about the presence of COVID-19 in the community.
- f. **Good Health Behaviours: we recommend these are followed at all times (see above).** Previous guidance from the Diocese concerning non-contact forms of The Peace, hygiene, ministry to children, youth, the elderly, as previously issued for **COVID-19 Alert Level 2** or subsequently updated should be followed.
- g. **Meetings in private homes do not require face masks**, but we recommend groups reach agreement on this, recognising that current COVID-19 variants are more transmissible.
- h. **Hospitality:** If you are operating a **gathering[1]**, you can serve food and drink at Green, Orange or Red. We are not recommending offering of indoor hospitality at Level Red if there is active transmission in the community.

**Please note:** where Government Guidance talks about 1-metre physical distancing and capacity limits: Capacity limits are based on the maximum number of people who could occupy the space if each person was 1 metre apart. People do not have to keep 1 metre apart at the venue. In some cases a maximum number is also specified. The limits include everyone, including children, in a defined space, except workers.

#### Leaders in Ministry (Clergy and Lay)

The Bishop has previously indicated that all lay people involved in public-facing public ministries related to a worship service or other parish/church work must be fully vaccinated at vaccination-only services or gatherings and when performing other work where vaccination is required. Such people include ushers, readers, ministers of the Eucharist, collectors, those leading liturgies of the Word, and undertaking Communion to the sick and home visitation. It also includes people involved in ministry with children and young people under the age of 18 years.

Priests who were not fully vaccinated were, under previous public health orders, significantly constrained in their ministry and were asked to confirm their vaccination status to be able to continue ministry.

We are currently seeking advice around this as settings are adjusting: if there are any queries around this, please contact Bishop Steve though his EA, Nicola Wong ph. 03 488 0826.

#### Suggested publicity for pew sheets and posters

We are now operating under the New Zealand COVID-19 Protection Framework (Traffic Lights). The current traffic light setting is (*Green, Orange, Red*).

The following Mixed Service(s) are open to everyone, but precautions are in place: (replace these words with your details). Please continue to sanitise/wash your hands, scan or sign in for local contact tracing purposes. You must wear a mask at all times and keep 1 meter distance from others. There will be maximum numbers we can have at any service in the Red setting of 200. Communion may be in one kind only at Red – please take the bread back with you to your seat to consume.

The following service(s) are open to anyone with a current Vaccine Pass: (replace these words with your details). There are no restrictions, but you must wear a face mask and give each other plenty of room. We are asking that you keep your face mask on when singing. Please show us your vaccine pass, continue to sanitise/wash your hands, scan or sign in for local contact tracing purposes.

[1] Gathering means a group of people who are intermingling. This does not include people who remain at least 2 metres away from each other so far as is reasonably practical. Services at a place of worship, or a prayer group in an individual's home are an example of a gathering.

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# A passion for Social Justice?

As annual general meeting season is upon us and faith communities are looking at who can take on particular roles, the Social Justice Committee is keen to connect with more Social Justice representatives.

#### Ondine Godtschalk, chair of the Social Justice Committee writes:

The Social Justice Committee would like to ask that as parishes -faith communities approach their AGMs and elect their vestries, they should consider having someone with a 'social justice portfolio'.

Some faith communities do this already. But we are keen for there to be someone on each vestry who would be a social justice advocate and who the social justice committee could potentially make contact with during the year.

With AGMs currently underway, the committee has asked me to write to each parish to both encourage this and to invite parishes to let us know who that person would be.

The annual returns to the Diocesan Office have a place where such a person can be identified, but sometimes this is left blank. Can you prayerfully consider this and identify who could be your person?

A reminder that it doesn't have to be someone on your Vestry - there may be another person who has a passion for Social Justice, but they do need to be able to help keep Social Justice on the agenda of your Faith Community's leadership group. A Vestry identified portfolio is the best place to start.

<u>Church Works With Student Groups To Host Pride Service</u>: Last Sunday, St. Paul's Cathedral hosted a "queer-affirming reflective service" alongside Dunedin Pride, the Student Christian Movement and representatives from St. Hilda's Collegiate School. **Foodbanks struggling to keep up with surge in demand**: Dunedin foodbanks are struggling as Covid-19 and inflation hit New Zealanders in the back pocket — and winter is still to come (ODT, 24 March 2022).

<u>Food Support Demand Increases by 400%</u>: Since the Omicron outbreak began, the Wellington City Mission has experienced a 400% increase in demand for food support. 
