Message From The Principal

Mid-point of Term It seems hard to believe, but we are past the mid-

point of this term already. Internal assessment is well underway for our senior students, and we have already checked off several start-of-year 'markers', such as College Athletics Prelims and Orientation Morning. The latter involves personnel marketing clubs, sports and cultural teams and activities to our student body.



This always takes place on the chessboard. 50-plus activities are on offer so our students are spoilt for choice.

As I stress to all our students, it is often the involvement in extra-curricular activities that create secondary school memories, rather than any specific lesson content

01 March 2023 Roll Return

Our 01 March Roll Return to the Ministry of Education had our student body at 1297.

This growing roll generates extra staffing, extra funding and, of course, enables us to offer a full range of subject choices. Increasing numbers can present challenges in terms of hiring suitably qualified staff and, at its most basic, having enough classroom space.

However, we are fully staffed for this year and, with the Rangitata Block being available for the 2024 year, this will ease the pressure on our classroom timetable.

Rangitata Block

Our Rangitata Block now has foundations completed and trusses being completed. With the architects and staff we are still working on finalising the plans for Block 2, and the finalised Master Plan for the whole campus. However, this will be influenced by financial pressures such as the impact of Cyclone Gabrielle, and we acknowledge that financial priorities may be altering.

Regional Employment Initiatives

There are a couple of regional employment initiatives that we are engaging with to boost employment.

The first of these is a trial by MSD (Ministry of Social Development) to support young people in our region to get their driver's licence. For a young person to have at least their restricted licence, which means they can then drive themselves to work, will cost them in excess of \$250 and it's a lengthy process.

MSD has provided our region with a considerable sum of money which will pay for the cost of a student's Learners or Restricted licence. This removes a possible major barrier to employment.

Our region was chosen because we have significant employment opportunities but no public transport. If this trial is successful, it may well be rolled out to other regions within New Zealand. The second initiative is a co-operation with a Mayoral Task Force for

Employment. This is targeting young people who aren't in education or employment currently. For many of them the biggest barrier presenting is anxiety. For a number of young people, making a telephone call to a possible

employer or fronting up to an interview is their barrier to them gaining As a College we are fully supportive of this initiative, as having young


