The 1977 college cricket matches begin this week with the First Eleven playing St. Patrick's College, Wellington. The scene for this encounter will be an area of ground known to the hearts of many Wellingtonians as 'The Basin'. Situated near the centre of the Capital City it has been the ground on which many players have performed with distinction for Province or New Zealand. Mr. Bob Monteith, Wellington and Test cricket umpire will be controlling the game as he has done so generously for many years.

The team for the 1977 college year has played its first two games in the Saturday Premier Grade with success. An outright against Cashmere and a 40 over limited win against Burnside High School. Positive batting, good ground fielding, and an ability to work together have contributed to the good showing to date.

We wish Gerard McDonald and his team well in Wellington and look forward to next week when they meet Silverstream College on the Bedean Oval.





The Boeing that you see take off from Christchurch International Airport this afternoon at 4.45 pm will be carrying the First Eleven to Wellington. When they take their turn at the crease this is how the team will line up:

Kevin McGrath - Opening batsman. Joined First Eleven first term last year in game against Christchurch Boys' High. Highest score 53 against Cashmere High School.

Donald Bamford - Left hand opening bat. Canty Senior 2 rep last year. Made valuable 33 against Burnside last week. Can be distinguished by fluffy hat.

Andrew McGuire - Number 3 left hand batsman. 'Mags' top scored with 56 against St. Andrew's on Saturday. Developing into a run saving fieldsman often diving into the flight of the ball.

Gerard McDonald - 'Skip' has had a lot of cricket this season. Played ffor Canterbury Under 16 side and picked for the South Island team. Made 83 against Cashmere High. Fields with ability at covers. Hopes to make it a double in the college games. Has led side to two wins.

Stephen Mackle - Only boarder in the side. Wicket keeper who held five in first innings against Cashmere High. Has represented Clandeboye and Canty Under 15. Nick C'Connor will pay him for every College game catch. Made 23 against Burnside last week at Number five.

Stephen McCormick - 'Fred' likes to hit the ball hard. Made 75 not out against Cashmere and 49 against St. Andrew's on Saturday. He will bowl some sort of leg breaks if reguired. Fielded better aginst St. Andrew's.

Simon Kane - Vice-Captain of the side. Conscientious all rounder who (s)mashed Cashmere taking 6 for 17. Has been working on the batting and hoped to be on form in the two college games. Canty rep. 1976.

Chris Kennedy - Youngest member of the side but makes his presence felt with the off spinners. Canty rep last year. Bats correctly often wearing down the bowlers with perseverence. Can provide stability to an innings. Fields close in near the bat.

Jeremy McGuire - Second college game and only full member of 1976 side left., A left arm opening bowler who has improved his technique and is reaping more wickets. Another who likes to hit the ball hard when required. Has a number of not outs this season (7). Still rembers his 43 against Lancaster Park, at the Oval. 'The Basin' boundaries are bigger, though.


Stephen Smith - 'Smithy' shares the opening bowling attack with Jeremy McGuire. Has been successful taking 3 wickets a game regularly. Official team scorer on Saturdays. An average of 7.1 runs a wickets

Jeremy Simons - Left arm leg spinner who turns the ball a lot. Has not had a happy season with a nagging shoulder injury. Hopes to be amongst the wickets at the Basin. Takes exceptionally good catches at first slip. Has developed his cricket by hard work since the days of 14.5. games over three years ago.

Chris Power - Tall, thin opening bowler of the Second Eleven who took 5 for 26 at Papanui High school on Saturday. A tidy fielder. Chris will be 12th man for the side in Wellington.

The batting has been steady, the bowling up to standard, and the fielding up to the standard expected of St. Bede's College First Eleve sides. With the spirit of the side so far this could be the year to see the first result for some three years, the other games being drawn during this time.

Father John Weir - the Rector of St. Patrick's College in Wellington is the coach of their First Eleven. Father was on the staff of St. Bede's in 1974 and 1975.



At the end of the Athletic Sports which finished on Wednesday, our reporter approached Father Scambary who is not only in charge of Athletics, but is also the Sportsmaster, and asked him for his comments on the Athletic Sports for 1977. His reply:

"I was thrilled with the number of boys who participated in so many Track and Field events at these Annual Athletic Sports. House enthusiasm was marvellous, wasn't it. Believe it or not, 263 events were contested over the 12 hours that it took to complete the sports. We were blessed with good weather;

even the 16 minutes drizzle on Wednesday afternoon did not dampen our spirits."

There is an impressive Trophy called the SAN AGATHA CUP: it is presented each year to the Christchurch Boys' Sthowl which provides the winning crew in the SENIOR EIGHTS event at the annual Rowing Competition. That crew is entitled to the designation "Head of the River" for that season - an EIGHT can defeat any other crew; SENIORS can, presumably, beat any other grade of oarsmen. The Cup was presented in the mid-sixties by Mr. and Mrs A. T. Ramsay.

It is said that during the last week a young Bedean was trying to sell Raffle tickets in support of our Sports' teams, especially Rowing. His prospective customer is reported to have asked "When is the Head of the River?" The sales-boy, apparently, didn't even know that the River had a Head, let alone "When" it might have one....! That boy had not read his BEDEAN TIMES last week; in that edition there was the date of the local rowing competition.

So, let ALL take note this week: NEXT SATUSDAY, the 12th. our Crews will engage once more in friendly rivalry with Crews from Christ's College, Christchurch Boys' High School, St. Andrew's College, Hillmorton and Shirley High Schools and, even, Timaru College. Racing will start at 11.00 a.m. and will include all the grades in FOURS and EIGHTS, ending with the prestige race - the SENIOR EIGHTS at round about 2.45 p.m. The SAN AGATA CUP is at stake once more....it is hoped that the Trophy will be presented to the winning Crew by the Mayor.

Who will win it in 1977? Earlier years have resulted in wins for Christchurch Boys's High in 1968; Christ's College in 1969, 1971, 1972 and 1974; St. Bede's in 1966, 1967, 1970, 1973, 1975, 1976. Can we win it for a seventh time and make a new record with a three-in-a-row series? Our coach and crew have put in hours of patient and generous effort; they are quietly confident of success. Don't forget to be there on the banks on Saturday to cheer them on...this is a BEDEAN effort. But we want to be true sportsmen in our attempt to win; we seek no unfair advantage. And in that connection there is one very important point for all spectators to note: crews about to race are usually under some strain; they have also to give careful attention to the starter's instructions and listen carefully for the gun - the signal that the race is on. Spectators, therefore, especially those who may be on the banks close to the starting point, must show consideration and courtesy for both rowers and officials. Therefore, NO SHOUTING, NO CHEERING until the race is actually under way....then, certainly, give voice in full in your efforts to encourage your own College crew.

Some of our SENIOR EIGHT crew will already have tried to carry off the SENIOR FOURS title also...we hope that will not tire them too much; it should be a useful warm-up exercise. As noted last week our hopes are in the care of:

ROBBIE MEATES, the only member of last year's Senior Eight to be back with us; one of many Meates's in the Rowing squad.

GREG HILL, who is following in the footsteps of his older brother Terry who was in last year's crew;

GRAHAM GALLEN, who organises many things and stirs others to greater enthusiasm;


DANNY POWER, also a man with a name very well represented in Bede's rowing;

Simon Kane batting with more assurance shared a 6th wicket partnership of 62 runs with Stephen McCormick. Stephen was unlucky not to reach his half century failing by one run. He hit 10 fours in his stay at the crease. The innings was declared closed at 4.40 pm 9 for 216. The runs were hard to get because of the excellent fielding of the St. Andrew's side.

At stumps on the first day they were 1 for 62 in reply. Jeremy McGuire timing a throw in contributed in a run out. It is hoped that a break through will some early next week to take first innings points.



Dear Boys,

Tomorrow we set off on the first stage of our walk into basecamp, which will take about 25 days. There are the inevitable last minute hassles - some of our gear sent from New Zealand has not yet arrived, including our windproof suits and overboots. The latter are the most serious, as without good overboots, there is more risk of frostbite. And it takes so long to get a message to N.Z. to find out where the foul-up has occurred. The first problem is the Indian manager of Air India. He nods knowingly as we outline our problem, assures us that he understands perfectly what the trouble is, and then assures us that the airline keeps no track of baggage. We know that he does not really mean this - any airline that carried on like that would be out of business in no time - but we cannot offend his dignity by telling him that he has misunderstood the whole story. So we leave, and return in two hours, by which time we have a way of telling the story differently. This time he does understand, but tells us that it will be four days - perhaps a fortnight - before he has a reply to his telegram, .. then he smile bearingly. And so it goes on..

As some of you will remember, we packed a lot of food in New Zealand, but the rest, which we have bought here has proved surprisingly expensive - almost \$2,000. The local for is cheap, but full of diseases for Westerners, and we are all in trouble with upset stomachs. Remember us in your prayers and Masses - all the locals think we're mad.
