He won a silver medal in the 1km time trial event at the 2000 Summer Paralympics in Sydney, and was the first double amputee to reach the summit of Mount Everest. In addition to his athletic and academic accomplishments. Mark also serves as a goodwill ambassador for the Everest Rescue Trust, founded Limbs4All, a charitable trust based in New Zealand, and created a line of sports drinks and energy gels called PeakFuel.
