## **Deputy Principal Message**

#### **College's New Build**

It is exciting to see the progress the builders, Hawkins, are making with timber framing now progressing along the building. Soon we will be able to take staff on a tour of the Rangitata Block so they can visually see how big their rooms and spaces are. This block will be home to Science, Maths, Drama, Arts and Te Whare Manaaki.



Menorlue is also having a make-over and in doing

framing. It is amazing to see the history of the building and, where a new door is to be put, it appears there has previously been one in that space! Menorlue will have its 'bones' made good again, with sound-proofing in the walls and the reinstating of original features being undertaken

before it gets a paint inside and out. This will be sympathetic to the age of the building and blend in with the new build. It is pleasing to see a piece of history retained on-site for the Music Department to use.

#### **Future Building Activity**

The contractors have had little impact on the running of the school to date but, in the next couple of months, the pipework is to be laid from the new build area to the heating and cooling unit. This means a 5-metre trench is being dug alongside S Block and around the Chessboard to the new heating and cooling hub by the Library. This hub is currently under construction. There will be some redirection of paths for students to walk on, for a short time.

sheds has been demolished and the ground-work is in place for the one new changing shed. Portable changing sheds have been put in to cater for needs, in the interim. There are no plans to change or build new gymnasiums at this stage and, once the work is completed, there will be just the one changing shed.

#### Moving from S Block to the Rangitata Block

With a finish date at this stage for the Rangitata Block of 16 November 2023, there will be a flurry of activity to move furniture, equipment and resources into the new block when the senior students leave at year end. Commercial movers will be employed to do most of this.

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### **Target Shooting Outdoor Nationals** Successes and New Zealand Selections for Charlotte and Phoebe McKenzie

During the week of 20-25 February the Target Shooting New Zealand (TSNZ) Outdoor Nationals were held at the Burnett Range, McLean's Island, Christchurch; and were hosted by the local club Canterbury Outdoor Target Shooting. Incidentally, this was the 1974 **Commonwealth Games Shooting Range.** 

Charlotte and Phoebe McKenzie were the only Mid Canterburybased competitors, supported by local and Ashburton College Coach, Bryan Hunter. For Phoebe it was her first Outdoor Nationals while Charlotte was a returning competitor.

#### The Competition

Outdoor Shooting is the international discipline of the Target Shooting sport and has a 50 metre range. Competitors shoot 60 shot matches, over 75 minutes, which includes 15 minutes of sighting and preparation time and then 60 minutes for the match.

The duration of the match, and the introduction of weather conditions, make this very demanding for competitors, both physically and mentally. These matches then aggregate each day across the week and from them prizes and national teams are selected.

The week started at 30 degrees of heat with a strong mirage, and then the southerly arrived and produced matches with heavy rain and blustery 40-50kph winds. Suffice to say this was challenging and had even the most seasoned campaigners below their usual score range after the Wednesday matches.

Charlotte had a steady match to open on Tuesday and a good match on Thursday but was somewhat unlucky to strike the worst of the southerly on Wednesday, which impacted her overall aggregate. Her shot selection across the matches was described as excellent, showing both patience and skill.

Phoebe had a sound opening on Tuesday, and a steady match on Thursday. On Wednesday, she beat the worst of the southerly and also shot superbly, in very fickle and building conditions, for a really great score. Her final aggregate was really pleasing, especially for someone relatively new to the discipline. Like Charlotte, she was patient and measured across the matches and she was well- rewarded for this.



New Zealand Junior (Under 21) Team and South Island Open Team Selection

Further to the above, the girls were both selected to the New Zealand Junior Under 21 team against Great Britain for International Match Day on Saturday.

Phoebe further shot for the South Island Open Team (in an historic win against the North Island). We are reliably advised that the last time that happened Phoebe wasn't even alive!

Additionally, Phoebe also shot for the New Zealand Slazenger Open Team against Australia.

Her successes over the week were certainly a super effort.

Charlotte also provided a reliable score in her official Designated match, where she is chasing further international selection, which will be announced after additional selection matches in a couple of months.

#### **Individual Graded Matches**

Amongst the competition were individual graded matches in which Phoebe took out the D Grade aggregate and Charlotte finished well in C Grade.

#### **Best Graded Association Team 1st Prize Winners**

Both Charlotte and Phoebe also combined with fellow Canterbury Outdoor Target Shooting member Sean Moriarty for the Association Teams match, taking out first prize for the best Graded Association team.
