5. History: Matua Sam

I am going to start my conversation with this whakataukī.

My language is my awakening,

My language is the window into my soul,

My language is my korowai/cloak.

This whakataukī illustrates the depth of language to the identity of you as person.

What is Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori?

Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori is a week for people to celebrate te reo Māori. All are welcomed to take part. This week encourages and celebrates:

- Speaking Māori
- Taking part in Māori games
- Taking part in waiata and haka
- Learning the history of the Māori world

Even saying "Kia ora" is contributing towards supporting Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori. I want to thank you all for your continuing support. I also welcome you all to support this treasure known as Te Reo Māori.

History

In the 1970s, interested groups gathered about the survival of te reo Māori. The groups gathered to think about formatting a petition to be sent to parliament.

The petition that was formed called for 3 things:

- 1. For the national recognition and revitalisation of te reo Māori.
- Māori language and customs to be put in schools throughout New Zealand, as a treasure for unity.
- 3. A day needed to seek out to celebrate te reo Māori.

Over 30,000 people signed the petition for te reo Māori. And then, it was decided that the 14th of September would be chosen as Te Rā o Te Reo Māori. It was 3 years later that it became Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori.

10 years had passed since approval was given to establish Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori. In 1985, a group of experts in Māori language was established, they were known as "Ngā Kaiwhakapūmau i Te Reo Māori".

He Wiki tēnei mō he hui rongonui ki te kōreo Māori, ki te mahi kēmu Māori, ki te Waiata Māori, ki te Haka Māori, ki te whakarongo, ki te hītori o te Reo Māori o Aotearoa, ki te tautoko te Reo Māori. Me mihi ki te nuinga o ngā tāngata e karanga mai ana, "Kia Ora", kia a koutou katoa. Te Whānau o tēnei Kura rongonui, tēnā koutou mō tō tautoko o Te Wiki o Te Reo

Māori. Nau mai, Haere mai Kia haere tahi tātou ki te tautoko te taonga nei, Te Reo Māori o Aotearoa.

Hītori

Ka Huihui ngā Rōpu. Ka tae ki ngā tau Kotahi mano, e iwa Rau, e whiti tekau. Ka rongo te ao i te karanga me Hui-a-Iwi, ki te rapū whai oranga mō te orapito o Te Reo Māori. Ā, ka whakakotahi ngā rōpu Māori, Ka whakaaro, me tono rātou i tētahi "Petihana ki te Pāremata." He Petihana mō te Pāremata - mō te aha ? Mō te Whakaaetanga-a-Mōtu mō te Reo Māori anā, mō te whakahautia o te Reo Māori. Ka tīmata tētahi "Petihana." Ngā Pātai mō te Petihana i roto i te "Petihana" te karanga. Me uru Te Reo Māori me ngā Tikanga Māori i roto i ngā Kura katoa o Aotearoa, hei taonga ki te whakakotahi tātou, anā, me kimihia he "Rā ki te whakanui" i te Reo Māori. Hunga tuhi o rātou ingoa i runga ake, te toru tekau mano ngā Tāngata i hainatia te "Petihana mō te Reo Māori". Ko te tekau mā whā o Mahuru Kotahi mano, e Iwa Rau, e Whitu tekau mā Rua te Tau - koinā "Te Rā" mō te tīmatanga o te "Rā mō te Reo Māori."

They decided to format a solution to the Waitangi Tribunal;

- 1. That Māori language be recognised as an official language of Aotearoa,
- 2. That a department to focus on Te Reo Māori be formed

In 1987, the response from the Waitangi Tribunal was that Māori be recognised as an official language in Aotearoa, and that a Māori language commission be established to protect and develop te reo Māori in Aotearoa.

Why do we celebrate for just a week? Should it be 1 month? 1 year? A decade? Or a century? Aotearoa is revitalising Māori language, and part of that journey is:

- 1. To Acknowledge and celebrate our success in promoting te reo Māori.
- 2. We all need to celebrate the followed dreams of ancestors.
- 3. It is a focused time for everyone participate in te ao Māori.
- 4. It is a platform for us to celebrate, collaborate and to develop te reo Māori.

Let us not forget those who greet us with "kia ora", the age-old call of greetings. We thank you. Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori allows us to work together as Tangata Whenua and Tangata Tiriti for the wellness of Aotearoa.

By being immersed in Te Ao Māori, everyone is given a chance to experience:

- 1. A rich culture Waiata, Kai, Haka.
- Another perspective Mātauranga Māori.
- The ability to grow at your own pace on your own Te Reo Māori Journey – You are your own Chief.

By caring for each other Tangata whenua, tangata Tiriti. We can work together to build and create a future for Aotearoa. We can travel together in peace and love.

I te tau, kotahi mano, e iwa rau, e waru tekau mā whitu, ka whiwhi katoa ngā hiahia mō te reo Māori, hei reo tūturu mō Aotearoa, ā, ka tū he rōpu āwhina/tiaki te reo Māori, Te Taura Whiri i Te Reo Māori. Kua tūtuki pai ngā mōemōea a o tātou tupuna mō te reo Māori.

He aha te rōanga o te wā ki te whakanui i te Reo Māori? He Wiki Kotahi. Kōina noiho? He aha te take mēnā? He kotahi marama pea? He kotahi tau pea? Tekau tau pea? He Rautau pea? Kei te whakahautia a Aotearoa i te Reo Māori me whakanui tātou, kua tutuki pai ngā moemoeā, ā, o te Reo Māori. Ko Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori he Atamira mō tātou katoa ki te whakapau kaha, pēnei: Whakanui Whakawhitiwhiti kōrero/whakaaro, Whakatinana ngā āhua katoa o te Reo Māori o Aotearoa. Mēnā, ka karanga te Tangata Kia Ora, me mihi tātou, ka tika. Tangata Whenua/Tangata Tiriti: Ko Te Wiki o te Reo Māori he Atamira ki te "whakatungakaunui" i waenganui i te Tangata Whenua me te Tangata Tiriti ki te mahitahi mō te oranga o Aotearoa.
