Social Media

Over the term break we have once again seen some inappropriate use of social media and although, as a school, we have little to no control over this in the home, we do feel a need to let you know this is happening and what you, as parents, could be trying to do about it. The NETSAFE event on Monday the 3rd August in Hawarden will be well worth your time to attend and of course, having conversations with your child about what they are using, how they are using it and who they are connected to is critical to ensure your child is in a safe space. We are seeing an increased trend of inappropriate messaging from outside of our community (sometimes far outside) as children connect far wider than perhaps before, so it is often not as simple as calling the other parent and having a chat and it is very possible you as a parent will not know the individual concerned.

In our work with students, dealing with such occurrences, we try to keep it simple.

- 1) Screen shot it for evidence.
- 2) Tell someone who can help.
- 3) Don't reply or engage in anyway.

4) Block them.

Try not to think about this as a technological problem.

- 1) It really isn't, and
- 2) If you try and keep up with tech you will invariably fail. We are way beyond Facebook these days!

If your child has compassion and empathy for others, this will apply in the digital world and real world. If they feel secure in themselves, they are more resilient to such things and more able to deal with them. Also, these things happen when you are NOT present! If you allow your child access overnight to their phone, make sure you are secure, they have the skills and maturity to manage the messages that may come and if not, overnight charging in the parents' bedroom is always a great option. The parent in me often wishes all this technology would simply go away. The realist however, tells me to manage it the best I can as it is here to stay.


INSTRUCTIONS FOR PARENTS TO ACCESS THE PARENT PORTAL (MUSAC EDGE)

1. Google - Edge Caregiver login:



- Type in your email address (you should have registered this with us) and press FORGOT PASSWORD.
- A link will be sent to your email, follow those instructions. Once you have done this log out of Edge online
- 4. Download the MUSAC Edge app from the app store on to your mobile phone.
- 5. Login to the downloaded app with the email address and password you just set up on the online version.
- 6. Enter a 4-digit pin (which you make up, if it asks for one).

If you do not have any information showing, you will need to register your email address with us. Please send an email to office@amuri.school.nz with the words EDGE in the subject line and we will add it to our SMS programme. We will send you a brief email once we have loaded it. (If it still doesn't work, try deleting the app and reloading it.)
