Health & Safety

- YMCA provide qualified instructors for all day time activities.
- YMCA provide risk management plans for all instructor-led activities.
- Westmere RAMS form for all other times.
- Parents allocated to each activity and cabin group.
- Teachers roving to support and oversee.

Health & Safety

- Info on file at camp
- Camp Doctor
- Teacher in Charge: Di
- Medication: Parents are required to bring medication labelled with name and dosage, hand in at medical station and fill in form.
- Hand sanitiser for use before eating, as extra precaution, not replacement for hand-washing.
- Day packs for tramp need medication required for that day in them, eg. Asthma Inhaler.

Vulnerable Children's Act

Health & Safety

- New Vulnerable Children's Act all schools are required to Police Vet all persons working with children.
- Ministry of Education recommends that we do so as best practice, especially if the volunteers will be alone with students or have overnight contact with children.
- Police Checks are taking approximately 4 weeks to process.
- All parents who would like to come to camp are asked to complete a police check now so there are no disappointments.

Camp Rules & Routines

- At all times treat people, property and the environment with respect.
- The phone is for emergency use only, by teachers and other adults.
- Persistent misbehaviour will result in children being sent home from camp.

Food

- Camp caterers will provide breakfast, lunch and dinner
- We provide morning, afternoon teas and supper
- We will notify the caterers and parents arranging food of allergies
- We will ask for this information on forms you will fill in closer to camp

Cost

The cost for each child to attend camp is \$285. This includes:

- Rental for mudslide, burma trail, glow worms, camp fire.
