How should we respond to Te Tiriti o Waitangi today? Andrew Metcalfe — February 13th, 2024

At the Diocesan Council meeting on Tuesday 13 February, members reflected on recent Waitangi day events and some of the debate initiated by the Act Party's request to bring a Bill to Parliament.

World Day of Prayer 1 March 2024 Ady Shannon - Touchstone — February 12th, 2024

World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation led by women which enables us to hear the thoughts, hopes, concerns and prayers of women from all parts of the world. Read on for details about a Dunedin service....

How to Participate this year

On Friday 1 March 2024 people will gather in 146 countries to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Palestine. It begins in Samoa and travels through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later.

In Dunedin, there is a WDP service for Dunedin West Churches at St John's Roslyn, 373 Highgate on Friday 1st March.

This is of course an ecumenical service.

Dunedin West has participants from Mornington, Highgate and Flagstaff Presbyterian churches as well as the Mornington Methodist Church. Everyone is welcome.

Details:

10:00 a.m. for a cuppa and fellowship

10:30 a.m. for start of the service.

In Invercargill, the WDP Service is at Lindisfarne this year at 10am.

Preparation for the day is enormous. A New York based international committee works in collaboration with national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans.

If you are holding a service please let the NZ WDP National Committee know (wdpnz@xtra.co.nz) as they are often asked for details of services from people who wish to attend.

Each year the service for World Day of Prayer (WDP) is prepared by women from a different country. On Friday 1 March 2024 people in 146 countries will celebrate the service prepared by a group of ecumenical Christian Palestinian women.

In 2017 the Christian women of Palestine were chosen to prepare the service for World Day of Prayer 2024. At the time, the international committee could not have foreseen how that decision, and the theme "I beg you, bear with one another in love" Ephesians 4:1-3 would resonate with the situation currently unfolding in Palestine.

On Saturday 2 December 2023 at 4.00pm New York time (5am Sunday NZ time) a WDP Global Conversation included representatives from the Palestine National WDP Committee involved in preparing the 2024 service. Their work - in the planning phase for several years - has been affected by the coronavirus pandemic. It has taken on a new significance, given unfolding events in Gaza and the West Bank where more than 25,000 people, many women and children, have been killed in indiscriminate attacks since 7 October 2023.

Three representatives from the NZ WDP planning committee participated in the online forum where Palestinian committee members shared personal stories of the loss and devastation they have suffered over recent months.

The Global Conversation – WDP service planners talk

WDP executive committee member, Maral Haidostian, opened the hour-long global conversation by providing context to the development of the service. Planning was initially impacted by the global coronavirus pandemic and then war denied members of the committee the ability to meet in person. She introduced other members of the executive committee and welcomed the global audience - tuning in live from all over the world – saying, "May God's peace and reconciliation prevail."

Australian-based Vicki Marney, WDP committee representative from the Pacific region, gave an overview of the process undertaken every five years to confirm the writer country selected to write the service and prepare resources for future iterations of WDP. The purpose is to ensure "that the voices of sisters all around the world are heard" and that the writer committee is well supported in their mission. In reference to the situation currently taking place in Palestine, Vicky said, "Prior to the pandemic we could not foresee God's plans. The committee now finds itself in a place they might never have imagined."

Rev Sally Azar, Chair of the WDP Committee, became the first ordained female Palestinian pastor in the Holy Land in 2023. Since 2017 she has worked alongside 17 other Palestinian Christian women to write the liturgy for WDP 2024. The group divided themselves into committees tasked with various aspects of the service e.g. music, worship liturgy and Bible study. Rev Azar said, "The service reflects the authenticity of the voices of all the women involved in preparing resources."

In August 2023, the committee gathered for a strengthening workshop in in Beit Jala, near Jerusalem. During a two-day retreat, the group of Christian women representing many denominations worked on the service, and visited St Martha's House, Bethlehem. As the gathering occurred on a Thursday, the group collectively celebrated the importance of *Thursdays in Black*, a movement that stands against violence towards women.

A Daily Struggle Being a Christian in the Holy Land

Each of the WDP committee representatives reiterated their pride in being a Christian Palestinian existing in the Holy Land. They also emphasised the difficulties associated with living as a minority group, experiencing aggression and hostility daily. Sharing their struggles and comforting each other in love, as defined by the 2024 WDP theme, enabled them to speak out, comfort each other and move forward in their daily lives and in their WDP preparations. The universal language of love was the main line of communication used throughout the planning and preparation.

Shireen Awwad, a member of the WDP Palestine committee residing on the outskirts of Bethlehem, was candid, emotional and brutally honest as she spoke about the situation in Gaza from a deeply personal perspective. Two of her aunts were sheltering in a church that was attacked; one was killed and the other severely injured. The injured woman subsequently underwent surgery without anaesthetic and her recovery has been compromised by a lack of rehabilitation. Shireen's uncle died because he was not able to get a routine operation.

Parents write their children's names on their hands or legs as a way of identifying them as many people killed in the incessant bombing are being buried without being identified. Shireen talked about the carnage that ensued when an ancient historic Greek Orthodox Church, in which many were taking sanctuary, was bombed.

As the indigenous Christian population of Palestine is being forced to leave Gaza, her fear is that their churches will become museum pieces – no longer places of worship for the small, courageous and brave Christian community. Her moving commentary was supported by graphic images showing scenes of devastation, mass graves and raw human grief.

"It is a sad situation and there is no justification that Israel can continue doing what they are doing now. There is no safe place The only solution now is to pray."

Shireen's plea for world action to encourage Israel to stop the inhumane attacks that represent "a collective punishment on all civilians because of Hamas," must include peace and justice. "Peace without justice is not peace."

The artwork: 'Praying Palestinian Women'

The artwork 'Praying Palestinian Women,' is by Halima Aziz, a Palestinian visual artist and design student based in Germany. Born in Hagen, Germany in 1999, Halima grew up in Palestine. Following the war in 2008, her family moved back to Germany. Halima had an interest in art from an early age and started painting professionally in 2017.

Halima has used motifs and symbols which indicate the origin and cohesiveness of these women. Olive trees are a sign of everlasting and abundant life because they can live for thousands of years. The Palestinian people are deeply rooted in their country and this is underlined by the golden roots of the tree. Poppy flowers are a reminder of loved ones who have given their lives for their country. Traditional Palestinian dress symbolises the people's creativity and their country's rich heritage. The keys are a symbol of the hope to return to Palestine.

Christian World Service Update on Palestine

Christian World Service — February 14th, 2024

DSPR Gaza is continuing operating its one remaining Primary Health Clinic - in Rafah. The administration has moved out so medical staff can treat more people. Despite constant bombing, the staff are caring for pregnant and new mothers, attending to toothaches and so much more. They are seeing more than 400 people a day.

Over a million people are sheltering in Rafah where its Primary Health Clinic is one of four functioning medical centres. If the threatened large-scale offensive begins, DSPR Gaza warns there will be more civilian deaths and the relief system could collapse. Resources are extremely limited but it has attended to 8,654 children and adults plus another 2,000 people with vital medical (including dental) care. Staff have reached more than 4,546 people with psychosocial care. Mothers and children are its primary focus. Read more in the 100-Day Report.

"The destruction of our premises, the limitations of our resources, the poor connection and fragmentation have never prevented DSPR Gaza from keeping a light in the middle of darkness and trying to help people live with dignity," says DSPR Gaza.

Arrangements

After Bishop Steve departs around Pentecost (May) there will an interregnum, where the Bishop's role will be covered by the Vicar General (The Venerable Jan Clark) supported by the Deputy Vicar General (The Venerable Dr Anne van Gend).

The Archbishops will appoint a Commissary to help prepare for any Electoral Synod. The Commissary is usually the Bishop of another Diocese. This is still in process, we will let you know more information when we have this.

Diocesan Council (along with the Commissary) will look at the arrangements required. This usually includes the collation of a Diocesan Profile that will be circulated to all Electoral Synod members before any Electoral Synod.

Synod reps (lay and clergy) will be part of any electoral College and will be asked to pray, think and talk widely in their faith communities about whose name could be put forward as a candidate.

We will also be thinking further about our Vision and Mission as a Diocese over the coming months as part of a wider discernment process.



Who can join us for any of our services?

Any group (or individual) who can gather around a screen!

- In places where church services are only occasional, maybe two or three of you could meet together in someone's home and join us from there.
- Faith communities who don't "need" this but are open to trying something new may like to join us to support smaller groups. (Alexandra is an example of this).
- Ministry teams of small churches may simply like a week off from finding a priest and filling a
 roster.
- **Individuals** who, for whatever reason, cannot attend a regular service are also welcome to join us and share in spiritual communion if we cannot get the reserved sacrament to you.

If you let us know in advance, we can ensure reserved sacrament gets to any small gathering. If you are wanting to meet in your own church, Anne van Gend can work with you to provide and set up whatever equipment and internet connection is needed.

This is not meant to be a plan to replace communal, in-person worship, but is offering an alternative to both assist some who can gather together but lack a preacher or priest, and for those unable to meet with others.

Why Do this?

This is part of our ongoing commitment to find ways to support and minister with all those across our Diocese, with services planned for the 4th Sunday of each month. We are all aware that there are

communities and individuals across our Diocese for whom running or attending a Sunday service can be difficult. There are the regular issues of finding a priest, filling a roster, overcoming distances and so on. With Covid-19 are added barriers, for example physical vulnerability or people needing to self-isolate.

Services are using Reserved Sacrament in various physical locations from Invercargill and Dunedin to Lumsden, Alexandra and Palmerston, with smaller groups and individuals being given an opportunity to take part in a moment of Spiritual Communion.




The Bishop Who lost His See

Andrew Metcalfe — February 14th, 2024

A new book edited by Bob Simmonds has been published on the Rev'd Henry Jenner, the "first" Bishop of Dunedin who never took his seat.

From the Dust Cover of this New Book...

"In 1865 the Archbishop of Canterbury asked the Vicar of Preston-next-Wingham to become the first Bishop of Dunedin in New Zealand. From his knowledge of the gifts and abilities of the man he was sure that the Rev Henry Jenner would make and excellent spiritual leader of that newly created Diocese.



What the Prelate didn't know was that this very southern part of the then colony had a number of problems not experienced in the Home Counties of England. The culture created by is mainly Scottish migrants, the social and economic challenged created by a recent gold rush, and the struggle of the colonial church to assert itself as independent from the Mother Church in England, all combined to create a situation in which Henry Jenner was to become a victim of the resulting economic, insular and religious problems.

The result was that, after having travelled half-way around the world, visited mining towns and sheep stations on coach and horseback, and becoming as familiar as he could with the country, it was decided by a committee vote that he was unacceptable as the new Bishop of Dunedin. He therefore returned to the vicarage at Preston, where he was the remain for the rest of his life.

This is the story of the events, the people, and the controversies that made up this Dunedin Affair. Like much that is set in the past, it perhaps has some useful lessons for our present times."



Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board


The Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board (DDTB) is an important part of our Diocese, and is currently looking for two new Trustees...

What is the DDTB?

The Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board (DDTB), registered charity number CC362214, has two main roles:

- 1. **Firstly**, it manages two investment funds (the **Income Fund** and the **Growth Fund**) as trustee for diocesan faith communities and institutions, e.g. social services, residential and community based services, educational institutions and so on. These bodies deposit funds with it. The total funds under management in the two Funds is currently over \$41.3 million dollars.
- 2. The second major responsibility of the Board is the legal ownership of all Diocesan properties: it acts a trustee for all Diocesan institutions including local churches and parishes, who are the beneficial owners, i.e. they make use of these resources for their mission and ministry. In this capacity, the Board arranges insurance of properties under the terms of Statute 9, The Insurance Board Statute 1939. It has also taken a leadership role in the assessment of properties for seismic stability.

The DDTB is incorporated according to the Canons of the General Synod te Hinota Whanui (Anglican Church in NZ) and is controlled by the Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board Amendment Statute 2022. Part of the DDTB processes includes the **Investment Committee**, which monitors current investments, working within a defined framework, with the aim of optimising net returns for investors within the context and investment profile of each fund.

Have a look at the latest Statement of Investment Policy and Objectives (SIPO) attached below, signed off in November 2023. This outlines guidelines for the DDTB, including making sure that investment's are legal, spread across a variety of portfolios to reduce risk and meet accepted ethical standards i.e.:

- excluding any that are primarily engaged in the manufacture of weapons of war;
- manufacture or marketing of tobacco or recreational drugs;
- utilise any form of child labour, forced labour, or otherwise do not uphold human rights;
- are inconsistent with the Five Marks of Mission of the Anglican Church of NZ, or;
- breach the United Nations Global Compact.

It also has a statement around Mission Aligned Investment that includes discounted mortgage and commercial property interest rates for any Diocesan entities.

What do we look for in a Trustee?

Trustees need to be able to attend monthly meetings on the third Tuesday (10-11 am) and other brief meetings if a particular piece of work needs to be considered more urgently (e.g. considering offers on a property that is for sale). The Board could be flexible to accommodate any prospective Trustees who may not be able to attend monthly meetings on Tuesdays. Meetings take place in person and/or by videoconferencing.

The DDTB have a skills matrix and use this to look at how prospective members may complement existing and needed skills. This skill and quality mix includes:

- **Church** how the church works on a practical and/or spiritual level. Knowledge of the Anglican church in particular is helpful but not essential.
- **Property** knowledge and experience around property matters including preserving and repurposing assets.
- Governance experience current and past governance roles or membership on governance boards
- Investment knowledge and experience in financial investment settings.

- **Legal** specific legal experience, including property and Trust law.
- **Strategy** ability to see the bigger picture and plan ahead.
- Policy development skills in developing and reviewing policy related to the DDTB and wider church.
- **Diversity** ability to bring a unique perspective/diversity age, gender, ethnicity, tangata whenua, geographical location.

To apply to be a Trustee, you will need to complete the following forms (also attached below):

- <u>Application form to the Diocese of Dunedin Trusts Board DDTB</u> (the Board which appoints members onto Diocesan Organisation Boards or Trusts);
- Charities Declaration and;
- Declaration of Adherence for Trust Boards.



In April this year we will have the chance to learn from an expert about the possibilities of "Talking Circles". The workshops are open to lay and ordained alike - anyone who wants to take Jesus' call seriously to become reconciling communities. There is a limit of 15 people per workshop, so register quickly!

Anne van Gend says:

"In my discussions across our region, it has quickly became clear that the most common reason people have left our churches has nothing to do with faith in God. Almost always it is because of some mismanaged conflict, careless words, or - simply - lack of love. All of us make mistakes and mishandle certain situations - that's part of being human. But as the body of Christ, we are to be known by our love. That is a glorious vision to aim for, and workshops such as these are offered as tools for us, as communities of faith, to learn how to love better.

Talking Circles

A Talking Circle can be a highly effective process for a group to establish (or renew) trust and relationships; to explore issues and opportunities around something we about deeply (and sometimes differently); to develop shared commitment and collaborative action.

Our facilitator is Michael Wood, who will be joining us from Melbourne. Michael is an Anglican Priest and Coach who has extensive experience in using and teaching Talking Circles in churches, NGOs, government, education, and community settings around Australia.

Michael is offering two workshops. The first will be a full-day experiential workshop on Wednesday April 17th for church leaders (which is a broad term!), which will not only introduce the practice but equip us to use Talking Circles ourselves in a range of situations. It will begin at 9am and go through to 4.30pm. This full-day workshop will equip participants to facilitate Talking Circles in their own context(s), either local parishes or regional/enabler settings (including complex or conflicted settings). Following the workshop, participants will be invited to facilitate a Talking Circle and then come back together a month later (on Zoom) to debrief learnings.

The second will be a half-day workshop - more of a 'taster" - on Sunday April 21st, from 2pm to 5pm (arrive from 1.30pm). This workshop will provide a 'taste' of a Talking Circle by inviting participants to engage with a real topic (to be advised). The afternoon will include a debrief session to reflect on the process, ask questions, and explore potential applications in church leadership.

This workshop is for those who wish to explore the potential applications of Talking Circles in day-to-day church life. For clergy and others who want to learn how to regularly facilitate Talking Circles in parish (or regional/enabler) leadership, including in complex or conflicted settings, we recommend doing the full-day Facilitator Workshop on Wednesday 17th April.



"[Lord,] when did we see you a stranger and invite you in? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you? The King will reply, "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me." Matthew 25:38-40

Over a misunderstanding during Christmas, we lost renting a one-bedroom property for a 24-year-old mum and her daughter. The family has been waiting at the refugee camp in Auckland since 27th September 2023, praying for an affordable safe home in Dunedin. Except for the help from their case worker at the refugee camp and the Red Cross, they have no whānau support in the South Hemisphere!

If you know a one-bedroom or a two-bedroom property to rent, please consider participating in God's work of showing love and compassion to those who have faced adversity. We have a long list of families entering New Zealand and waiting at the camp for housing during the last three months. Helping in any capacity in Dunedin goes a long way. Renting to former refugee families is beyond providing a safe building. It contributes to their well-being, integration, and sense of belonging in their new home and community.

We at the Red Cross and the refugee community are committed to fostering a positive and harmonious living environment in our families' new homeland. We are strengthening community bonds, cultural exchange, and personal growth for our community in Dunedin.

Our families are New Zealand residents. Red Cross can ensure financial stability by an automatic payment of the rent directly from WINZ benefits.
