# Message From The Principal

As you will be aware, currently, we are back at school operating on a normal timetable.

In Term One we were forced to adopt our Emergency Cover Plan (ECP). This plan was to allow us to cope when we were running out of relievers and teachers to teach classes. At its COVID peak we had one day when we had eighteen teachers out and obviously we don't have anywhere near that number of relief teachers. Under the original ECP we were rostering year



levels home for one or two days per week.

Currently, we can cope with the number of staff out but we do still need to have a plan in place if we reach the point where we cannot put a teacher in front of every class.

With this in mind, we have designed a Mark 2 version of the ECP.

This is based on a series of levers to be activated that will reduce the pressure on staffing: Lever One Not holding any junior trip that requires additional relief

- Lever Two Minimising any senior trips that require additional relief
- Lever Three Minimising Professional Development (PD) that requires relief cover.
- Lever Four Year 13 classes with work set, but unsupervised.
- Rostering home of one year level per day. This Lever is the Lever Five absolute last resort.

Currently none of these measures is required, but we do have to have contingency plans in place for the next wave or new variant. Obviously, any updates required will be communicated with our parent community via the usual channels.


