## Te Tiriti o Waitangi Training

In late October, 70 Hospital Chaplains gathered in Wellington for a two-day Te Tiriti o Waitangi Training event, presented by Te Ata Kura Educators. The training included the spirit, provisions, principles and implementation of Te Tiriti. There were group exercises where chaplains role-played a treaty debate, examining where we all fit into the Treaty texts, and what we could all do to further honour Te Tiriti in our workplaces. Many of us were amazed how much we needed to unlearn or reconsider. There are numerous myths and misunderstandings to navigate and it was great to have a perspective that highlighted the positive role Christians had in shaping the Treaty. We now have the privileged opportunity to implement our learning over the weeks ahead!

We've held Competency Framework workshops for our Hospital Chaplains across Aotearoa this month. Workshops have been held in Taupo, Auckland, Palmerston North and Christchurch. The aim of the workshops is to introduce a framework of Core Competencies for Hospital Chaplains in Aotearoa New Zealand so that we maintain the highest standards of care for the patients, whanau, and staff that Chaplains encounter in our public Hospitals.

Work on the competencies was drafted by an experienced team of Hospital Chaplains and the document created is a treasure (Taonga) to the ministry of Hospital Chaplaincy in Aotearoa NZ. Collectively we will be continuing to develop and enhance the framework as we apply it to our professional practice.
