Digital Technology	Rākinui have been having lots of fun learning about lots of new and interesting ways to use digital technology in our learning. We have explored Padlet, Book Creator, Chrome Canvas, Google slides, Gamefroot, Genial.ly, Google drawing and more to enhance our learning activities and share our ideas in new ways. Teacher Professional Development	This term our teachers are involved in professional development in Te Reo and Digital Technologies. We are supported with people in order to upskill and utilise our learning alongside our tamariki.
Literacy	Our literacy covers reading and writing and where possible will relate to the inquiry topic Kaitiakitanga (Innovation) in Term 2. We encourage reading everyday at school and at home. Students will be reading from online sites as well as School Journals and age appropriate reading books. They will be required to have a book everyday, this can be from either the library or brought in from home. We also encourage writing each day, in some form for all students. This may be dictation, spelling, creative writing, writing instructions, scripts, report writing, newsletter articles, emails and more.
Numeracy	The strand focus this term is Geometry and Number. We continue to use Mathletics and this allows them to log in at any time during school or home and work on given material. This is especially good for practising times tables and basic facts knowledge.
Kapahaka	We continue our kapa haka programme half an hour each week.  It's wonderful to see the engagement and leadership beginning to develop in our tamariki. We will continue building on their skills for upcoming performances and mihi whakatau.
Y7/8 Technology	All Totara students are involved in weekly Technology at Christchurch East School on Monday afternoons throughout the year. Learning context for 2021 includes creative design (fabric and metal) and digital technology.
Languages	Te reo will be integrated wherever possible through our daily practice. This term we are exploring how this learning can be enhanced by digital technology and waiata. Year 7 students are learning Japanese this term and Year 8 are learning Te Reo. Next term we swap.
Peer Mediators	Selected students from across Rākinui are taking part in the Cool Schools initiative. This is a program where students are trained to assist younger students to resolve playground disagreements.
Health	Totara is participating in a St Johns initiative - Weaving Wellbeing. This focuses on developing skills to build resilience and promote positive mental health.  The second half of the term we will be completing the police education program Keeping Ourselves Safe. They will learn:  - to work out when their safety is at risk
	- how to keep safe when they meet and mix with other people
