

### **Message From The Principal Term Four is Underway**

We are back up and running for the final term of the year and, particularly for our senior students, there are now nine (Year 13) and twelve school days (Years 11 and 12) of lessons before they depart for exam leave.

Many of our Level 1 and 2 students may have already gained the necessary credits to gain their qualification for this year and thus may struggle for motivation to study for the external exams.



It's certainly a far cry from the old days of School Certificate where everything was based on a single exam result and the system was set up so that 50% of candidates had to fail.

#### **Election Week** This week we have the election to decide on the Government for the

next three years. Sadly, whatever the country decides as a collective will have a significant impact on New Zealand schools.

One of the biggest frustrations for schools is that they are used as political footballs by political parties as they seek our votes. Several of these policies are attractive to voters and so parties introduce them, as they sound like a 'vote winner'.

Often, they haven't been thought through as to their impact on schools and learners, nor do they always have any support from research to prove that these policies have worked in other places.

Previously schools had 'national standards' forced on them by the Government of the day. The harsh realities were that they were not nationally moderated, so they had no standard. They didn't produce improved outcomes for learners and there were several years of learners who were told they 'were well below national standards' as they progressed through the primary system. Having this label attached to them didn't improve motivation as they entered their secondary schooling.

In a similar vein there is a proposal to establish 'Boot Camps' for youth offenders. This system has been introduced in several countries overseas and it's failed wherever it has been tried. However, it sounds like a vote winner, so it becomes a policy even though the research shows that they haven't worked previously.

### **Educational Plan**

However, there are several countries that have an established educational plan that is free of political interference. Malaysia and Singapore are both high-performing economic powerhouses which have adopted well thought-through educational plans with an aim of progressing their country's education system.

Malaysia has a twelve year education blueprint that guides the education path for that period, and schools have the resources to enact these plans and are left to get on with the job. Interestingly, in Singapore, the Minister of Education holds their fourth-ranked position in their cabinet (behind the Prime Minister and their Premier) but still outranks their Minister of Finance. If our politicians are serious about improving educational outcomes

This issue has a direct flow-on to educational, health, employment and justice outcomes, so it should be the major issue that parties put their focus on. But, of course, I'm just a school principal so I have lots of ideas but little

across the country they should solve the issues created by poverty.

#### **Science Brain Bee**

With highlights by Year 11 students The New Zealand Brain Bee Challenge (NZBBC) is a competition for

secondary school students in Year 11 to learn about the brain and its functions; neuroscience research; to find out about careers in neuroscience and to dispel misconceptions about neurological and The programme was started in 2006 to address a number of deficiencies in

the public's perception of science in general, and neuroscience in particular. Four of our students took part in this event earlier in Term Three and below we read Brain Bee 2023 excerpt highlights of their experiences:

Being able to be a part of the 2023 Brain Bee was lots of fun. We travelled

down to Dunedin and visited the museum, then the next day was the actual Brain Bee event. We got to do things like a team quiz with all the different schools, dissect a

sheep's brain, and hear from three students about what they do/study. This

was all held at the University of Otago. There was also a competition to see who could make the best neuron out of pipe-cleaners, and I enjoyed the team quiz even though our team did not

place. It was very exciting to see how all the other teams did. I had lots of fun hearing the three students talk about what they study and what they do. It was very fascinating. I also found dissecting the sheep's brain interesting! I enjoyed learning about the brain, and it was a pretty cool experience overall.

**Caitlin Colli** This year in July, I was among a team of four students who had the honour of attending and competing in the 2023 Brain Bee competition. In the competition there were three rounds - the first two rounds were completed individually and online, the third and final round was held at the University of Otago.

On the day prior to the competition, we got to Dunedin and were able to explore the museum, the butterfly house and even see a planetarium show. On the day of the competition we were provided with activities such as the dissection of a sheep's brain and looking at different cells up close under microscopes. Three members of the university came to talk to us about the work they were doing in neuroscience and about the overall academic experience in the field of science at Otago.

Although our team did not place in the team competition, I highly recommend the Brain Bee Competition to anyone who enjoys science, as I personally found it to be a very interesting and enjoyable learning experience.

Being given the opportunity to participate in the 2023 Brain Bee held in Otago was a very fun and unforgettable experience. Travelling down to Otago and being able to visit the museum and explore was very fun. Although we didn't place in the actual team quiz, it was still fun competing and looking at the other schools who were also a part of it. I enjoyed the other activities that came with the Brain Bee such as the sheep brain dissection and hearing about what other people who focus on neuroscience do. 
### Being able to participate in the 2023 Brain Bee was a very unique
