Ordination to the Priesthood of Rev'd Joel Stutter

A Garden Ordination

Andrew Metcalfe — January 29th, 2024

On Sunday 28 January at 2 pm, Rev'd Joel Stutter was ordained to the Order of Priests at an outdoor altar next to the garden of St Peter's Caversham.

Some may have wondered why St Peter's Church was not used for this... and when rain threatened (but then the sun came out) the hall area of St Peter's was the venue instead.

This was quite a deliberate choice by Bishop Steven and Joel, influenced by a variety of factors. Joel has recent connections with St Peter's Caversham (where he has been serving as Deacon) and St Martha's Church where Joel and Deborah have found a spiritual home since coming to Dunedin.

The main driver for this very different setting is the idea of "faith on the edges", of not needing to own a church building to be able to operate as a faith community, of blurring the boundaries. All of this as well as connecting in very real ways with the neighbourhoods we are part of, is important to Joel. Being ordained in a place that was a transition between sacred spaces and the glories of God's creation was significant for this occasion.

Joel's order of service cover pictured a sand dune, beach and the sea... one of those "thin places" where God can be experienced, the kind of location where Jesus climbed into a boat and spoke to people on the shore who were hungry for physical and spiritual nourishment.

Rev'd Edward Prebble from St Martha's sermon was based on Joshua 3, 1-17. This is a less well known but significant passage of scripture that describes a final crossing of the river Jordan, led by priests holding the Ark of the Covenant. In this scripture, when the ark enters the flooded waters, the river piles up to let the people through to the other side safely. Edward made three observations about this story:

- 1. It is a model for all miracle stories where people are asked to do something ordinary... and a miracle takes place. "Put water into those jars... go and wash yourself in the river... roll away that stone". All precursors for transformation, healing and resurrections.
- 2. **The river Jordan symbolises (and is a model) of how we get to God.** For all of us, we come to faith by crossing a river (a divide) and being washed in it (baptism).
- 3. **The story also says something profound about the role of a priest.** Here, priests facilitated getting people to a place where God could do something for them. This is the same today, with a priest also having a role in protecting the treasure of the gospel i.e. the conviction deep in our soul that God is here...especially in the gathering of God's people.

At times (as in this particular scripture) priests need to be in the thick of the people, and at other times they need to be leading the way. But always, a priest needs to listen to God about what to do, listen for and to God's word and work. We need priests like Joel to be there where the people are, where the needs are.

Edward concluded by reminding the congregation that the story talks about priests in the plural: Joel is one part of a huge number of past and present people who have been ordained into this order, no priest has to carry it all on their own. For Joel, the simple message was: **Just go... and be their priest.**

Priests and lay people gathered around Joel to present him to Bishop Steven, who outlined what it was to hold this office in the church. Joel and the congregation confirmed his call to the priesthood, and later in the service Joel reaffirmed his faith and his commitment to what is involved in this vocation. Invocations, prayers, the laying on of hands took place, and Bishop Steve presented (at that exact moment!) the newest priest in the world.

Housing Former Refugees - Can you help?

"[Lord,] when did we see you a stranger and invite you in? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you? The King will reply, "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me." Matthew 25:38-40

Over a misunderstanding during Christmas, we lost renting a one-bedroom property for a 24-year-old mum and her daughter. The family has been waiting at the refugee camp in Auckland since 27th September 2023, praying for an affordable safe home in Dunedin. Except for the help from their case worker at the refugee camp and the Red Cross, they have no whānau support in the South Hemisphere!

If you know a one-bedroom or a two-bedroom property to rent, please consider participating in God's work of showing love and compassion to those who have faced adversity. We have a long list of families entering New Zealand and waiting at the camp for housing during the last three months. Helping in any capacity in Dunedin goes a long way. Renting to former refugee families is beyond providing a safe building. It contributes to their well-being, integration, and sense of belonging in their new home and community.

We at the Red Cross and the refugee community are committed to fostering a positive and harmonious living environment in our families' new homeland. We are strengthening community bonds, cultural exchange, and personal growth for our community in Dunedin.

Our families are New Zealand residents. Red Cross can ensure financial stability by an automatic payment of the rent directly from WINZ benefits.

If you have any concerns, please contact me so we can alleviate those worries. If you are curious to know more about the cultural sensitivity of our new families, the Red Cross can offer help from Cross-Cultural Workers who are experts in this field.

Correspondence with Ministers of Parliament and Local Mayors

At Synod there are usually motions that call upon the Government or other leaders to act on issues that we as a church feel strongly about. Our most recent correspondence has been to the Government about Cost of Living Pressure, as well as asking local and national endorsement of the Fossil Fuel Non-proliferation Treaty.

Fossil Fuel Non-proliferation Treaty

At Synod 2023 a motion was passed expressing concerns about social and public Housing. Bishop Steve wrote to the following letter to:

Please note: we were advised that rather than send this letter to named Government Ministers, we would have more effect sending it to local Members of Parliament to take it up with Government ministers on our behalf. Similar letters were sent to Anglican Financial Care and to the Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board.

Subject: Endorsement of Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty

At the second session of the Sixty Second Synod of the (Anglican) Diocese of Dunedin in September 2023, the following motion was moved and carried:

That this Synod:

- 1. Endorses the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty Initiative;
- 2. Calls on all the local bodies of the Diocese to endorse the Treaty Initiative, and asks that the Bishop write to them asking them to do so;
- 3. Calls on Parliamentarians and central Government to endorse the Treaty Initiative; and asks that the Bishop write to the Prime Minister, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, the Minister for Climate Change, and the Minister for Energy and Resources.
- 4. Commits to ensuring that the investments of the Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board are in accordance with the Treaty Initiative;
- 5. Asks that the Bishop write to the Anglican Pension board to raise the issue of signing up to the Treaty Initiative;
- 6. Commits to cooperation with other churches and community organisations to further these goals.

I'm writing to you to communicate this motion and to ask you both to help in passing this matter onto appropriate Ministers for a response.

We understand that appropriate ministers to communicate this to are: The Prime Minister, the Right Honourable Christopher Luxon; the Minister for Foreign Affairs, the Right Honourable Winston Peters; the Minister for Climate Change, The Honourable Simon Watt and; the Minister for Energy and resources. The Honourable Simeon Brown.

I am aware that this issue does not appear to be part of the coalition government's priorities. and, in fact, many of their policies appear to be going backwards in this space. After the second hottest year on record in New Zealand (2023), we continue to be alarmed by an apparent lack of action in this space, where our country could be leading the world by example. It does appear that important concerns like this can become part of political agendas rather than seeing this issue as serious enough to get cross party agreement and action. We want to do our part as a Church (which is indicated in the above motion) but also want to see our representatives leading positive change in this space.

Our worldwide communion of Anglican Churches has a focus on Five Marks of Mission, with Mark 5 being: *To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and re-new the life of the earth.* As people of faith, we want to lead by example, but also need to know that those we elect are taking the future of our planet seriously.

Addendum: Explanatory Notes from Synod Paperwork.

The Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty Initiative is a call for a binding agreement between the world's governments. It has three pillars:

- 1. Non-proliferation: End the expansion of any new coal, oil or gas production.
- 2. A fair phase out: Wind down existing production in a way where countries with the capacity and historical responsibility for emissions transition fastest and support others.
- 3. Just transition: Fast track the adoption of clean energy and economic diversification away from fossil fuels so no worker, community and country is left behind in the transition.

The Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty has already been endorsed by many faith organisations, including the Anglican Consultative Council, the Vatican, the World Council of Churches and the Pacific Conference of Churches. It has also been endorsed by six national governments (Vanuatu, Tonga, Fiji, Solomon Islands, Niue, Tuvalu) and the European Parliament, as well as eighty-four cities and subnational governments, thousands of civil society organisations and scientists and hundreds of thousands of individuals. Cost of Living Pressure

The Synod also agreed to a motion around cost of living pressure which was sent to The Honourable Brook van Velden, Minister of Workplace Relations and Safety, and copied to local Dunedin MPs.

Subject: Cost of Living Pressure

At the second session of the Sixty Second Synod of the (Anglican) Diocese of Dunedin in September 2023, the following motion was moved on behalf of our Social Justice Committee and carried:

That this Synod expresses concern to the Government about the impact of cost-of-living pressures on households, noting that this year (2023), after a period of decreasing the gap between the minimum wage and the living wage, the gap has significantly increased, and asks the Bishop to write to the Minister of Workplace Relations and Safety to urge continued efforts to close the gap between the minimum wage and living wage.

I'm writing to you to communicate this motion and to ask for a response.

I am aware that this issue does not appear to be part of the coalition government's priorities and, in fact, may be against stated policy that opposes any increase in the minimum wage or encouragement towards providing a living wage.

During opportunities for people to speak to this motion at Synod, it was pointed out by one

representative of the difference in cleaning pay rates between government departments. Some of these departments provide the living wage while other (externally contracted) cleaning companies who do not. This was seen to be an issue of equity within the very heart of the corridors of parliament, but also drew attention to the difference in the lives of people who can participate fully in their community and the wider economy compared to those who do not have enough to live on.

We are interested in your response to this and how we may be able to engage in a conversation that may "change minds" at your end, or ours. People ministering in our churches regularly report the distress of hard working, vulnerable people and families in our community who struggle to make ends meet.

When we remember to words of Jesus Christ in Luke 6: 20-21: Then he looked up at his disciples and said: 'Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled. Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh.' ... we see ourselves and our elected representatives as being charged to do what we can to bringing about the end of poverty, hunger and tears.



World Day of Prayer 1 March 2024 Ady Shannon - Touchstone — January 30th, 2024

World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation led by women which enables us to hear the thoughts, hopes, concerns and prayers of women from all parts of the world.

How to Participate this year

On Friday 1 March 2024 people will gather in 146 countries to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Palestine. It begins in Samoa and travels through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later.

Preparation for the day is enormous. A New York based international committee works in collaboration with national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans.

Some Background

Each year the service for World Day of Prayer (WDP) is prepared by women from a different country. On Friday 1 March 2024 people in 146 countries will celebrate the service prepared by a group of ecumenical Christian Palestinian women.

In 2017 the Christian women of Palestine were chosen to prepare the service for World Day of Prayer 2024. At the time, the international committee could not have foreseen how that decision, and the theme "I beg you, bear with one another in love" Ephesians 4:1-3 would resonate with the situation currently unfolding in Palestine.

On Saturday 2 December 2023 at 4.00pm New York time (5am Sunday NZ time) a WDP Global Conversation included representatives from the Palestine National WDP Committee involved in preparing the 2024 service. Their work - in the planning phase for several years - has been affected by the coronavirus pandemic. It has taken on a new significance, given unfolding events in Gaza and the West Bank where more than 25,000 people, many women and children, have been killed in indiscriminate attacks since 7 October 2023.

Three representatives from the NZ WDP planning committee participated in the online forum where Palestinian committee members shared personal stories of the loss and devastation they have suffered over recent months.

The Global Conversation - WDP service planners talk

WDP executive committee member, Maral Haidostian, opened the hour-long global conversation by providing context to the development of the service. Planning was initially impacted by the global coronavirus pandemic and then war denied members of the committee the ability to meet in person. She introduced other members of the executive committee and welcomed the global audience - tuning in live from all over the world – saying, "May God's peace and reconciliation prevail."

Australian-based Vicki Marney, WDP committee representative from the Pacific region, gave an overview of the process undertaken every five years to confirm the writer country selected to write the service and prepare resources for future iterations of WDP. The purpose is to ensure "that the voices of sisters all around the world are heard" and that the writer committee is well supported in their mission. In reference to the situation currently taking place in Palestine, Vicky said, "Prior to the pandemic we could not foresee God's plans. The committee now finds itself in a place they might never have imagined."

Rev Sally Azar, Chair of the WDP Committee, became the first ordained female Palestinian pastor in the Holy Land in 2023. Since 2017 she has worked alongside 17 other Palestinian Christian women to write the liturgy for WDP 2024. The group divided themselves into committees tasked with various aspects of the service e.g. music, worship liturgy and Bible study. Rev Azar said, "The service reflects the authenticity of the voices of all the women involved in preparing resources."

In August 2023, the committee gathered for a strengthening workshop in in Beit Jala, near Jerusalem. During a two-day retreat, the group of Christian women representing many denominations worked on the service, and visited St Martha's House, Bethlehem. As the gathering occurred on a Thursday, the group collectively celebrated the importance of *Thursdays in Black*, a movement that stands against violence towards women.

A Daily Struggle Being a Christian in the Holy Land

Each of the WDP committee representatives reiterated their pride in being a Christian Palestinian existing in the Holy Land. They also emphasised the difficulties associated with living as a minority group, experiencing aggression and hostility daily. Sharing their struggles and comforting each other in love, as defined by the 2024 WDP theme, enabled them to speak out, comfort each other and move forward in their daily lives and in their WDP preparations. The universal language of love was the main line of communication used throughout the planning and preparation.

Shireen Awwad, a member of the WDP Palestine committee residing on the outskirts of Bethlehem, was candid, emotional and brutally honest as she spoke about the situation in Gaza from a deeply personal perspective. Two of her aunts were sheltering in a church that was attacked; one was killed and the other severely injured. The injured woman subsequently underwent surgery without anaesthetic and her recovery has been compromised by a lack of rehabilitation. Shireen's uncle died because he was not able to get a routine operation.

Parents write their children's names on their hands or legs as a way of identifying them as many people killed in the incessant bombing are being buried without being identified. Shireen talked about the carnage that ensued when an ancient historic Greek Orthodox Church, in which many were taking sanctuary, was bombed.

As the indigenous Christian population of Palestine is being forced to leave Gaza, her fear is that their churches will become museum pieces – no longer places of worship for the small, courageous and brave Christian community. Her moving commentary was supported by graphic images showing scenes of devastation, mass graves and raw human grief.

"It is a sad situation and there is no justification that Israel can continue doing what they are doing now. There is no safe place The only solution now is to pray."

Shireen's plea for world action to encourage Israel to stop the inhumane attacks that represent "a collective punishment on all civilians because of Hamas," must include peace and justice. "Peace without justice is not peace."


The artwork: 'Praying Palestinian Women'

The artwork 'Praying Palestinian Women,' is by Halima Aziz, a Palestinian visual artist and design student based in Germany. Born in Hagen, Germany in 1999, Halima grew up in Palestine. Following the war in 2008, her family moved back to Germany. Halima had an interest in art from an early age and started painting professionally in 2017.

Halima has used motifs and symbols which indicate the origin and cohesiveness of these women. Olive trees are a sign of everlasting and abundant life because they can live for thousands of years. The Palestinian people are deeply rooted in their country and this is underlined by the golden roots of the tree. Poppy flowers are a reminder of loved ones who have given their lives for their country. Traditional Palestinian dress symbolises the people's creativity and their country's rich heritage. The keys are a symbol of the hope to return to Palestine.

Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board

Andrew Metcalfe — January 31st, 2024


The Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board (DDTB) is an important part of our Diocese, and is currently looking for two new Trustees...

What is the DDTB?

The Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board (DDTB), registered charity number CC362214, has two main roles:

- 1. **Firstly**, it manages two investment funds (the **Income Fund** and the **Growth Fund**) as trustee for diocesan faith communities and institutions, e.g. social services, residential and community based services, educational institutions and so on. These bodies deposit funds with it. The total funds under management in the two Funds is currently over \$41.3 million dollars.
- 2. The second major responsibility of the Board is the legal ownership of all Diocesan properties: it acts a trustee for all Diocesan institutions including local churches and parishes, who are the beneficial owners, i.e. they make use of these resources for their mission and ministry. In this capacity, the Board arranges insurance of properties under the terms of Statute 9, The Insurance Board Statute 1939. It has also taken a leadership role in the assessment of properties for seismic stability.

The DDTB is incorporated according to the Canons of the General Synod te Hinota Whanui (Anglican Church in NZ) and is controlled by the Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board Amendment Statute 2022. Part of the DDTB processes includes the **Investment Committee**, which monitors current investments, working within a defined framework, with the aim of optimising net returns for investors within the context and investment profile of each fund.

Have a look at the latest Statement of Investment Policy and Objectives (SIPO) attached below, signed off in November 2023. This outlines guidelines for the DDTB, including making sure that investment's are legal, spread across a variety of portfolios to reduce risk and meet accepted ethical standards i.e.:

- excluding any that are primarily engaged in the manufacture of weapons of war;
- manufacture or marketing of tobacco or recreational drugs;
- utilise any form of child labour, forced labour, or otherwise do not uphold human rights;
- are inconsistent with the Five Marks of Mission of the Anglican Church of NZ, or;
- breach the United Nations Global Compact.

It also has a statement around Mission Aligned Investment that includes discounted mortgage and commercial property interest rates for any Diocesan entities.

What do we look for in a Trustee?

Trustees need to be able to attend monthly meetings on the third Tuesday (10-11 am) and other brief meetings if a particular piece of work needs to be considered more urgently (e.g. considering offers on a property that is for sale). The Board could be flexible to accommodate any prospective Trustees who may not be able to attend monthly meetings on Tuesdays. Meetings take place in person and/or by videoconferencing.

The DDTB have a skills matrix and use this to look at how prospective members may complement existing and needed skills. This skill and quality mix includes:

- **Church** how the church works on a practical and/or spiritual level. Knowledge of the Anglican church in particular is helpful but not essential.
- **Property** knowledge and experience around property matters including preserving and repurposing assets.
- Governance experience current and past governance roles or membership on governance boards
- Investment knowledge and experience in financial investment settings.
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- **Legal** specific legal experience, including property and Trust law.
- **Strategy** ability to see the bigger picture and plan ahead.
- Policy development skills in developing and reviewing policy related to the DDTB and wider church.
- **Diversity** ability to bring a unique perspective/diversity age, gender, ethnicity, tangata whenua, geographical location.

If you are interested in becoming a Trustee, please contact the Diocesan Registrar registrar@calledsouth.org.nz who can answer any initial questions and put you in touch with people you can talk to further.

To apply to be a Trustee, you will need to complete the following forms (also attached below):

- <u>Application form to the Diocese of Dunedin Trusts Board DDTB</u> (the Board which appoints members onto Diocesan Organisation Boards or Trusts);
- Charities Declaration and;
- Declaration of Adherence for Trust Boards.




