Term Three Activities

As a large secondary school we are used to having busy weeks with multiple events running at once, and this week has been especially frantic.

Enrolment Week Enrolments

Following on from our Open Night, we have a week plus of enrolment interviews with our 2024 Year 9 students and their parents/caregivers.

With at least 280 students starting in Year 9 next year, we use these meetings to get to know the students and hear from

their parents as to how we can support their learning at AshColl. These 15-minute interviews provide us invaluable information and involve all members of the Senior Leadership Team and the Junior Pastoral Teams

These interviews are followed up by a meeting with the students' Year 8 teachers, for further information.

Tokorozawa Kita High School Visit

We also have twenty-five students from Tokorozawa Kita High School with us for twelve days. This is our sister school in Japan and is their first visit for four years, so it is fantastic to have these opportunities opening

Many of our senior students studying Japanese will be hosted by their families when our group visits Japan in September of this year.

We also have our College Production of Oliver! happening this week, with four shows starting from yesterday. This is the result of months worth of work involving 100+ students and many staff. There may be tickets left but, if you want to attend, remember that the season finishes on

Saturday evening. So, all told, a very busy week.

Polynesian Panthers We were fortunate, yesterday, to host four members of the Polynesian Panthers who formed as a result of the infamous dawn raids. They are speaking to our senior history students and it is fantastic that our students get a chance to hear from history makers themselves, rather than reading about their actions or looking at material online. This group is visiting as part of a national tour.

Weather Impacts

Last week we faced the result of a deluge due to 36-40 hours of heavy rain. As you are aware we made the decision to close the school on Monday 24 July. On the Sunday night we were advised that the buses would not be running (this call is made by the bus company), and there was also no certainty that the Tinwald Bridge would open in the morning. At school there were several leaks and pools of water in our corridors plus, of course it was still raining heavily at 6:00am on the Monday morning, so we decided to close. Such calls are never easy but are made with the information available at the time.

Mid Canterbury Combined AshHutt 1st XV Boys' Rugby Finally, I would like to acknowledge the stellar season our 1st XV Boys'

Rugby team has had to date. The Canterbury Rugby Union reorganised the Toyota Championship into

a two-tier competition of Premiership Grade (mainly single sex boys' schools) and Championship Grades. There are ten teams in each grade. Our Mid Canterbury Combined team has finished high enough in the

Championship this year, to give them the right to gain entry into the Premiership Grade for 2024, if we choose to exercise this right. We don't have to make that decision yet and we need to carefully consider our player stocks for next year before the coaches make their decision. An existing Premiership team will be relegated if we choose that option. Our team had a home semi-final against Rangiora High School on

Saturday 29 July, which they won 23-20, and this will now be followed by a final against Christchurch Boys' High School 2nd XV this coming Saturday.

Well done to all concerned with this team for an amazing season.

New Build Progress and 2023 Time Capsules Tuesday 18 July saw another stage in the life of the College's new build,

when four students placed time capsules into a cavity in the wall of what is to become the Rangitata Block.

The four Year 12 students above were representatives of an approximately twenty-strong group of Year 11 and Year 12 students, whose end of Term

Two cross-curricular passion project was preparing the time capsules. The students first undertook some research about College across different

decades, with groups assigned to different years, commencing in the 1980 decade through until 2010-2020. As part of this mahi, previous Phoenix Magazines were trawled through for information and photos which could be copied, laminated and placed in the capsules. The metal tube capsules' coloured ends represent the four House Colours of Ashburton College. Included in the capsules were a range of items including

badges representative of each year since the inception of Ashburton College

in 1965. These covered the range of leadership, house, sports, academic and culture badges, plus ties. Additional items included Phoenix magazines, newsletters, newspapers, photos of the school through the eras, information around Covid and masks, signs from around College advising helpline numbers, groups, events and

involved in the project meant to them, with Melissa Wilson saying it showed her more about the history of what the school used to look like, and how it has changed over the years. Rachel Clement agreed with this, adding though that their work uncovered

At the end of May, sixteen players made up from the College Girls' 1st XV and the Girls' Under 15 team travelled to Lincoln University to gain more rugby experience from four Matatū players - Amy Rule, Grace Brooker, Kendra Cocksedge and Atlanta Lolohea - whilst meeting the Matatū Managers' team and Assistant Coach Tony Christie.

The AshColl girls, along with players from Kaiapo College and Haeata

Community College, were welcomed with kai and started the day with a

history talk about how Matatū become a team and the values they hold. Players were then given the opportunity to ask questions of each player and listen to their journey of how they became the players they are today. They then split into multiple groups and took part in an Amazing Race which

consisted of different little challenges throughout the buildings and field. Tony Christie then spoke about the importance of maintaining te whare tapa whā (haoura) as an athlete, and the group all reflected on what they could do better to enhance their own well-being. The group was also able to get a tour of Matatū's headquarters, walking

around Managers' Offices, Physio and Doctors' rooms whilst experiencing what it was like to be in the common room of the players. After having another kai break the girls completed a skill session with the Matatū player that was most familiar with each position. Tight five worked on strengthening their line outs while the loose forwards nailed down their

bridge and clean outs. The backs worked on new combinations to create

space for them to get to the try line.
