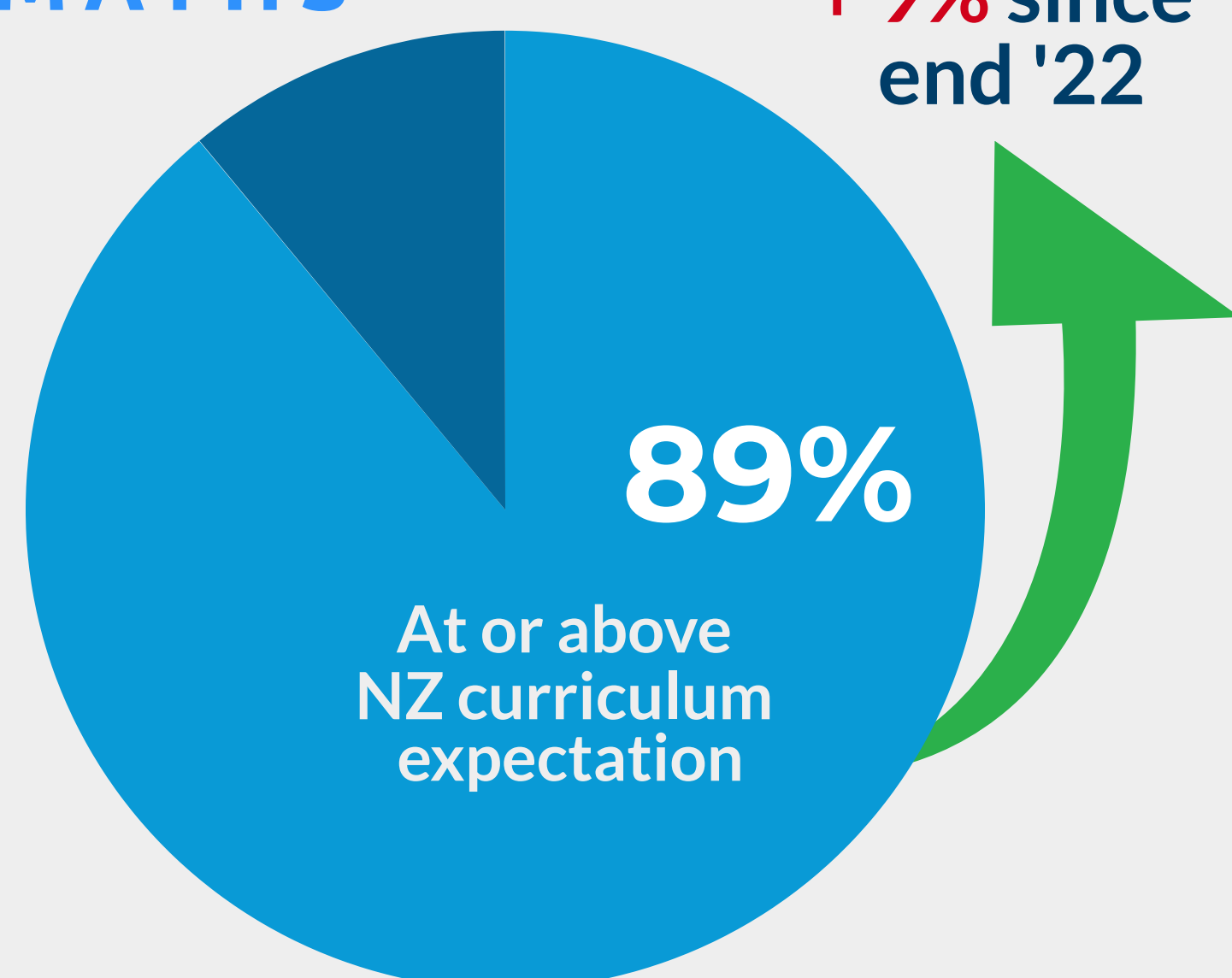

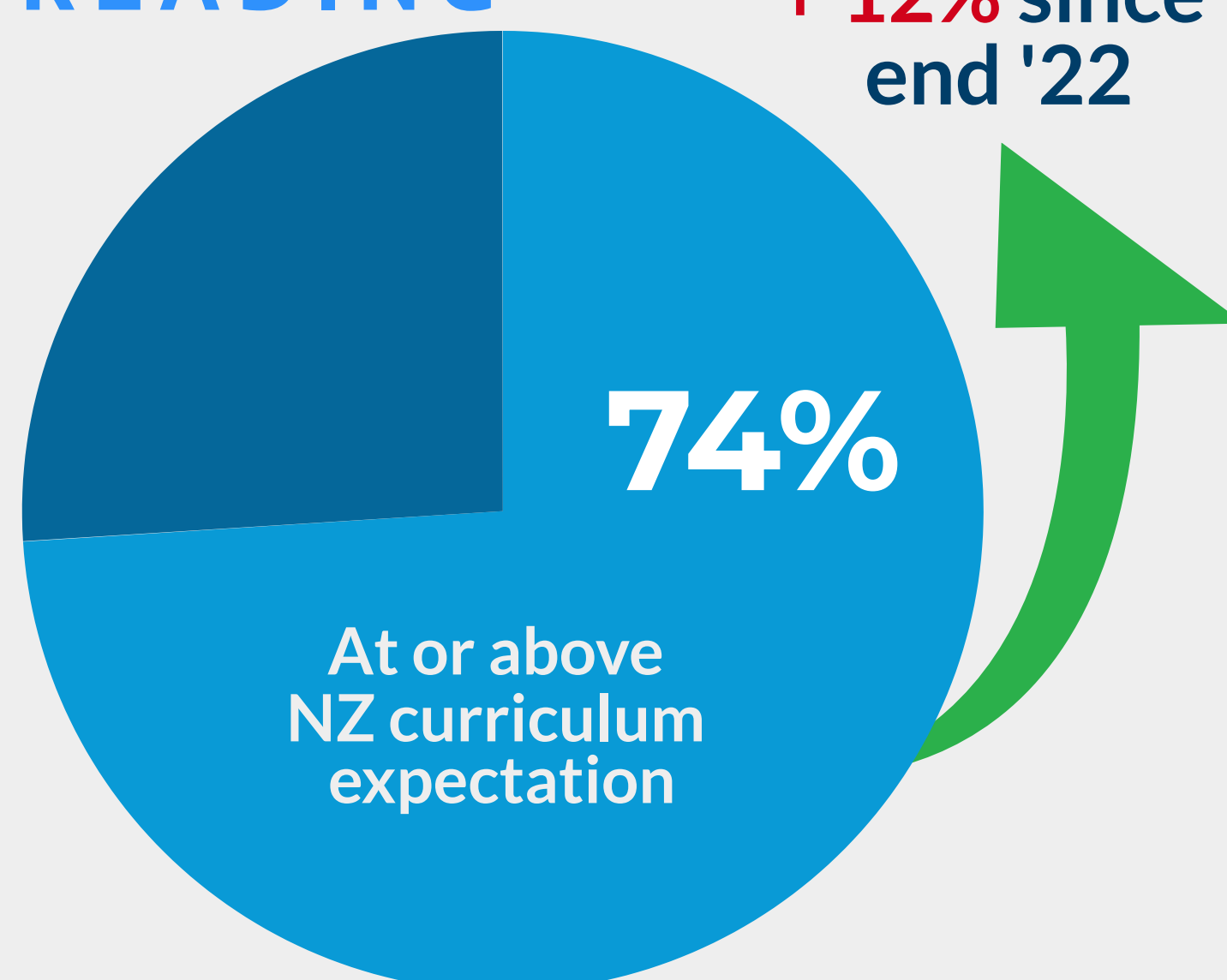

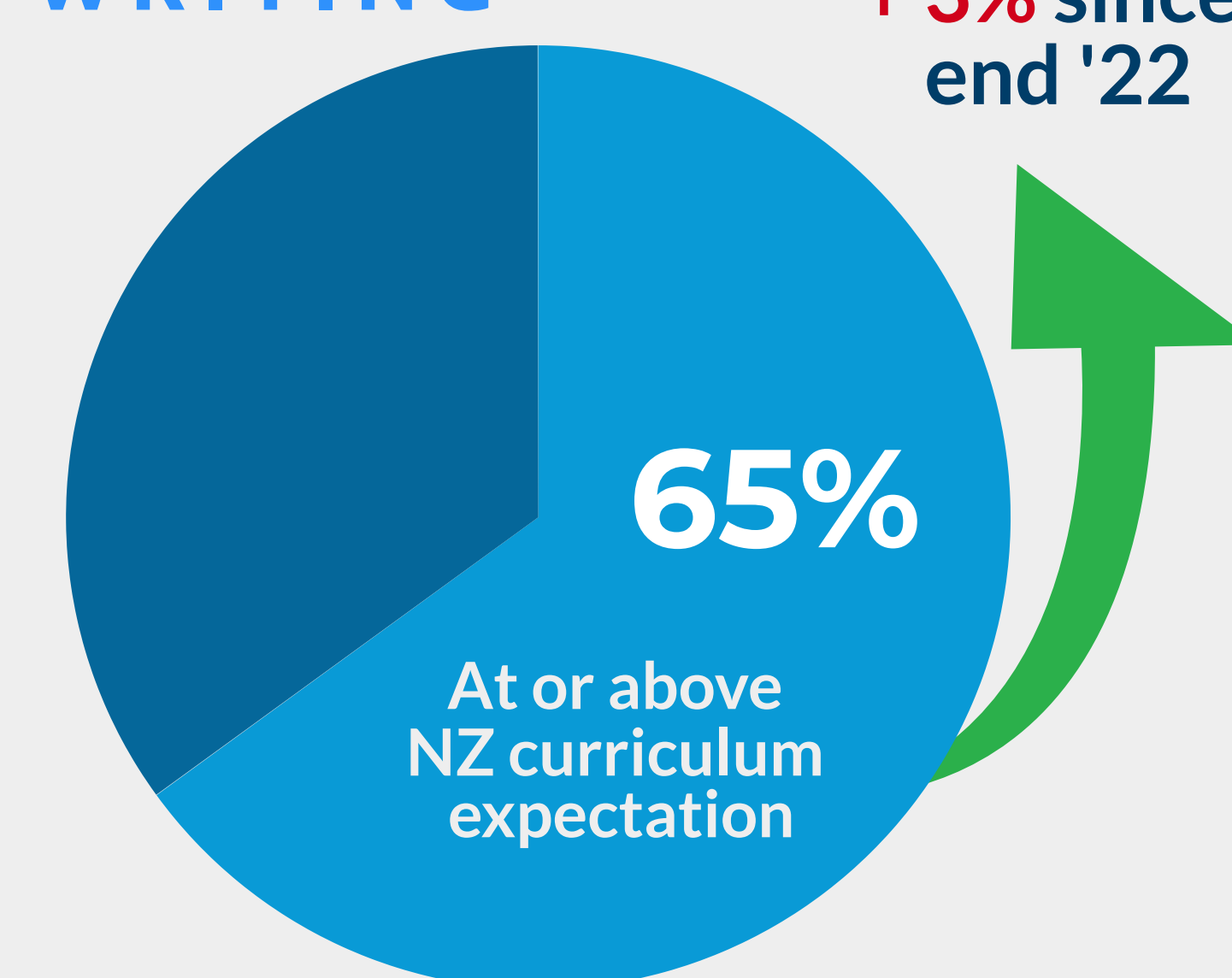

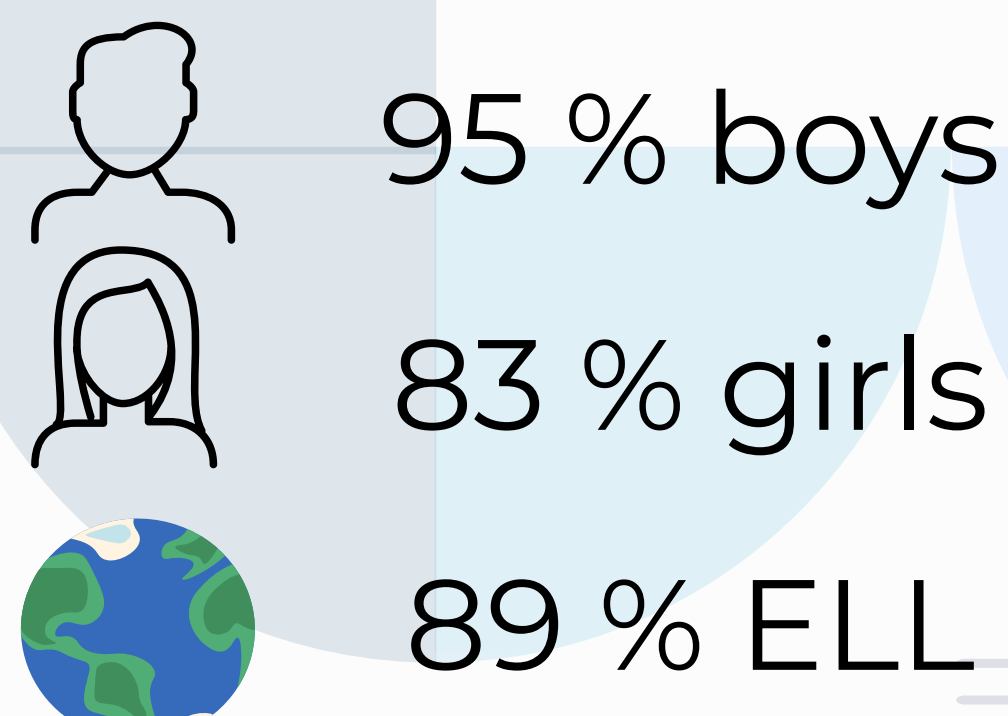

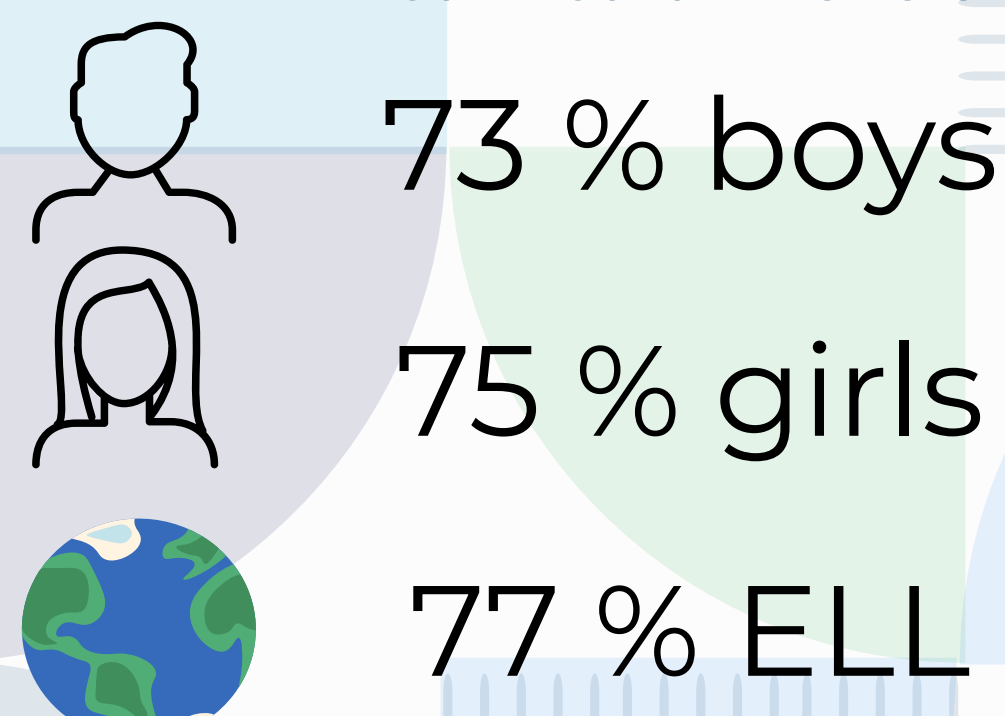

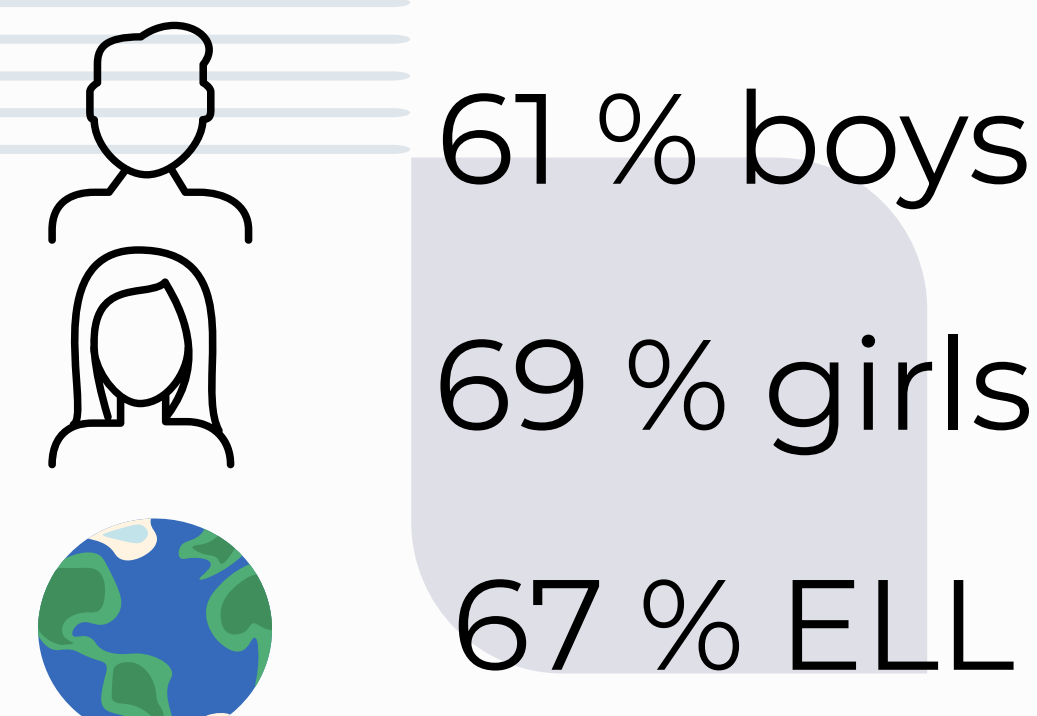
% of students at or above expected

curriculum levels



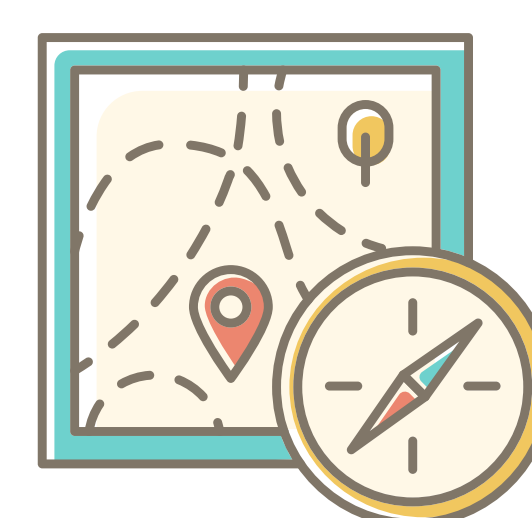

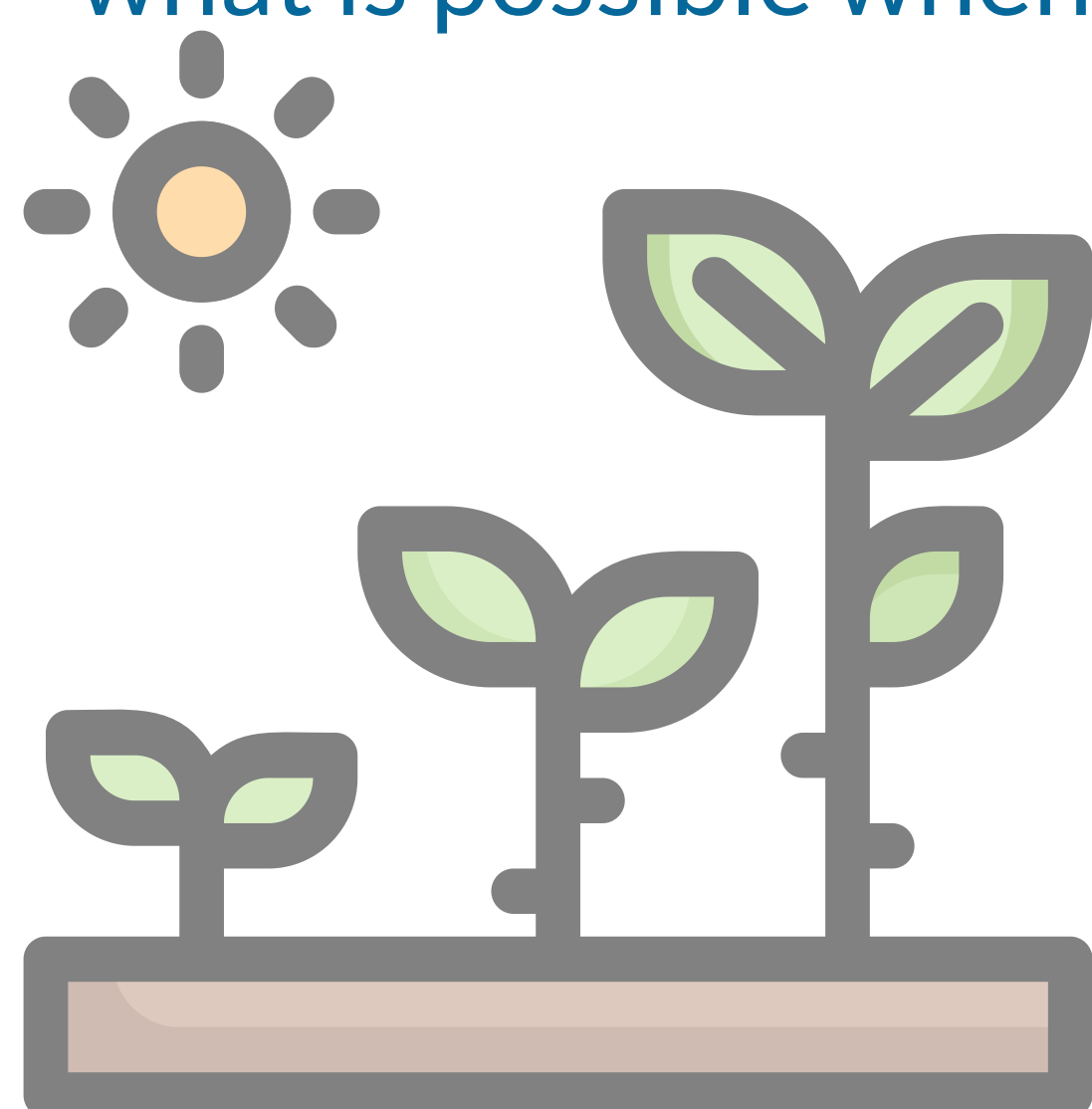
## Navigating the times we've had....

As we try and return to 'normal' in a post-Covid era, we know 2020-2022 lockdowns, isolation & illness will have an ongoing impact on student achievement and development for many years to come.



## Focussing on the positives

We are pleased to see a considerable gain in our midyear achievement data, which shows what is possible when we have sustained time at school for both students and staff.



The particularly positive results of our reading data shows that the investment of time, money and learning in Structured Literacy has been totally worth it. We will look to develop this approach further within the target area of writing.

We are also pleased to see the gains and results of our English as a 2nd language learners (approx. 45% of our roll), which again shows the impact of our support programmes and skills of our teaching and support staff.



## Priorities for 2023

Since our school opened we have grown from 100 students to nearly 450. Our staff have grown from 15 to 52. This requires careful planning and prioritising to sustain the support for our learners.

- ✓ An extensive learning support team including a large increase in Board funded Inclusive Learning Assistant (ILA) time.
- ✓ An increase in English Language Learning ILA time.
- ✓ Significant commitment to ongoing professional development for staff
- ✓ Maintain our school values of curiosity, collaboration, creativity, community mindedness and confidence in our learning programmes.



## Increased support for learners

The Board of Trustees continues to invest heavily in resourcing, professional learning and personnel support.

The Board currently spend over \$380,000 on inclusive learning support, compared to Govt funding of less than half this amount. This demonstrates our commitment to supporting our tamariki.
