Nelson City Brass is one of New Zealand's oldest bands and in recent years has been moving quickly through the ranks to be one of New Zealand's leading B Grade bands. Recent contest successes include National C Grade titles in 2016 and 2017 and second placing at the National Championships in 2018. The major sponsor of the band is the Nelson City Council and we are the only organisation within the community able to use the city's crest as their emblem.

The band runs an extremely successful concert series in between contests in Nelson's best performance venues.

Musical Director

Nigel E. Weeks originates from Wales. Appointed as Musical Director of the Continental Airlines Auckland Brass (now Dalewool) in 1994 he began a very successful partnership in both the concert and contest arena. The band, under his direction, has won five New Zealand and three Australian titles. Nigel was appointed as 'Chief Adjudicator' for the 2014 Australian Brass Band Championships.

Nigel returned to the United Kingdom in 2005 and completed his Master of the Arts at the University of Salford. During this time, he conducted the University Brass Band and was awarded a "Fellowship' enabling him to work as a part-time lecturer. He was also in demand as a conductor working with many top bands in the UK.

Nigel is an experienced music educator and has worked as Director of Music at Manurewa High School, Kings College and Macleans College Auckland where under Nigel's guidance the music department became one of the most successful in New Zealand. He is currently Head of Music at Nayland College, Nelson.

Nigel was the musical director of the 2014 National Band of New Zealand on its successful concert tour of China and South Korea and in 2017 where they gained second place at the World Championships in the Netherlands.

New Zealand

New Zealand is a small country, similar in size to Great Britain or Japan. With a population of only four million people it's also gloriously uncrowded. Inland Nelson is a wonderland of water adventure, including kayaking, rafting, boating and for those who prefer fishing, the Nelson Lakes area provides some of the best trout fishing in the world.
