





Come and join us for a celebration of our oceans in the Community Gallery as part of the International Science Festival and Puaka Matariki.

Ōku Moana (My Oceans) is an Art and Science Exhibition as part of the International Science Festival and Puaka Matariki, 2018, featuring community engagement through creative hands-on art activities, art-making and story-telling. The event will include demonstrations and workshops, around the themes of impacts on our local coastal and harbour ecosystems through ocean warming, rising sea levels and ocean acidification. **Audience:** Family friendly – Suitable for all ages, workshops and activities aimed at 8-12 year olds - with parental engagement expected. (Children must be accompanied)

Ōku Moana is an exhibition supporting story-telling, demonstrations and activities which will engage with ideas about climate change and its local impacts on Dunedin and Otago Harbour. Daily art activities combine with science demonstrations, science communication displays and an art exhibition. Special morning and afternoon sessions with guest artists and scientists.

Daily activities Monday to Friday 10.00AM – 4.00PM

Call of the Ocean – create messages with tile-stamps for our Wishing tree. We look into the past as we step into the future. Our guides are *Tethys, Hinemoana, Durga* and others.

Plankton ashore – get up close to coccolithophores - build a community of them from texture rubbings – (see times for embossed print sessions with our Resident Guest Artists Lynn Taylor and Jenny Rock).

Community Weaving – explore the world of coraline algae in local waters, density patterns and changing populations in free-weaving activities. Weave the natural ocean and explore plastic pollution.

Shell Exchange – audiences are invited to bring in clean shells from the beach to add to the *Line In The Sand* installation in the gallery and take part in the *Shell Exchange* activity. Koha for take away "Fortune Shells" and raku ceramic shells for sale.

South Dunedin Life preserver - an artwork inspired by core sample data collected by South Dunedin schools about rising waters and **South Dunedin Rising** an interactive display.

Hubble Bubbble – what's the trouble? Science demonstrations and hands on displays to illustrate atmospheric CO₂ and ocean pH.
