Saying Goodbye to All Saints' Church Lumsden

A sad farewell was given to the All Saints complex in Lumsden on Sunday 22 September at 5pm. Jenny Campbell reports on the occasion...

Final Service

On Sunday 22 September, over 30 people who had associations with All Saints Lumsden gathered to farwell this place of worship on a bright spring day.

People were asked to bring a bunch of flowers from their gardens to decorate the Church beautifully, remembering with thanksgiving all the happy and joyful memories they had experienced related to the Church and other people they met there, alongside sadness for losses over that time. They were reminded of the hope for the future by Vicar General Jan Clark and for the possibilities to continue worship, pastoral ministry and mission outreach in the area through Rural Chaplaincy.


Dot Muir (nee Menlove) told the story of her grandparents and many other Anglican families in Northern Southland, followed by their descendants, established the former building. They then went on to raise more funds to build the new church. She listed all the clergy who had ministered to local people (see below, She also talked of those who travelled further afield to take services such as at Te Anau and Milford Sound, as Lumsden was seen as the centre of a Mission District then.

Eric Swift recounted stories about the more modern era in the "new" (1966) church and how the area had become the Waimea Plains Parish. This meant that the local Vestry became part of searching for and appointing Clergy along with the Bishop. Boundary changes meant some of the smaller churches came in and out of the Parish: Mossburn, Athol, Balfour were always in Waimea Plains, while Kingston, Riversdale, Waikaia & Dipton were subject to changes.

At one stage (more recently) there were 12 Lay Ministers across the Parish with three local Priests, including Rev'd Rosemary Waller in Riversdale & later Rev'd Gillian Swift and Rev'd Vivienne Galletly from Lumsden being ordained.

We were reminded that the Katene whanau lived in Lumsden and were regular worshippers at All Saints. Ngarahu Katene, Manager of the Lumsden Bus depot (when Lumsden still had rail and many bus services centring on Lumsden) went on to ministry in Tikanga Māori. He was made Pihopatanga Bishop of Te Manawa o Te Wheke, centred in Waikato area, in 2005.

Vicar General Jan Clark read the secularisation section of the service, from Bishop Ross Bay, Commissary for the Dunedin Diocese in the absence of a bishop. A group photo was then taken. Most people went to the Lumsden Memorial Hall to enjoy soup and cheese rolls followed by cutting of a thanksgiving cake by Eric & Rev'd Gillian-Mary Swift.

Telling More Stories

Story telling and greetings followed refreshments, with **Rev'd Gillian- Mary Swift** passing on best wishes for the future and thanks for the past ministry there from previous Dunedin Diocesan Bishop George Connor.

Gerald Harley spoke about the wonderful generous financial and caring support both he and **Maureen** received while they were doing mission work in Nepal after leaving Lumsden. Several years of second-hand book sales were run by the Parish to assist their outreach. Gerald remembered especially Rev'd Lachlan McKay's brother-in-law, the famous All Black rugby player Sir Michael Jones, speaking at the men's dinner in Lumsden to raise funds for mission and ministry there.

Parishioner **Maureen Soper** (aged 92), remembered her life-long association with the church through her parents and godfather especially. She was baptised, confirmed and married in the old church. Her parents were married there too. On her way home from school she used to bike past her godfather

who worked on the railway: as she pushed her bike over the railway line, he would call her over and ask her where she had been on Sunday, if he had not seen her at Church. It was a growling, and she knew she could not get away with being absent.

Rev'd Philip Robinson wrote of his memories:

Waimea Plains was my first parish from March 1973 - July 1978. Adrienne and I made many lifelong friends while there. In 1976 a lay readers training day produced approx 6 lay readers for the parish, several of whom later were ordained.

The Kingston Flyer and Lumsden Centennial were highlights as was the Mens' Dinner of 1973 when Rob Muldoon came to speak. 208 men attended and the women catered.

The August 1975 windstorm created havoc for many farmers.

Our 2 youngest children Grant and Vaughan were born at Lumsden. Aaron remembers the big hedge and the sheep we kept in the paddock.

The vicarage was modernised in 1978 after a lamb drive fundraiser. The best 10 lambs were given by lan Gilkison and George Ruddenklau. Each lot were equal in weight and were valued at I think \$614 for the 10. A lovely coincidence.

The district and people of those times will always be in our hearts.

God bless you all.'

Rev'd Vivienne Galletly from her role as a Chaplain at Dunedin Hospital also wrote

'I send my greetings and apologies to the gathering in Lumsden tomorrow, as I am on duty at the Hospital. I obviously have special memories of the Lumsden Church and the people of the Waimea Plains. I became a Lay Minister in 1989, sharing leading my first service and reflection with Eric Swift. I was Deaconed there in January 1995 with Gillian-Mary Swift and celebrated at my first Communion service in September 1995. I have a photo of All Saints' on my living room wall which reminds me of the 21 years I spent teaching in Lumsden and all the faithful people I met there and the influence they had for good on me and my relationship with God. '

Many memories were shared of AAW gatherings, with the women always raising money from cake stalls and the like, for things needed for the church or for many different missions.

Sunday Schools set many people on their faith journeys, along with Youth Group activities, family camps and Sunday picnic services often up Dunrobin Valley. The cattle scheme was one of the big fundraisers which local farmers contributed very generously to this.

Media Release

Diocesan Registrar, Andrew Metcalfe (sadly unable to be there) gave the following information to media inquiries:

"The decision to close any church building is never taken lightly but does happen when the (Anglican) faith community around it is no longer able to sustain it. There is a particular process we follow to do this, which includes (not necessarily in this order) any local faith community requesting that they be wound up and a Property Commission being formed to look at what the options for any buildings and other assets could be. The commission reports back to our Diocesan Council and Trust Board with recommendations that both groups consider and then act on.

In this case, there has been considerable deliberation, as some identified that Lumsden does have a strategic Anglican physical presence, but we were swayed by locals who said very clearly that they were unable to maintain the church buildings any longer. We are currently looking at what to do with the church and hall contents before readying the buildings and land for sale. In this situation (as with any closure) our rules stipulate that any sale proceeds "...all property under its (the parish or church) control shall pass into the Diocese to be available for its general purposes, and shall be committed in the first instance to the Bishop to allow such arrangements to be made as will, in the opinion of the Bishop, carry out the mission of the Church in that area." (Statute 3 clause 99).

It is sad to do this, unfortunately it a sign of the times, especially in many of our rural and isolated areas (and follows a similar pattern of the loss of other organisations and resources here). All Saints Lumsden was one of the last local churches that once made up the Waimea Plains Parish, with St Mary's Waikaia being the last remaining place of Anglican worship. On a more positive note, we have been moving into developing a rural chaplaincy network and have found so far that this has attracted new people from a variety of faith contexts who are willing to support rural areas in new ways. We have also been supporting smaller congregations through a monthly on-line worship service called "the Church of the Scattered People of the Good Shepherd", with Lumsden Anglicans being part of this since its inception and also connecting to other online services.



A response to the Royal Commission report on Abuse in Care Andrew Metcalfe — September 26th, 2024

We have a further update on how the wider Anglican Communion in Aotearoa-New Zealand's response to the Royal Commission.

Nationwide Response

Please find attached the Anglican Church's response to the Royal Commission's findings of fault against the Church. This is being published by the Church further to the Commission's recommendation 130. Please feel free to share this with your organisations and communities.

The next time frame under the Commission's recommendation 131 calls for the Church to respond to the Commission's recommendations by 24 November. This will involve closer consideration and reflection on the issues and different perspectives across the Church and its affiliated organisations in relation to the various recommendations made by the Commission. There will be a variety of different issues and perspectives across schools, care organisations and different parts of the Church. We will be in touch further about this.

A reminder that The Royal Commission's recommendations ask for six different strands of response. In summary those strands are as follows:

- 1. Development and Implementation of Comprehensive Safeguarding
- 2. Mandatory Training for Leaders and Staff
- 3. Establishment of Independent Mechanisms in relation to complaints
- 4. Offering Support and Compensation for Survivors
- 5. Enhanced Accountability and Reporting Requirements
- 6. Cultural and Structural Reforms

It continues to be a privilege to be serving as Archbishops' Commissary to the Diocese of Dunedin during this time while work is undertaken for the appointment of a new bishop.

An Electoral College Arrangements Committee has been appointed by Diocesan Council to work with me on the planning for an Electoral College which we hope will take place from Friday 22 to Sunday 24 November (please make a note of this in your diaries - more details to follow).

I spent time with Diocesan Council on Tuesday 13 August and 10 September, and <u>recorded a video</u> to share thoughts on the process so far, but, more importantly, the future of the Anglican Church in New Zealand (see above).

To date the Arrangements Committee have been working and have finalised a <u>Diocesan Profile</u> (which also utilised information from the wider consultation with the Diocese) as well as initial paperwork for Electoral College members to nominate candidates for a new Bishop. This has now been shared with the Electoral College, is attached below and has been made available on our website at: https://www.calledsouth.org.nz/new-bishop-of-dunedin/.

This is a work of prayer and I encourage you to continue to be praying often about this so that we can act and decide in accordance with God's will, for the good of God's Church, and for the building of God's kingdom.

Anglican Family Care 2024 Annual General Meeting

Andrew Metcalfe — September 25th, 2024

Board members, supporters and friends met at St Matthew's Anglican Church on Wednesday 18 September to look back on the past year in what is proving to be challenging times.

Anglican Family Care AFC) Annual Report 2023/24

An AGM is always a time to give thanks - and Anglican Family Care (AFC) are always grateful to past and present Board members, staff and funders... as well as other individuals and organisations that have partnered with them over the past 12 months. This year, there has was a sense of sadness and uncertainty, reflected in opening prayers by Rev'd Canon Rose Scott which acknowledged stress and uncertainty for staff and families in a changing funding environment.

Chair of the AFC **Ruth Zeinert** reflected that a highlight over the past year was the Social Workers pay equity settlement, which has been important not only in acknowledging the importance of these workers in this sector, but also means that organisations such as AFC are able to attract and retain an effective workforce. Ruth talked about even in a very challenging contracting environment, Anglican Family Care continue to do their job and do it well, as well as keep good communication going with funders.

Practice Manager **Jane Hutton** (stepping in for Mike Williams who was on leave) started her presentation saying:

As we look back on our journey, I'm reminded of the whakataukī: *E hara taku toa i te toa takitahi, he toa takitini* – my strength is not as an individual, but as a collective. This speaks to the heart of what we do at Anglican Family Care where our collective effort enables us to serve our community and achieve great things together.

This was what enabled the team to partner with some many families and other individuals in times of crisis, trauma, victims of crime and so on.

Over the last year highlights have been: being fully staffed; success in accreditation and; trialling new pathways for victims in the Restorative Justice work they do. AFC continue to work in a child centred way (tamariki at the centre) and as an organisation they see the huge difference they have made in living out their vision, serving and meeting the needs of whānau in their care.

Guest Speaker: Helen Elder, Partnership Manager for Waitaki Council

The AGM was rounded off by a presentation from Helen Elder (QSM 2008 and 2018 White Ribbon Award). Helen holds an interesting role as facilitator of **Stronger Waitaki Collaboration**, which has brought together a variety of not for profit and other organisations in the Waitaki area together, with a focus on community building. This includes safety, community health, well-being and development. Anglican Family Care Oamaru is an active part of this networking, especially in the management group as well as contributing expertise and knowledge in family-whānau resources, sexual violence as well as the mental health & addictions network.

The main aim of this network has to build community capability and capacity to meet what the wider community wants and needs. They have pioneered specific programmes in high schools around the white ribbon initiative (stopping violence/identifying mental health needs), which include student produced video projects. They have also run national conferences in Oamaru dealing with family, sexual violence and rainbow issues - topics that sometimes don't get much on an airing in smaller communities. Locally, they have also been working hard in one area of real need in the Waitaki district i.e. access to mental health services.

One critical success factor for them is that are (ironically) not a legal entity but are a coalition. This means they can successfully advocate for member organisations without potential fallout from funders that others may want to avoid.

Please continue to remember Anglican Family Care as they face real challenges, but also draw strength from collaborations they have, including with the Diocese of Dunedin.

Gene Editing (GE) in Aotearoa New Zealand and beyond

ICBC — September 26th, 2024

Gene editing was last reviewed in Aotearoa New Zealand some 20 years ago. The current coalition government has promised to start reviewing GE legislation this year, and enact new legislation by the end of 2025.

The InterChurch Bioethics Council agrees that our GE regulation needs to be reassessed due to GE technology and its scope having advanced considerably in recent years. However, we urge an emphasis on the government's full public consultation with easily accessible and understandable information about GE, so that New Zealanders can make their own informed decisions about the ethical use of gene technology in the many different contexts that are now possible.

This resource (attached) has been compiled to give the general public a brief summary of updated information on gene editing. Discussion starters are included to begin individual and group exploration of the benefits and risks that might surround the many possible and potential uses of gene editing technology today and into the future.

Feel free to use this resource in any groups/events you may have to talk about (and respond) to important public issues.

Michael is taking a different approach to histories that have been produced in the past. He says:


I'm looking for memories and stories to add the human touch that I am trying to emphasise......

'Safe Faiths' survey open now

A survey is now open to Takatāpui / Rainbow Christians (from all Christian denominations in Aotearoa), and allies/advocates of Takatāpui / Rainbow Christians.

This project is led by five Christians who have created this 'Safe Faiths' survey because they are concerned that there is little or no research or quantitative data that explores whether Takatāpui / Rainbow people of faith feel safe attending their church or faith community. The results of this survey will be used to raise awareness of issues faced by Takatāpui / Rainbow people of faith in Aotearoa New Zealand and to support Takatāpui / Rainbow advocacy work, both within the church and more widely.

This 'Safe Faiths' survey is hosted by the Kingi Ihaka Research Centre, and has been co-created with Diverse Church. The Kingi Ihaka Research Centre is a Christian, kaupapa Māori research centre. Diverse Church is a network of safe faith communities in Aotearoa.

Liz Cheyne and John Murphy have trained up a number of lay leaders, and they are going to pool their wisdom to give us a thoroughly practical and useful teaching session.



It is an essential requirement to ensure that you have attended a Boundaries Workshop within the last three years if you wish to be re-licensed or are being Licensed for the first time with a Lay Licence. Current Lay Minister Licences expire at Pentecost 2025 and attendance at one of the sessions before Pentecost is necessary if you wish to be licensed.

Clergy:

All Clergy undertaking ministry, whether full time, part time, or on occasion, have an obligation to protect all who we minister to and amongst.

It is a requirement that all Clergy with a PTO or Licence attend a Boundaries Workshop every three years, as a minimum. If you haven't attended a course in the last three years, you will need to ensure you attend one of these sessions so that your Licence or PTO is able to remain current or be renewed.
