Making Tracks

Andrew Metcalfe — May 4th, 2022

How are you preparing for the next stages in your life? This can be hard to contemplate, but really important to do - and even more so for faith communities.

We have been pulling together some resources to help faith communities plan for their future, especially when it becomes clear that they may not exist in the future as they are now.

Bishop Steve writes:

I firmly believe that the church will continue, but it may not look like it does today. I've heartened by all of the fresh shoots of new life I see around the Diocese, but also aware that many faith communities are struggling to keep going and are not sure what to do next. Having difficult conversations about the future are important, and give an opportunity to make decisions that can pass on the baton of faith to those who will come after us, to enable them to continue to share the love of Christ in fresh ways. Making Tracks is a term that describes a people of faith who are not stuck in the same place, but are looking to see where God is leading them next.

With thanks to the <u>Anglican Diocese of Fredericton</u> (Canada), we have a new webpage, information and resources on how to tackle this.

This talks about the following steps:

Beginning the process

Find space to have a frank and open discussion about the building and/or faith community. Find the best person to chair/facilitate this and try and look at all the options. Contact the Bishop with your decision/request (via a vestry/committee motion and general meeting motion).

Remembering and Moving On

Any process like this is hard: make sure you give space and time for people to reflect, remember and share their stories. Make time to talk and decide "What happens next?", what the options are for "making tracks". Ensure that people are cared for pastorally throughout this time. Identify future options for continuing to pray, read the scriptures and live out Christ's life in your communities.

Practical Matters - Closure-Secularisation of a church building

Check out what you need to do around closing a building and selling or making it available for new ministries. If closure takes place, a building needs to be secularised (released for secular use) by the Bishop at an arranged worship service. Make sure you think carefully about the contents of the building – how will you dispose of them? Is there anyone who gave items that you could give back? Can anything

be passed onto another faith community to use? What about areas where ashes or human remains are interred? Where can our church records be archived so that our history is not lost? Contact the Diocesan Office (Registrar) to help work through any practicalities.





The Mystery of a Crest Andrew Metcalfe — May 4th, 2022

You will be familiar with the crest for the Diocese of Dunedin... but who designed it and how did it come about?

We were asked this from an interesting source. Rev'd Liz Greville JP, Mihana Awhina/Missioner for Te Hui Amorangi ki te Upoko o te Ika (north of Wellington) requested a high resolution copy of our crest, and if we knew anything about it's history and how it came about. She writes:

I am developing a work about the establishing of the Anglican Dioceses and Amorangi in Aotearoa NZ. One part of the learning will be a timeline with the crests on it and relate to other components currently being worked on as part of our NZ church history unit.

So, with a little bit of sleuthing, we came up with... not much to pass on. We were wondering if anyone out there has anything they recall about our Diocesan crest?

We asked the Ven Bernard Wilkinson and Dr Tony Fitchett what they knew, and Tony wrote back saying:

I'm afraid I don't know anything about the background of the coat of arms, apart from the fact that (my) grandfather was involved it getting it made official. I assume the stars represent the Southern Cross - the arms of several dioceses have stars, but generally only three, derived, I think, from the Diocese of Auckland [which, as the Diocese of NZ, once included the whole country, as well as Melanesia] - and the book is presumably the Bible.

We did pass on some information as follows:

The office has a copy of an official certificate (attached) that was issued in 1949 to Bishop Fitchett confirming our crest. The Diocese was formed on 1 January 1869 (formerly it came under the Anglican Diocese of Christchurch) and <u>originally the crest of Bishop Nevil Tarrant</u> was used. The certificate we have says it is "Gules a Saltire between four Mullets Argent surrounded by an open Bible". Gules is a darker shade of red, mullet means a straight sided star with "argent" being the white border to the star.

We have also found reference to commissioning of the seal in 15 October 1931 in papers past, as reported in an Otago Daily Times (page 6) newspaper account of what went on in Synod.

Climate Change: How are we doing?

The Social Justice Committee have released survey results from a recent survey to our faith communities.

At the September 2021 Synod meeting Synod Representatives voted on your behalf to pass Motion 7 on Climate Change. The motion indicated that Synod recognised that we all have a responsibility to rethink the way we live to meet the challenges of climate change, and said: "Individuals, parishes and organisations across the Diocese are urged to take action and seek to live more sustainably."

The Social Justice Committee of the Diocesan Council prepared a short survey to learn how faith communities in our Diocese are responding to this call to sustain God's creation. Survey questions asked:

- What level of interest did parishioners have in finding ways to live more sustainably?
- To what extent has climate change been discussed in your Church/Ministry Unit?
- Is your Church/Ministry Unit currently taking action to live more sustainably?
- Are you joining with any other Church or community groups to carry out this activity?
- Is your Church/Ministry Unit planning to take action to live more sustainably in the near future?
- What resources would you like to have.. and what can you give in this area?
- What changes do you think are needed to lessen the risk of climate change on your Church/Ministry Unit?

Although it would have been great to have had more respondents, there were some good examples of ways that many churches are looking seriously at the 5th mark of mission: "To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and re-new the life of the earth".

Around half of the respondents indicated their churches were very interested in finding ways to live more sustainably, with about a third of respondents reporting that it was regularly discussed in their setting. Half of the respondents indicated their churches were taking action to live more sustainably, including some examples of collaborating with others in their local area.

There were some good examples of what different faith communities are doing, as well as some bigger picture ideas of what could be done to lesson the risk of climate change.

How could your faith community could start having more intentional conversations about climate change?

Why not have climate change as an agenda item on your Vestry or Church Committee and start talking about ways that you could start to make a difference?

Get in touch with the Committee via its chair, <u>Ondine Godtschalk</u> if you have resources or ideas you would like to offer, or if you would like to connect with other faith communities who have started this journey. Keep watching this space for resources and information to come.

- Earthed in Hope: Dying, Death, and Funerals (Philip Garside Publishing, Wellington, 2014)


He's now working on a third book that focuses on the fact that you and I are going to die.

As well as being a parish priest, Alister has served as a transitional priest – ministering with faith communities in times of change – as an educator, counsellor, and has specialised in funeral ministry.



Boundaries Workshop Series for 2022

Bishop Steven Benford and Diocesan Educators — May 13th, 2022

Reminder of next two workshops in May.....

The Diocesan Ministry Educator, Ven Dr Michael Godfrey, and the Diocesan CYF Educator, Rev'd John Graveston are leading a series of Diocesan wide Boundaries Workshops. Attendance at a Boundaries workshop every three years is an essential requirement for those wishing to hold, or holding, a Licence or Permission to Officiate from the Bishop.

Bishop Steve writes:

Lay Ministers:

It is an essential requirement to ensure that you have attended a Boundaries Workshop within the last three years if you wish to be re-licensed or are being Licensed for the first time with a Lay Licence. Current Lay Minister Licences expire this Pentecost and attendance at one of the sessions listed below is necessary if you wish to be licensed.

Clergy:

Until now, it has only been a requirement for Clergy holding a Licence (not a PTO) to complete Boundaries Training every three years. In view of the increased responsibilities being undertaken by those with a PTO, I have come to realise that this does not meet current best practice. As Clergy undertaking ministry, whether full time, part time, or on occasion, we have an obligation to protect all who we minister to and amongst.

And so, from the beginning of 2022, it is a requirement that all Clergy with a PTO or Licence attend a Boundaries Workshop every three years, as a minimum. *If you haven't attended a course in the last three years, you will need to ensure you attend one of these sessions so that your Licence or PTO is able to remain current or be renewed.*

Who can join us for any of our services?

New Zealand COVID-19 Protection Framework (Traffic Lights): Diocese of Dunedin Response

Diocesan Office — May 2nd, 2022

Our updated guidance on the traffic light settings from 3 May 2022 **with further clarification around wearing masks at Church**. We remain at Orange (from 14 April 2022).

Highlights for All Levels

Level Red

- All churches and faith communities advised to have contingency plans
- Limit of 200 people at any indoor gathering based on 1-meter distancing
- Face masks must be worn at all gatherings
- Meetings in private homes do not require face masks (but we recommend groups reach agreement on this)
- Medical grade masks must be worn by all leading and serving in worship services
- Strongly advising communion in one kind (bread) only and that people return to their seats to consume the bread.
- There is no requirement to scan in or for a business to display a QR code poster or have mandatory record keeping, but we are recommending this is kept in place for our settings.

Level Orange

- There is no limit for outdoor gatherings.
- There is no limit for indoor gatherings.
- You do not need to wear a face mask outdoors.
- Other face mask rules remain unchanged (see Government advice for places of worship below).
- There is no requirement to scan in or for a business to display a QR code poster or have mandatory record keeping.

Level Green

- There are no restrictions.
- We encourage you to keep up good health behaviours.
- There is no requirement to scan in or for a business to display a QR code poster or have mandatory record keeping.

Good Health Behaviours

These include:

- Wear a face mask
- Do it for each other
- Stay home if you are sick
- Wash your hands or use hand sanitiser
- Cough or sneeze into your elbow
- Clean or disinfect shared surfaces regularly
- Improve ventilation
- Keep your distance from people you do not know
- Keep track of where you have been
- Stay up to date with your vaccinations

Our Response

A note from Bishop Steve

Tēnā koutou Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

The letter to the Hebrews reminds us about having faith and "The Message" translation of Chapter 11 verses 1 and 2 reads:

The fundamental fact of existence is that this trust in God, this faith, is the firm foundation under everything that makes life worth living. It's our handle on what we can't see. The act of faith is what distinguished our ancestors, set them above the crowd.

Over the past 2 years we have all been affected by something we can't see, but as the current variation of COVID-19 makes its way around our communities, we continue to hold onto another firm foundation of faith that influences our response to everything taking place.

Of many lessons we have learnt, we now know so much more about how to keep ourselves safe than we did two years ago. There is nothing like a pandemic to sharpen up some of our health and safety practices!

As our country's response changes and New Zealand opens up itself more to each other and the wider world, I want to encourage us all to stay tuned into our own local communities needs and respond as we need to. This means that even though there may be fewer restrictions on what we are required to do, we will continue to keep our most vulnerable members safe by practicing good public health measures. This will ensure that our faith communities don't become "super spreader" sites. In many ways, this is similar to the Alert Level 2 precautions we had in place, where we figured out better and safer ways to worship.

If your faith community is feeling vulnerable and needs to take it easy around "opening up" completely i.e. you want to remain with vaccine pass only services for a while longer, you have my support for this. Alternatively, if you feel the time is right to move to a less restrictive setting (mixed serves where no vaccine passes are required), then you have my support for this as well. **Please advertise clearly what**

you are doing - and let Andrew or Nicola in the office know so we can update our <u>on-line worship</u> <u>page</u>. Have your contingency plans in place if you have to change how you do things for a while: the office is happy to assist with Zoom links if you need to go back on-line for any gathering.

For those of you who are continuing to follow our advice around having Eucharist in one kind only (bread) you may like to take the opportunity this Easter to share the wine again, but with clear messaging that this is only for those who want to do so (please see below for more guidance around this).

Thank you for all that you have been doing to keep each other safe and caring for so many around you. As I write this our season of Lent is drawing to a close, we look forward to the day of resurrection where we recall how Christ has indeed overcome the old order of fear, sin and death. Thanks be to God!

Our Guidance

This guidance seeks to enable Faith Communities in our Diocese to maximise three key goals in an imperfect situation:

- to be as safe as possible;
- to be as inclusive as possible; (where "inclusive" is about welcome, pastoral care, sacramental ministry, and best-effort community participation); and
- to be as adaptive to local circumstances as possible.

Our response to the New Zealand COVID-19 Protection Framework ("Traffic Lights") framework put in place by the NZ Government is that:

- 1. All Faith Communities (parishes, regional deaneries, local churches and Cathedrals) must follow Government regulations.
- 2. Local arrangements (as permitted within the regulations) for services and other gatherings in each Faith Community are to be made by the Dean/Vicar(s)/Priest(s) in charge **and** Vestry/Church Committee/Greater Cour response document hapter.
- 3. "Gatherings" includes all meetings of groups, children's ministries, youth ministries, and ministries to the elderly which take place on church premises such as a church, hall or church lounge, or which take place in another venue hired by the church, such as a local community hall or a campsite for the purpose of holding a camp or retreat. They also include church gatherings in private homes (as already covered in our existing Action Plans).
- 4. There are no restrictions to attending indoor gatherings of up to 200 people at Red, but some may continue to offer Vaccine Pass Only services. Faith Communities who wish to offer a service or services or other gatherings, for which each attendee needs to present a vaccination pass, are encouraged to do so. Download the NZ Pass Verifier
- **5. Each Faith Community must advertise its own services clearly** (e.g. on their website, social media, church noticeboards, newspaper advertising, via the <u>Diocesan Website</u>) so that attendees understand whether the service or gathering they are planning to attend will or will not require a vaccination pass to be presented by each attendee.

6. In any situation where doubt as to the application of these guidelines arises, or difference of viewpoint within a Faith Community cannot be resolved, consultation with the Archdeacon should take place. Where necessary the Archdeacon will consult with the Bishop. **The Bishop's decision on any such matter shall be final.**

Principles for Worship at All Settings

- a. At the Red settings, the wearing of face masks is required in all indoor gatherings, including when singing. At Orange, the wearing of a face mask by attendees is strongly encouraged.
- b. **In services with Singers in a choir or music group**, participants may sing without a mask, providing the choir or music group is at least 2m distant from other persons present in the service.
- c. At Red and Orange, all Workers and volunteers (Clergy, people with a lay license) must wear a medical grade facemask (for example a Type IIR/Level 2 mask or above) while working in public facing roles. These include the widely available 'blue' medical grade mask.
- d. **Face masks may be removed temporarily** by a person leading parts of the service, reading Scripture, leading intercessions, giving notices or preaching; the presider at eucharist/communion and any assistant at communion may be masked through the Great Thanksgiving when not speaking and during distribution of communion to the people.

e. Eucharist/Communion

- All presiders and servers must practice good hand hygiene. This means washing or sanitising hands before ablutions (ritual purification) and handling/distributing any sacraments.
- Eucharist in both kinds (bread and wine) from Easter Sunday 2022. Make sure that when communion is offered that people are under no compulsion to take it some may be more comfortable with receiving in one kind only or requesting a blessing.
- We recommend people receive the Eucharist while standing. This avoids any contact with altar rails.
- Any president at Eucharist/Communion can restrict communion to one kind (bread) only if there are any concerns about the presence of COVID-19 in the community.
- f. **Good Health Behaviours: we recommend these are followed at all times (see above).** Previous guidance from the Diocese concerning non-contact forms of The Peace, hygiene, ministry to children, youth, the elderly, as previously issued for **COVID-19 Alert Level 2** or subsequently updated should be followed.
- g. **Meetings in private homes do not require face masks**, but we recommend groups reach agreement on this, recognising that current COVID-19 variants are more transmissible.
- h. **Hospitality:** If you are operating a **gathering[1]**, you can serve food and drink at Green, Orange or Red. We are not recommending offering of indoor hospitality at Level Red if there is active transmission in the community.

Please note: where Government Guidance talks about 1-metre physical distancing and capacity limits: Capacity limits are based on the maximum number of people who could occupy the space if each person was 1 metre apart. People do not have to keep 1 metre apart at the venue. In some cases a maximum number is also specified. The limits include everyone, including children, in a defined space, except workers.

Leaders in Ministry (Clergy and Lay)

The Bishop has previously indicated that all lay people involved in public-facing public ministries related to a worship service or other parish/church work must be fully vaccinated at vaccination-only services or gatherings and when performing other work where vaccination is required. Such people include ushers, readers, ministers of the Eucharist, collectors, those leading liturgies of the Word, and undertaking Communion to the sick and home visitation. It also includes people involved in ministry with children and young people under the age of 18 years.

Priests who were not fully vaccinated were, under previous public health orders, significantly constrained in their ministry and were asked to confirm their vaccination status to be able to continue ministry.

We are currently seeking advice around this as settings are adjusting: if there are any queries around this, please contact Bishop Steve though his EA, Nicola Wong ph. 03 488 0826.

Suggested publicity for pew sheets and posters

We are now operating under the New Zealand COVID-19 Protection Framework (Traffic Lights). The current traffic light setting is (*Green, Orange, Red*).

The following Mixed Service(s) are open to everyone, but precautions are in place: (replace these words with your details). Please continue to sanitise/wash your hands, scan or sign in for local contact tracing purposes. You must wear a mask at all times and keep 1 meter distance from others. There will be maximum numbers we can have at any service in the Red setting of 200. Communion may be in one kind only at Red – please take the bread back with you to your seat to consume.

The following service(s) are open to anyone with a current Vaccine Pass: (replace these words with your details). There are no restrictions, but you must wear a face mask and give each other plenty of room. We are asking that you keep your face mask on when singing. Please show us your vaccine pass, continue to sanitise/wash your hands, scan or sign in for local contact tracing purposes.
