The Social Transformation committee meets on a monthly basis, and is using Zoom (video conference) technology for any members who are not resident in Dunedin. The Purpose of the Social Transformation Committee is as follows:

To support the prophetic role of the Church around social justice and service in and with the community, and enable the effective contribution of existing and new Church-initiated service and activities for social transformation. To strengthen collaboration between Church initiated services around their future sustainability, impact and links with other parish and Diocesan work.

Key Tasks of the STC:

- Provide an ongoing vehicle for conversation, shared information, vision and action between church social service organisations (Leslie Groves home and hospital, St Barnabas, Parata, Takitimu, NOAH, Anglican Family Care, South Centre).
- Encourage these organisations in the performance of first rate social services consistent with the mission aims of the diocese.
- Create forums and connections between parish level action and these agencies

- Identify opportunities for collaboration/new ways of organising/responding to community needs, including small scale actions with a social transformation focus
 - Build new connections to foster and support new ministries around identified needs
 - Elect representations to the NZ Council of Christian Social Services, Anglican Care Network.
 - Utilise the investment income from endowments and invite applications for grants that respond to the social transformation committee purposes and endowment parameters.
 - Prepare an annual plan with strategies that can be aligned to the vision and mission of the Anglican Church and relevant programmes/initiatives that utilise income from trust endowments.

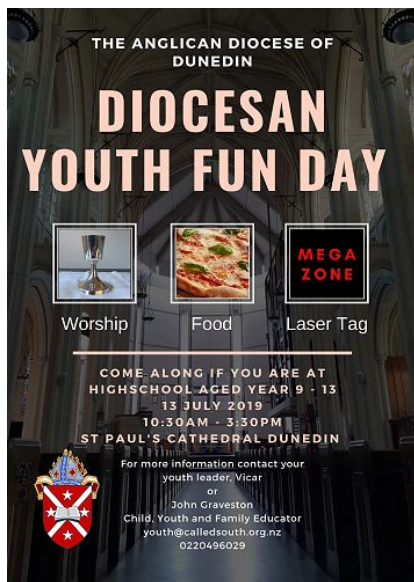

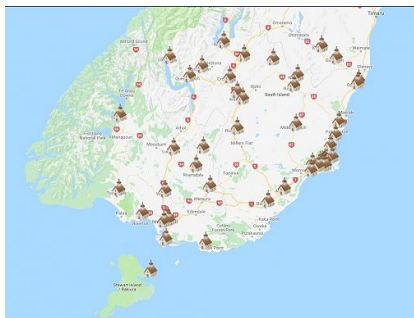

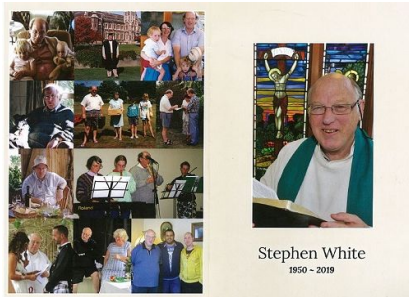

Selwyn Consultation Panel Update 26 June 2019

Submissions to the Selwyn Consultation Panel have now closed and the Panel are reviewing information that has been given as well as working on the next phase of the consultation process. This will include a Diocesan Hui for all Synod members on Saturday 2 November.

Hui details are still being finalised, but please put this date in your diary and plan to attend in Dunedin (venue to be confirmed) on 2 November between 10.30 am and 3.30 pm.

As this year includes celebrations for 150 years of Synod, the Panel have decided to hold a Hui (Conference Session of Synod) at another date that will still allow them to give recommendations to the Diocesan Council before the end of the year. The Hui (Conference Session) is open for Synod members only and is a non-voting event. It will give an opportunity to explore various options for Selwyn (including any new ideas from the floor), look at important biblical and theological imperatives and for Synod members to rank them in order of preference. This will give a snapshot of the view of the Synod on the future of Selwyn and assist the panel in their recommendations.

For background information and progress to date, please see below.

A. Some background

The Selwyn College Consultation Panel results from outcomes from the Diocese of Dunedin Synods of 2017 and 2018.

A potential sale of Selwyn College was raised in 2017 with the Bill proposing this being laid on the table during Synod proceedings. In 2018 this Bill was withdrawn and another Bill to clarify how any potential sale proceeds would be handled was also rejected. However, the following motion was carried as follows:

Motion 6: Selwyn College - That this Synod authorises the Dunedin Diocesan Trust Board, at the direction of the Diocesan Council specific to the particular proposal being considered:

1. To sell the buildings and business of Selwyn College to the University of Otago, or another body in which the Diocesan Council has confidence that it is able to govern and manage the College according to best practice and for the benefit and well-being of its residents, subject to a formal undertaking by the purchaser to maintain the special character of the College.
2. To retain ownership of the land occupied at present by the College, and to enter into an agreement to lease that land to any purchaser of the College buildings and business, on a modern "Glasgow" type lease with 7 year ground-rent reviews.
3. To enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the purchaser regarding Clause 1 and 2 of this Resolution and the maintenance of the special character of the College, including a commitment to an ongoing relationship with the Bishop of Dunedin, who will report to Synod annually regarding the fulfillment of the Memorandum.

[A media release](#) dealing with this decision was made after Synod. The Selwyn Decision from the 2018 Synod resulted in a significant amount of correspondence that was taken to the October 2018 meeting of the Diocesan Council (the Synod Standing Committee). After discussing these in committee, a subsequent media release outlined a proposed [Selwyn College Consultation Panel](#)

B. Make-up of the Panel

Members of the Panel have been selected carefully to ensure that there is no conflict of interest or personal investment in the outcome of the discussions. Each member has experience in Anglican-affiliated educational or residential institutions. [Click here](#) to see a previous update introducing panel members.

C. Process

The following is the process the Panel plans to follow. We are presently moving into Stage 2:

- **Stage 1 - Establishing foundations:** Hear from major stakeholders and establish relevant theological and missiological principles to work by
- **Stage 2 - Broadening the listening process:** Meet with Selwyn staff and students and other identified key stakeholders. Gather written submissions from the wider church and offer opportunities for further face-to-face meetings. ***This phase of the listening process has mostly been completed, with requests for 1:1 time with the Consultation Panel being allocated during July and August scheduled meetings. Submissions were encouraged around two questions: (1) To what extent do you see the Anglican involvement in a residential college as important for the future mission and work of the Anglican Church? (2) If we were to move out of residential college provision, what would be the best use of our resources within the tertiary education sector mission field?***

- **Stage 3 - Drafting models:** Draw together a range of possible models for moving forward, in the light of submissions and consultations. Identify the theological implications of each model. *This is currently in progress*
- **Stage 4 - Diocesan Hui:** Gather those interested from across the Diocese for a positive and open discussion of the models suggested by the Panel, together with any other models arising from discussions. *Saturday 2 November, 10.30 am to 3 pm, the Hui is in early planning stages, more information to follow*
- **Stage 5 - Reporting:** Present a final report to the Diocesan Council, identifying the consequences of each model and ranking preferred options.

INTRODUCTION

Michael Godfrey writes:

As I move around the national church and this diocese I am privileged to worship in a vast range of contexts. The *taonga* of liturgy (not only in Aotearoa New Zealand) never ceases to wow me. That is not to say that it is always presented well, but I am wowed that it is presented at all, and that it is saturated with the wisdom of God's Spirit who has dwelt among the people of God since soon after she first moved on the "face of the deep."

I have participated in liturgical gatherings of thousands (occasionally), and when two or three are gathered. In this country alone I have worshipped liturgically from Kaitaia to Oban. I haven't presided at or prepared liturgy for thousands at any one time, but I have done so in more contexts than I can name. Every one is different, and should be, even on the same day, in the same place. God's Spirit is dynamic!

Liturgy happens, but not always in churches, of course. But, to return to the old fashioned protocol of using a capitalized initial for the **P**eople rather than the building, where liturgy is the Church always is.

And always, always the potential is there for this wonderful vehicle of the gospel to sing to the heavens from the human soul, and from the heavens to the human soul.

But its potential as a window on and doorway to heaven is greatly enhanced when we reflect on what it all means, why it's there, and how we can best convey its ancient wisdom.

So for the next many weeks I will produce here my thoughts on this great gift of God.

This collection of observations of the liturgy was originally printed in the weekly newsletter of Christ Church Anglican Parish in Whangarei during 2007, when I was vicar there. Later they were reproduced on the website of the Diocese of Auckland, in the pew sheets of Waiapu Cathedral, and later still those of the Parish of the Wakatipu (whose members are excused from this journey!).

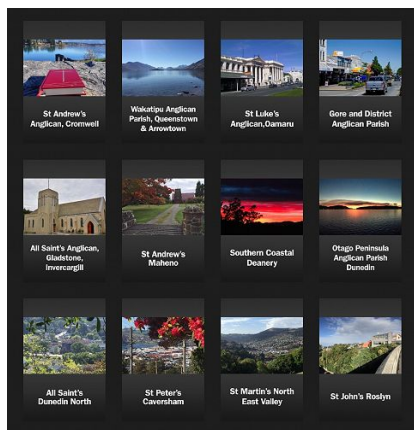
But wherever we celebrate the saving acts of God the resource of liturgy is the same, despite local and personal variations: ours is the liturgy of the wider church, not any one parish or faith community.

Nothing amongst the thoughts that will follow is—nor should be—startlingly original; the liturgy is an ancient drama that has taken shape over nearly two thousand years. Or more, as we shall see. Still: my musings may contain some thoughts that are new for some, or some old thoughts expressed in vaguely new ways.

They are based on a single premise: **the Eucharistic liturgy is the very best form of sacred drama by which to approach God, encounter God, receive God, offer ourselves to God.** The liturgy is extremely flexible, but the overall shape is sacred. I am yet to see an experimental or so-called 'relevant' form of liturgy that surpasses the traditional forms as a vehicle of divine encounter.

That is not to say every liturgy has to be a clone of its predecessor. God forbid! The liturgy is divine drama, always in-breathed with the changing, dynamic power of God's Spirit. It must always adapt itself to the needs of its location and its participants. But its shape bears the signature of God, and we erase that at great peril.

So watch this space...."

Helping Connect People in the Diocese of Dunedin

How do I use Zoom?

If you have a **computer, laptop or other device (mobile telephone, tablet)** that has a camera and speakers, you can join in a meeting with others. **NB:** it is best to be connected to the internet in some way, or you may put a significant dent in your mobile data plan!

Firstly, get a free Zoom account. This will allow you to join a meeting easily if someone sends you a link to it. You can do this free at <https://zoom.us/signup>.

- **Tip:** Part of the process involves giving an email address for an activation email. This works best if you are signing up from a device (phone, computer etc) that you are also able to receive this email from. Once you have activated your account, you can sign in from any device using your activation email and password.
- Have a look at the bottom of the sign up page, there are links in the **Downloads** menu for apps you can install. If you are on a PC or laptop, download the **Meetings client**. You will see also links to **Android** and **iPhone/iPad** apps (you can search for them in your app store, just put "Zoom" into the search box).

How do I join a meeting?

- **Landline phone or mobile phone:** you can call using voice only (not video), dial one of the following numbers. **09 801 1188** or **04 831 8959**. You will be prompted to give a meeting ID number which is **643 488 0821 #**
- **Please note** this may incur a charge if your landline or mobile plan does not give you toll calls for free

- **Overseas?** <https://zoom.us/j/8123456789> gives options for you to call a “local” number in the country you are in - use the same meeting ID number as above.

Anything to keep an eye on?

Make sure you look at what is on the Zoom screen - is your microphone working and your camera turned on? There are controls there where you can fix any problems on the bottom part of the screen. Zoom has some [tutorials](#) that you may find helpful.

Want to set up a meeting for yourself?

If you are signed up for Zoom you can organise a one-to-one meeting with any other person also signed up to Zoom - all for free.

Synod 13-15 September 2019 Essential Information

Read on for updated information for all Clergy and Lay representatives for Synod 2019. The latest attachment is the Memo 1 for Synod representatives which has been amended slightly (i.e. clarifying that we are electing representatives for General Synod). Key deadlines for Synod are now published below. More information will be posted here as it becomes available throughout the

year. Please bookmark this page and check for any updates.

Synod is taking place at St John's Church, Roslyn, Dunedin, from Friday 13 September to Sunday 15 September.

Some Key Deadlines for Synod:

- **Reports** - these must be in by **Friday 19 July** for inclusion in the Synod book (reminders will go out on Friday 21 June)
- **Bills and Motions** need to be the Registrar 50 days before Synod i.e. **Thursday July 25**, so that they can be submitted to the Committee of Statutes and Sanding Orders on Thursday 1 August and received back on 15 August
- **The Synod Book** will be physically posted (and available on-line) on **August 19**. This should allow people to access/read 21 days before Synod.

Synod will convene on **Friday 13th September at 7.00 pm** with the Synod Eucharist (venue to be confirmed). It will reconvene Saturday 14th at 8.30am at St John's Roslyn and will conclude no later than 3.00 pm on Sunday 15th September. We are also planning a **service at the Cathedral on**

Sunday 15th at 10 am as part of the weekend to celebrate 150 years of the Diocese of Dunedin being in existence.

Lay representatives to Diocesan Synod are elected on a two year cycle. Elections were held at Parish AGMs last year in 2018. So if you were a Synod representative at Synod last year, your term continues to Synod 2019 also.

A reminder that the [Guide to Synod](#) is useful to have a look at.

Also, check out the **2018 Year Book** attached below which contains a record of the proceedings from Synod 2018.

Synod 2018 was the first session of the sixtieth Synod - in part 2 one of the tasks is to elect **Diocese of Dunedin representatives for the Tikanga Pakeha Conference** which is due to meet in Nelson from 9-15 May 2020.

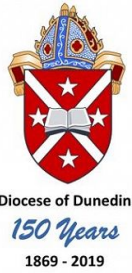
