#### **Statement on Ukraine**

Across the globe people are horrified by the invasion of Ukraine by Russia.

In a region that learnt the devastating lessons of war last century, the pattern has the tragic possibility of repeating. It flies in the face of much of the progress in peaceful coexistence that Europe has made in recent decades.

Once again, on European soil, we see the rights and wellbeing of millions of ordinary people trampled on by an aggressive and entitled leader.

It also flies in the face of the Jesus-values of peacemaking. In this instance, those values call us to stand against violence and stand with the oppressed.

Those values call for de-escalation and peace talks.

They call for humility and kindness.

As Christians we stand in solidarity with the vast chorus of voices calling for the aggression to end and the peaceful solutions to begin.



This was Archdeacon Tiki Raumati's oft repeated korero, speaking out of his people's lived experience of the inter generation impact of naked aggression and the greed for land.

# Lay Ministers Training in a Virtual World...

Andrew Metcalfe — March 2nd, 2022

On Saturday 26 February the Diocese of Dunedin Lay Ministers' training was moved on-line, with nearly 60 people participating by Zoom.



Expectation of Licensed Lay Ministers Called South

After Morning Prayer with <u>Bishop Steve</u>, <u>Steve spoke of his "expectations"</u> of lay leaders, which are strongly connected to the Diocesan vision of a people who "read the Bible, pray and live out the risen life of Christ", encouraging people to have a regular routine of times in the day when they do this, as well as recognising our dependence on God. (Please note, the above video kicks in after about 7 minutes).



New Ways of Being Church Called South

Diocesan Community Ministry Enabler, the Ven Dr Anne van Gend led a stimulating session on <a href="mailto:new-ways of-being church">new-ways of being church</a>, including a wide range of models that started from what we already know (traditional parish structures with paid clergy and laity) through to a huge variety of other options (Anne's presentation is attached below). Minister models, local and regional shared ministry, ecumenical ministry, various chaplaincy models, team models, on-line church...right through to looking for and encouraging green shoots i.e. small beginnings, study groups etc.

After this, the training day went into break out rooms to hear <u>Rev'd Vivienne Galletly reflect on</u>

<u>Pastoral Care in a COVID</u> world and Diocesan Ministry Educator the <u>Ven Dr Michael Godfrey with the topic of leading extended communion.</u>

#### **Pastoral Care in a COVID world**

Among the resources that Vivienne Galletly shared was a reminder that in any connecting we are doing with people, we need to be present, have an overarching sense of "shalom" (peace), not to try and problem solve everything but instead be active listeners to draw out the story of what is happening in people's lives.

Being grateful (even in very trying circumstances) is really important (see <a href="https://www.begreat.co.nz/">https://www.begreat.co.nz/</a>) and we have wonderful resources that we can connect to, such as the practice of Examen (an end of the day reflection that can follow a variety of formats, but includes

asking for God's grace, giving thanks for God's gifts, recognising our faults, asking for forgiveness and looking forward to tomorrow), through to wider mental health resources such as those found on <a href="https://www.sanctuarymentalhealth.org/">https://www.sanctuarymentalhealth.org/</a>. Why not let more people know about the 1737 number to text, or 0800 1737 1737 to phone which connects to mental health in a time of crisis?

The <u>Pastoral Care Handbook</u> by Rev'd Graham Redding is also worth looking at.

Vivienne also shared a <u>Margaret Rizza video</u> she often uses in her chaplaincy ministry that can help people to connect into God's love and presence:

## **Gospel Conversations**

Michael Godfrey — March 2nd, 2022

Welcome back to Gospel Conversations for 2022! Lent 1, Luke 4:1-13.

#### See all the videos in this series on our website

Today we launch a new year of Gospel Conversations by diving into the story of Jesus' temptations in the desert. Michael is joined for the first time by James Harding from the University of Otago, together with two familiar faces: Bishop Steve Benford, and Richard Johnson. Where, in this strange story of Jesus' encounters with the Tempter, are we to find challenges and good news for our day-to-day lives? What can it mean for us today?

#### Luke 4:1-13

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished.

The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone." '

Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, 'To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him." '

Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written, "He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you", and "On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." 'Jesus answered him, 'It is said, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." 'When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.

Each week the Diocesan Ministry Educator engages with a panel of biblical thinkers, in a free-flowing conversation about the forthcoming gospel reading. The idea of these conversations is to tease out and float ideas about and responses to the weekly passage, not as an academic exercise but as a creative dance with the text and the Spirit who enlivens the text for us.

## Something New is happening...


Bishop Steven — February 28th, 2022

The first of our on-line services took place on Sunday 27 February, with 17 groups and individuals joining worship in-person and virtually.

This took place as part of our ongoing commitment to finding ways to support and minister with all those across our Diocese, with further services being planned for the last Sundays in March and April. We are all aware that there are communities and individuals across our Diocese for whom running or attending a Sunday service can be difficult. There are the regular issues of finding a priest, filling a roster, overcoming distances and so on. With Covid-19 are added barriers, due to vaccine status or physical vulnerability, as well as being asked to self-isolate.

This Sunday was partly an experiment, as although we have offered Zoom services in the past, this was the first time that was have tried a combination or virtual and in-person. Overall, it worked well and we learnt some things along the way that will help things be smoother and more interactive next time. The Service was one using Reserved Sacrament in various physical locations from Invercargill to Lumsden, Alexandra and Palmerston, with smaller groups and individuals being given an opportunity to take part in a moment of Spiritual Communion.

#### Who can join us for our next services?

Any group (or individual) who can gather around a screen!

- a. In places where church services are only occasional, maybe two or three of you could meet together in someone's home and join us from there.
- b. Faith communities who don't "need" this but are open to trying something new may like to join us to support smaller groups. (Alexandra was an example of this).
- c. Ministry teams of small churches may simply like a week off from finding a priest and filling a roster.
- d. Individuals who, for whatever reason, cannot attend a regular service are also welcome to join us and share in spiritual communion if we cannot get the reserved sacrament to you.

# Diocesan Boundaries Training Goes Online

On Wednesday the 16th of February the Diocesan Boundaries training was held via Zoom for the first time ever.

On a nice warm Dunedin evening, 46 participants from across the Archdeaconry (and the Diocese) gathered via Zoom to take part in the first Diocesan Boundaries Training for 2022. A major difference for this training was its use of Zoom rather than being in person. The decision to run the training by Zoom came down to the number of participants and the outbreak of Omicron in the community. While it was a different experience on Zoom, we were able to spend plenty of time in breakout groups alongside our learning.

This training was led by the Ven. Dr. Michael Godfrey and the Rev. John Graveston and covered the following points:

- Safeguarding (Different types of abuse, indicators of abuse, how to react to disclosures, and procedures for responding to suspected abuse)
- Power imbalance with a focus on Spiritual abuse

There are still two more opportunities to attend the Diocesan Boundaries Training. We will confirm if these are in person or on Zoom closer to the dates of each training.

## Social Housing Grants - Social Justice Committee

Social Justice Committee — February 17th, 2022

The Social Justice Committee (SJC) is able to offer some assistance for Parishes/Organisations within the Diocese of Dunedin involved or looking to be involved in Social Housing Initiatives. You can apply for a grant at any time.

The Social Transformation Committee (a Committee of the Diocesan Council) has limited funds available for social housing for the aged, which are those over 65. Where the housing is not for the aged, you would have to show how they would benefit. However, projects can benefit any/all people, regardless of values, religion, gender, etc.

- "Social housing" means accommodation provided at affordable rates, on a secure basis, to people on low incomes or with particular needs.
- Any grant made is intended as a contribution only to projects and does not guarantee ongoing funding.
- All involved in dealing with the public must have been police checked.
- For aged care work the Anglican Church must be involved in the governance of the project.
- Responsibility for payment of any employee/consultant remains that of the applicant.
- Where the applicant is a parish or similar, it may need to consider whether a faculty application is also needed and whether the two applications could be combined (discuss this with the Registrar).
- If a loan is proposed, so that funds can be used later by others, the application needs to indicate how this will be repaid.

Please note that funding is limited and the Social Justice Committee may not be able to recommend assisting all applicants with their total costs.

**Grants are made by the Diocesan Council** on the recommendation of the Social Justice Committee.

**Application forms in Word and Pdf format** (see below) may be submitted on-line using **this link** or in hard copy, but in either case must be sent to the Social Justice Committee care of the **Registrar (Mr Andrew Metcalfe)**, so that they can be considered by the Social Justice Committee at one of its regular meetings before being submitted to Diocesan Council for final approval.

**The approval process could take up to 4 weeks** depending on when it was submitted (the Social Justice Committee meets on the 3rd Tuesday of the month, with supported applications being considered by Diocesan Council on the second Tuesday of the following month).

# Extend the benefits of ACC to all disabled New Zealanders

Kathleen Laing — February 28th, 2022

A petition is circulating to the Houses of Representatives requesting that funding for New Zealanders disabled by congenital conditions or illness be equal to that of funding for all who qualify for the support of ACC.

Kathleen Laing (who is part of St Martha's, Dunedin), the instigator of this petition, writes:

The current system is discriminatory, treating people in two classes according to the cause of their disability. I do not believe it meets the needs of disabled New Zealanders in a fair and just manner. Those who are eligible for ACC support because they were disabled by an accident can access more funding than those whose disability is due to congenital conditions or illness. This may apply whether the funding is to live on, for treatment, for house alterations, or for a suitable vehicle.

For many of you who are very aware of the two tiered approach we have to funding disability in New Zealand, this petition may be of interest. You can access it in the following link - please pass this on to others in your networks.



## **Operation London Bridge**

Andrew Metcalfe — February 23rd, 2022

This is something you may not have heard of, but it's the code name for the protocol in place in the event of the death of Her Majesty the Queen.

A reminder of this is not being made because the Queen is in any immediate danger (or because she is currently dealing with a COVID-19 infection), but more because this may be something that happens in the not too distant future.

#### How could we be part of this Operation?

If you have a church bell, the London Bridge protocol has instructions for what do do in the event of Her Majesty's death. Part of this protocol includes bells being rung fully or half-muffled. Muffles are leather pads fitted to a bell's clapper to reduce the volume.

Linda Dawber is able to manufacture muffles for church bells, if you don't have a DIY system already in place and want muffles that will do this. Some of these have already been commissioned for St Paul's Anglican church in Papanui, Christchurch.

#### For those who want to know more...

The Royal Household have advised the following times that ringing should take place based on the timing of the official announcement:

On the announcement of the death, bells may be rung or tolled at the discretion of local Parochial Church Councils. They may be rung or tolled for one hour as shown below:

- If the announcement occurs before 1100hrs: noon on the day of death.
- If the announcement occurs between 1100hrs and 1600hrs: 1800 hours on the day of death

## A word from Bishop Steve

Bishop Steven — February 23rd, 2022

As variants of COVID-19 start to make inroads into our community, Bishop Steve reminds us to slow down and take the time we need.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ

I'm very aware that the situation is continuing to develop and that all of us will have very different reactions and responses to it all. We only need to take a look at what is happening in our community around us: some schools are registering cases of the virus; protestors in Wellington challenging the way the Government is responding to events, with local protests also taking place. We are also seeing the return of students from elsewhere in New Zealand to our region, with a significant number already coping with the reality of community spread in the University and Polytechnics.

## For some, all of this feels somewhat distant, while for others it is near at hand and very concerning.

I'm encouraging all of us to keep centered, to keep praying, take all sensible precautions and be ready in case you may be affected.

#### **Prayer**

Our whānau in the Diocese of Wellington have been encouraged to pray for 10 minutes a day at 10 am or 10 pm, intentionally entering into the peace of God's presence, dwelling in the hope, peace and joy that are eternally found in God's faithfulness and love, praying for this love to fill ourselves and our world:

Great Loving One, In Whom we all live and move; Together we bring to You ourselves and our world: May Your love and light surround us, bless us, heal us. We are in Your hands. Amen.

Perhaps we can join them in prayer as well, placing ourselves and all our concerns for our communities and ourselves in God's loving hands.

#### **Slowing Down**

If we need to slow down - let's do this. Do you have plans for an AGM but are not sure how safe it is to go ahead? Our (modified) advice back in 2020 still holds true:

If your faith community has not held its AGM, all office bearers and Synod Reps remain in place at this time. If you are able to organise the business of your AGM in other ways e.g. via a combination of emails, phone calls, via a Video conference (Zoom), this is acceptable in any setting where there is on-going uncertainty. Any decisions made should be ratified at a general meeting called when you are able to meet again in person.

I am not giving any directives of suggestions around cancelling services right now, but am asking you to be mindful of particular concerns in your own communities, and respond in the best way you can. If you feel you can safely continue as you have been, you have my support. If you feel you need to change tack and do things differently for a while, you have my support as well.

The key messages about gathering in person continue to be: staying masked; reducing physical proximity; making sure areas used are well ventilated; washing or sanitising your hands regularly and; not meeting in the same place for extended periods of time. If it's a nice day and you want to enjoy some hospitality, why not do this outside to enjoy the last of summer and be even safer.

<u>Have a look again at the special newsletter blog we sent out last week</u>, which talks about an online worship opportunity this Sunday, as well as giving access to resources if you or people you love are having to self isolate.

As I reminded us recently, we are all on this journey together, and I'm closing again with a quote from Isaiah chapter 40, v31

but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.


We have updated some useful resources if you should find yourself with an unwanted virus, including a form you can use if you need to get some help when isolating and links to our COVID-19 Community Response website. Updated 1 March 2022.

#### What happens if we are exposed to the virus at Church?

Public Health South are also able to provide support and guidance for churches about what to do when there have been cases present at worship settings. Contact PHS EOC Operations on <a href="https://pens.python.org/">PHSOPS@southerndhb.govt.nz</a> and then someone will phone back to assist 7 days per week.

#### **Individual Isolation Information**

A form you can complete and share if you have a significant role in your church (clergy, Lay Leader, Employee) and need others to know how they can support you. It flags if there is anything you may need support with, and also has some tips on how to self isolate at home (Word and pdf versions of the form also attached below).
