RECTOR'S MESSAGE



We all have strengths and weaknesses. In schooling, 'strength – based education' focuses on strengths. Applying a bulk of our attention to expanding strengths over trying to weed out all weaknesses. It's better to emphasise strength development over trying to eradicate all faults and flaws; to focus on what youngsters are doing right before focusing on what they're doing wrong; on strengths before shortcomings. Is this correct? I believe so.

A strength has three key parts: performance (we're good at), energy (we feel good doing it), and high use (we choose to do it frequently). So a strength is something we do well, often, and with energy. These are also the everyday clues to an emerging strength. It follows from this that our performance, energy and use won't be nearly as high if we're not working from our strengths. At

Timaru Boys' our challenge is to employ strategies that support young men to discover, develop and display their strengths; to become more systematic in how they gain strength, with attention and a positive push from us when needed. If we help students to internalise the fact that they have strengths, that these strengths are what energise them and so function as their inner resources for developing optimism and resilience, it will lead to them seeking what they want to achieve in life.

There are numerous strengths we can each play to. They can be our skills, abilities, interests, characteristics, talents or traits. Broadly speaking, they are either character strengths or performance strengths that benefit us and others. They are character strengths like kindness, gratitude, courage, wisdom, perseverance, temperance/self-control, fairness, love, and the capacity to find meaning in things beyond ourselves. Or they are performance strengths, such as physical strength and skill or specific cognitive abilities like computing with numbers or using language well.¹ These two types of strengths can reinforce each other. Performance strengths can, for instance, grow from character strengths. Character strengths can, in turn, be improved by performance.

To take all this another tentative step, other than what we do well, often, and with energy, strengths are also, according to positive psychology, what we:

- use in productive ways to contribute to our goals and development
- build over time through innate ability and dedicated effort
- have recognised by others as praiseworthy qualities, that contribute positively to the lives of others.²

Looking closer to home, if wanting to know what your son's strengths are, ask yourself: Do I see performance? (Above-age levels of achievement, rapid learning, and a repeated pattern of success); Do I see energy? (They have abundant energy while doing it, and in the way they speak about it); Do I see high use? (They choose to do it often – perhaps in their spare time too). As educators these are the questions we can also address in our teaching and learning at TBHS when nurturing boys' strengths.

As this latest Newsletter shows once again, we are a school of manifold strengths. We have a myriad of boys and staff who carry individual and collective strengths, sometimes remarkable strengths, that contribute to who we are as a school in pursuit of the best education for boys.

Year 12 Physics trip to University of Canterbury and Rutherford's Den

On 11 September, the two Year 12 Physics classes were given the opportunity to travel up to Christchurch for a series of workshops. The day was planned by Miss Everitt in preparation for their final internal assessment for the year, Level 2 Atomic and Nuclear Physics, and marks the first time such an opportunity has been offered to senior physics students at this level. It was a successful day out that we hope to further refine and offer again in future years. With forty students and staff, it was a very busy day for all!

At Rutherford's Den, the boys learned more about the history of the atom and Ernest Rutherford's scientific experiments and discoveries – notably his "Gold Foil Experiment" which revolutionised our knowledge of the structure atoms. They also heard about the many practical applications of nuclear physics as well as the dangers of nuclear radiation.

At the University of Canterbury, the boys were taken through the Department of Physics and Astronomy and put to work in a first-year physics laboratory where they conducted two experiments of their own. First they investigated the effectiveness of biological materials (carrot slices) in absorbing beta and gamma radiation, to appreciate the effect of ionising radiation on exposed tissue or skin. Next they investigated the radioactive nature of unstable copper isotopes, monitoring the level of radioactivity and measuring beta particle





emissions to calculate half-life. Finally the boys were treated to a number of exciting demonstrations, including using liquid nitrogen, to illustrate some of the experiments and opportunities they would have as a first-year physics student.

Hospitality News

Year 13 Baking Assessment

The Year 13 Hospitality students have almost completed their Baking Block Assessment course at ARA. During their time at ARA they have been perfecting their baking techniques to produce a wide variety of baked dishes, for example, sponges, scones, carrot muffins, chocolate and caramel slice and piping skills for cake decoration. All the students have greatly benefited from their time in the commercial kitchens at ARA. The students have developed a new appreciation of the chemistry involved in baking. The students have become more confident in their understanding and application of baking terminology. We wish them well for the final baking challenges in Week 10 to complete this module.







Year 12 Hospitality Term 3

On 18 September, the Year 12 TBHS Hospitality students attended ARA for the Barista Course. As a component of this course the students had to create and run a "Pop Up" coffee café called, *Coffee to Go*. The students took over 70 coffee orders for the cafe, via email or phone from other students and tutors at ARA, as well as make and deliver within a specified time limit. This was a great learning experience as the students all had to work together as a team, while under time and expectation pressure. Orders ranged from hot chocolates, cappuccino, lattes and in fact every variety the clients could imagine. Job well done.

Sanford Science and Technology Fair

The Sanford Science and Technology Fair, held annually, is an event where school students from Mid and South Canterbury are invited to display original exhibits of investigations that are scientific or technological.

Twenty two Timaru Boys' High students entered the 2018 Sanford Science and Technology Fair which was judged on Wednesday 12 September. They spent the afternoon at Caroline Bay Hall speaking with the judges about their investigations. Well done to all of you who entered.

The following boys helped with judging the Year 7 and 8 section: **Ethan Bowmar**, **Bryn Houghton**, **Flynn Parker**, **Nick Cummings**, **Ryan Greenslade**, **Cole Melhopt** and **Neil Paver**. The Science Fair committee appreciated the effort that these boys put in and the way they represented their school.

We had a good number of boys gain great prizes this year. In the Year 9 and 10 section, eight boys gained prizes. In the Intermediate Individual Science category, **Reuben Bowen** Year 9 received a BRONZE award with his project entitled: *Banana Breakdown*. **Nicos Shearer** Year 9 received a SILVER award for his project entitled: *Take half and leave half*.

The following boys received awards in the Technology Open section: **Ross McCulloch** Year 9 with his project: *Fire the Fire*, **Neil Meyer** Year 10 for his project entitled: *Speed of Light* and **Thomas Corbett** Year 10 with his project entitled: *Possum lures - what's best?*

Sam Wilson Year 9 for his project entitled: *Pivots vs Roto-Rainers*, gained a BRONZE award in Intermediate Science Individual category, a Technology Open award as well as an ECAN (Environment

TBHS finished in 2nd place in their pool with wins over James Hargest College 82-64, John McGlashan College 92-79, Burnside73-68, Marlborough Boys' 81-59 and losing only to the eventual finalist, Shirley Boys' 43-79.

In the crucial quarter final against Middleton Grange, the team competed well but could not contain the well drilled Middleton team, losing 87-74.

Winter Tournament Roundup......

Winter Tournament week was held recently during Week 7 of Term 3 (3-9 September). We had a successful week with teams spread from Hamilton to Invercargill in Hockey, Basketball, Football and Rugby.

The **1st XI Hockey** had an excellent week in Tauranga and qualified for the Rankin Cup, the top tier competition in secondary schools hockey and progressed through to the quarter-finals where they lost a titanic struggle to Hamilton Boys on penalty strokes 5-4 after being locked up 2 all at the end of both regulation and extra time. They defeated another traditional New Zealand sporting powerhouse Auckland Grammar 3-0 in their final match to finish 7th, representing a tremendous effort for a school of our size on the National stage.

In Hamilton, the **2**nd **XI** also finished in 7th place in the Gallatley Shield. They had a number of very close competitive games, having been seeded in a tough pool that was decided on goal differential. This was a good week for developing the depth of our hockey and preparing some promising young players for the challenges of a tournament.

The **Senior Basketball** side had a pleasing week in the South Island Tournament held in Invercargill finishing in 8th position. Wins in pool play over James Hargest College, John McGlashan College and Marlborough Boys' College saw them qualify for the top eight, our best result in a number of seasons.

The **1st XI Football** side had an enjoyable week in Nelson at the Jim Wishart tournament, finishing in a creditable 5th position. Pleasing wins over Christ's College and Otago Boys' High School saw them through to this position having being knocked out of title contention by eventual tournament winners Shirley Boys' High School.

The **Under 15 Colts Rugby** team had a good tournament, recording wins in pool play over King's High School and hosts Nelson College before losing to eventual winners Shirley Boys' High School. They beat the traditionally strong Southland Boys' High School in the play-off for 3rd and 4th.

In a new initiative, John McGlashan hosted a mini **Under 14 Rugby** tournament also involving TBHS, St Thomas of Canterbury College and Southland Boys'. In a tournament of widely varying strength and big scorelines dominated by St Thomas's, we lost to them and recorded wins over Southland and John McGlashan.
