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

When checking out the donation box recently Neil Gamble, chairman of the Taieri Historical Society, found in the American dollar. With the help of "Google" the family historian at the Park Zelda Matheson, sleuthed out the whereabouts of Neville in the USA.

Neville went to the Dental School at Otago and practiced in Dunedin for 6 years with Malcolm Farry. He then went to the University of Maryland at Baltimore to specialise in Endodontics (root canals).

He had no intention of staying in the US, but he met his wife Linda and was offered a job at Maryland to carry out research and teach. He was recruited by the University of Michigan 25 years ago and has been the Chair and Professor of Endodontics since that time. They live in a university town called Ann Arbor. Linda and Neville have one son who lives in Montana, and a 14 year old grand-daughter.

McDonald Cottage in Heenan Road Maungatua

This is one of the last stone buildings left on the Taieri and is situated on the McIntyre Family farm at Maungatua. The building has been gifted to the Taieri Historical Society because of its historical significance and its colourful past. This will ensure its preservation.



The history dates back to the 1860s when McDonalds. the Scottish stone masons, developed the farm and buildings. However, this was in the time of the Prohibition so the family decided to develop a 'little sideline' which was soon in big demand. The whole house 100 yards down the

hill by the stream was given over to the brewing of illicit 108 proof whisky.

The authorities eventually caught up with the enterprise and in 1864 at the High Court in Dunedin, the McDonalds were convicted and fined 100 Pounds, with their equipment being confiscated.

As legend tells us, the family then became more cunning. The father established a still up a Maungatua stream in the bush. The fire chimney was a tunnel along the creek which concealed the smoke. The Hogs Head for the whisky was concealed in a hole under the roots of a large tree that had fallen over by the stream this was stood up to hide the barrel. A mountain storm and flash flood destroyed this enterprise and the barrel ended up jammed against the road bridge. Nobody claimed the barrel from the Police!!

The 'wee stone cottage' was the son's enterprise. This building appeared to be a two room dairy and bakery, but under the floorboards was an excavated room with a concealed fireplace and chimney in the back wall. This still was never discovered by the authorities, and no doubt quenched the thirst of many men working on the Taieri.

There are no plans to excavate the filled in lower section. Underneath the floor remains a 'mystery'.

MOUNTAIN DEW —Another important and extensive seizure of an illicit spirit manufactory has just been made by the police. From information received the suspicion of the police had been attracted to the vicinity of the premises of one John McDonald, at the West Taieri, where it was believed the illicit manufacture of whisky was being conducted on a a large scale.

Accordingly, at 7 o'clock, on Wednesday night, the police proceeded to the neighbourhood indicated, and there lay in ambush, until half-past six in the morning. "When it was nearly daylight the officers commenced their investigations, and ultimately found four men busy at work making whisky. They also found 4 hogsheads, 1 keg, and 2 tubs of malt liquor, 2 casks grain malt, 1 keg and 6 bottles of whisky, a cooling trough and worm, a copper boiler, a quantity of sugar, 2 metal coolers, 8 bags barley, 6 bags malt, and about 20 bushels of barley on the floor of a kiln drying. The police at once took possession of the plant and materials, destroying some, and conveying the rest to the West Taieri Station, Subsequently the police proceeded to the Lower Waipori to search the premises of some suspected individuals, but after a careful examination no discovery of illicit distillation was made.

100g dark choc to decorate

1/2 cup Brown sugar


1/3 cup Soy sauce

Station Officer Fred Donaldson Outram Volunteer Fire Brigade 50 years Service - Gold Star Award

Fred started his service on the 12th May, 1975, as a young 21 year old, new to Outram. He recalls that his first call out was a false alarm. This was the first of over 3,000 musters, equating to an exceptional 88 % of

all musters for the past 50 years. He was encouraged to join the brigade by Les Hyslop (Lyn's uncle) who was the Fire Chief at that time, whom he regarded as a great mentor, and he still carries his advice to this day.

Over the years, the equipment and personal protective equipment has been consistently improved from the days of the old Landrover appliance with very basic equipment, to our very modern and well equipped Iveco appliance that we run at present. We now have the very latest, protective fire fighting uniform and modern breathing apparatus which has been a great leap forward from the plastic leggings, gumboots, plastic helmet, with no visor, and heavy woollen bunker coats, that we wore when I first started!!

Training has also changed dramatically. From, "putting the wet stuff on the hot stuff" to specifically targeted training. It begins with a seven day training recruitment course in Christchurch for our southern trainees, then weekly training with FENZ training officers and our own brigade training officer. This ranges from fire fighting technique, medical training with specialists, hazardous substance incidents, motor vehicle crashes and location familiar isolation. We are also first runners to assist Dunedin Airport Crash Rescue.

I have attended an extremely wide range of incidents, from cats up a tree to fatal house fires. Also have been some very interesting ones, to the horrible scrubbies, that can take hours and much hard physical work to get under control! During the 1980 flood, even our wives had to assist with feeding all the volunteers that helped with civil defence work in the area. We also, now have to assist the ambulance service for medical calls, often being the first on the scene, performing CPR and prepping the patient with the defibrillator. This is becoming more prevalent in our rural areas. We have a support person in our brigade to lead discussion to talk through any hardships that any of these calls may present. The Outram Volunteer Fire Brigade is a very strong, united group. We have an active social side to our brigade, which enables trust, and camaraderie amongst all members.

Volunteer Firefighters make a huge commitment to their community, involving many hours away from family and sometimes from work. I must acknowledge my own family and the families of fellow firefighters as well as employers for their understanding, of the many hours spent training and at call outs. It could be from half an hour, to all day and night! We miss out, or can be called away from many family occasions and events. I personally, have missed out on supporting Jolene and Glen at many sporting events, some birthdays and prize-givings.

However, it has been a great privilege and honour to serve our community and FENZ for these past 50 years. The legacy lives on with Stu Casey (Jolene's husband) being our fire chief, and Nick, our grandson, being the newest qualified brigade member. While I can still run to the fire station to the calls, I will continue to serve."





Taieri Trails Group Progress Report

The Taieri Trails Group, along with the Dunedin Trails Network Trust, is pleased to share an update on the progress made over the past year toward the Mosgiel–Outram shared-use trail.

While development has taken longer than expected, due to the **Otago Regional Council's (ORC)** review of its floodbank construction specifications, the groundwork completed this year has positioned the project for strong progress in 2025/26.

Community Fundraiser Success

In February, a combined **hiking and mountain biking event** on the Maungatuas raised **\$9,600** in support of the trail.

A huge thank you to the **Taieri Rotary Club** and the **Otago Recreational 4WD Club** for their vital help and generosity — the event was a great example of community spirit.

ORC Support and Funding

The **Otago Regional Council** granted *in principle approval* for a shared-use trail between **Mosgiel and Outram**, following the Silverstream and Taieri River floodbanks.

This support was a key factor in the Trust receiving a \$50,000 grant from the ORC, a major milestone in the project design and preparation, and design and planning progress

Design and planning Progress

The Trust is working closely with the ORC to develop design principles for trails on flood control banks.

As of last week, we now have ORC Flood Defence Cycle Track Construction Guidelines. These guidelines will now enable us to proceed with the detailed design process.

Special thanks to **Tonkin & Taylor**, who have prepared designs for **cattle stops and structural features** to be included in the final ORC specification document.

Landowner Agreements

We're currently working with all seven private landowners along the proposed Mosgiel–Outram trail route.

Their support and cooperation have been fantastic and are helping to keep the project moving forward — a big thank-you to each of them for being part of the journey.

Outram Bridge Connection

A **clip-on attachment design** for the **SH87 bridge** over the Taieri River has been completed and submitted to **NZTA** for approval. Once approved, this will provide a key link and safe crossing for trail users.

Expanding the Trail Network

A new **Outram–Waipori route**, passing near the airport, has been agreed in principle. While construction will follow the **Waipori–Waihola** section, this agreement ensures a future continuous network — connecting with the **Clutha Gold Trail** to the south and the **Tunnels Trail** to the east.

When complete, this will enable riders to travel from Queenstown and Wānaka all the way to Dunedin.

Resource Consent Progress

Productive consultation with **Dunedin City Council (DCC)** staff and other stakeholders has paved the way for lodging the **Resource Consent**, which has now been formally submitted.

Committee Update

This year, we farewelled **Jean Bonner** and **Nigel Smith**, whose efforts have been deeply appreciated. We also welcomed **Kevin Thompson**, an enthusiastic mountain biker, to the team. **Cont. on page 22** \rightarrow \rightarrow \rightarrow

Otago Regional Council Public meeting on 2nd September

There was a good response in attendance for the presentation at Outram from the Otago Regional Council about the Lower Taieri Flood Protection scheme.

The three areas covered in the ORC presentation were:-

- 1. Work covered in the last year
- 2. Continuing and future projects
- 3. Rates review

Following the first part of works covered, various attendees raised issues or made comment on; raised silt levels in the Taieri River, slumps or holes appearing in flood circumstances on the Outram side of the flood bank, inadequate remedial work on rabbit holes, over engineered bridges on the contour, compensation for damage, insurance and rebuilding issues.

Residents would like information on emergency flood response plans eg which roads to use during floods, where the evacuation center for Outram is and communication methods.

- 2. The main projects currently started or ready to commence were;
 - * The excavation of the Silver Stream. The first stage starts at the Taieri River end and will go to Gladfield Road.
 - * Continuing the excavation of the Contour Channel which runs from Outram to Berwick.
- Rates Review

This is to happen over the next two years.

This drew the most discussion with comments and questions.

A common concern was that rates had increased by 200% in the last 2 years. Other points raised were; The ORC has no jurisdiction over the Outram Township drainage (DCC responsibility) Presently storm water ponds in the low old river bed areas but runs to three areas, the Oxbow at the south of Maungatua View, the pond at Willowfield or into the small stream $\rightarrow \rightarrow \rightarrow$

that runs along the base of the hill behind Anzac Court, under the small piped culvert at Highway 87 and into the Contour.

Outram benefits from the flood bank (ORC responsibility) which was first built in 1871 and heightened to 14m in 1965. However, with the exception of the fixing of the land area around the pipe outlet into the river just upstream of the sub station and planting of willows on the upstream at the Outram bridge, there has been no further obvious development affecting the township.

It has been calculated that 50% of the rates gathered from the lower Taieri comes from Outram residences. Information was not provided as to how much was contributed by Mosgiel residents as their storm water streams drain into the Taieri River.

ORC has stated no further work is needed on the flood bank which would be reflected in the rates review.

The question was asked as to why we paid rates for the Leith Stream. It was noted that the area has a low rate contribution due to the University (important to the whole of Otago) but so too is the Dunedin Airport covered by the Lower Taieri scheme.

There still seems to be as many questions as answers after this meeting.

Following the ORC presentation Simon Parks spoke about the role of **the Lower Taieri Flood Protection Liaison Group** newly set up this year.

The Lower Taieri Flood Protection Liaison Group has been set up to present the concerns from the residents of the area and to give advice to the Council from their local knowledge of what actually happens on the ground when floods occurred.

The group has 3 members on the Western side of the river, 3 members on the Eastern side, a Mosgiel/Taieri Community Board member and a Regional Council Board member.

Fresh Space, Same Passion at Warnock Architecture

It's been an exciting year for Warnock Architecture Ltd, with the team moving into their newly redeveloped office on Holyhead Street, Outram. The move represents the next step for a practice that continues to grow across Otago and Southland, bringing thoughtful, buildable design to homes and commercial spaces alike.

The new space follows the studio's previous home in the award-winning restoration of the Old Blacksmith building, also in Outram. That project reflected the firm's respect for local heritage and its ability to breathe new life into historic structures.

Founded nearly 25 years ago by Reece Warnock, Warnock Architecture is a multi-award-winning practice known for clear communication, creative problem-solving, and strong technical delivery. "Our goal is to make good design accessible," says Reece. "Spaces that not only look great but work well for the way people live and build."

The building itself has deep local roots. Constructed around 1876–1877, it began life as the Outram

Societies' Hall, one of the township's earliest public spaces. Over the next

century it evolved through community and commercial uses, including a time under the local Presbyterian Church.

Reece and his brother Dean purchased the site to restore and re-energise it. The new design keeps the buildings simple form while introducing a contemporary black-fin façade and James Hardie ExoTec^{IM} panels for texture and depth.

Inside, the fit-out blends character and modern finishes. Marrakesh plastered walls, acoustic timber slats, and V-Groove linings create a calm, tactile backdrop. Smart upgrades complete the transform ation, with new insulation, efficient LED lighting, and integrated data and audio systems. "It's our creative hub," says Reece. "We wanted a space that reflects how we design, simple, efficient, and comfortable."



The open-plan studio includes collaborative workstations, a client meeting area, and a materials display bench. Using Revit and Enscape, the team creates immersive VR walkthroughs that let clients explore projects before a single nail is driven.

The Warnock Architecture team is a close-knit group of designers and creatives. Nathan Swift and Terry Wilson, both Senior Architectural Technicians and Designers, bring experience and an eye for detail. Johann Hamman, our hard-working South African import, has been part of the team for eight years and brings energy and dedication to every project. Greg Samson, our longest-standing team member based in Hāwea, is approaching nineteen years with us, and when he is not resolving complex details he is usually out snowboarding. Tina Arthur, in between her work as a travel agent and organising lifestyle retreats, manages our social media. With a great eye for style and trends, Tina keeps our content sharp and, truth be told, keeps us lads in line.

For Reece, the move has personal meaning. Born and raised in Outram, he remembers attending Playcentre in this very hall as a child. Decades later, transforming the same building into the home of his practice feels like things coming full circle. "It's pretty special to come back to a place that shaped my early memories and give it new life," he says. "It's a real circle-of-life moment, turning a piece of my past into a space for the future."


