JUNIOR DEBATING

While Blake and Marcus had debated before in the Regional Competition, Noah was new to it all. He had a quick lunchtime session to learn how to debate and then did an astounding job on the day. The team won their first debate, advancing to the semi-finals, where they unfortunately did not come out on top. The students were able to meet other students from across the motu, expand their knowledge in debating, and learn how to better themselves for future debates. A favourite experience was watching the TBC dance team perform. Overall, the event was a great experience, and we can't wait for next year!'

DANCE

'With only two and a half months to prepare, the Super 8 Dance crew earned a remarkable win at this year's Super 8 Festival. Despite disruptions, we proudly returned home with the winning title, with support from teacher Amy McFetridge. The boys contributed creatively, designing formations and adding acrobatics like handstands and cartwheels to elevate the performance. The crew's dedication and creativity shone on stage. NZ Schools Debating Nationals

The Cooney Lees Morgan BOP team—Jacob O'Toole-Corrigan, Oliver Larsen, Pearl Vahey-Bourne, and Layla Clarke-travelled to Wellington to compete against the nation's best. Over two intense days and seven rounds of debating, the team excelled, reaching the semi-finals against Hawke's Bay on day three. In a close finish, Hawke's Bay edged ahead, but the Bay team delivered an outstanding performance. Pearl received a converted Promising Speaker Award, while Oliver was named Most Promising Speaker and selected as First Reserve for the New Zealand National Team. A highlight of the event was a formal dinner at the Basin Reserve, offering a chance to connect with past and future debating talent from across the motu. Jacob's 'fire intros and rhetorical prowess' will be missed in 2026, but the remaining trio are eager to carry the torch forward.
