### Head of Junior School Message

#### New Entrants' Morning and Arrangements for 2023

On Friday 25 November, we hosted 259 pupils from our Year 9 cohort for 2023 at Ashburton College for their New Entrants' morning. Pupils experienced a snapshot of what it is like at AshColl with time in Ako classes as well as lessons in Science and Phys Ed. They met with key staff, and met with our Head Student team for the College.

During the morning, the Year 8 pupils were given a New Entrant booklet and we hope that this has now been seen by parents and caregivers. This pack contains information about uniform, BYOD (Bring Your Own Device), and communication including the College SchoolBridge App.

The Year 9 stationery list is included on a pull-out page at the end of the booklet. From speaking with pupils, the most popular pages in the booklet contained the canteen menu, and plans were already being made for lunch purchases in 2023!

#### Transitional Visits from Contributing Schools/College Ambassador Visits to Schools

As well as our New Entrants' morning, we have welcomed pupils from several contributing schools in for additional transition visits, and our Year 9 Ambassadors have been visiting their previous schools to speak with Year 8 pupils about AshColl.

For most of our new pupils, there will be a healthy mix of nerves and excitement at the thought of coming to a new school. However, for a few, an extra visit or two, or the chance to chat with a former pupil from their old school, can give a little 'insider knowledge' that helps to lessen the anxiety.

#### GOT (Get Out There) Day

Excitement is building amongst our Year 9 and 10 students as GOT Day approaches. GOT (Get Out There) Day was first established in 2013 and offers students the chance to get out and try something new.

Activities vary from year-to-year depending on the expertise and interests of our wonderful staff.

This year, we have twenty two activities including ice-skating, cake decorating, clay bird shooting, surfing, esports, sea kayaking, craft, white water rafting and ziplining. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, GOT Day was unable to proceed in 2021, so places in activities this year were hotly contested. At present, the GOT Day forecast is for a fine day with light cloud and a pleasant temperature of 18°C, so it looks like everyone is in for a wonderful day. Our thanks to Karen Stockstill in the College Office for her efficient co-ordination of GOT Day.

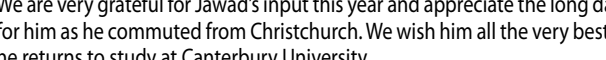
### Staff – Farewell

#### Remaining Language Weeks Held for the Year at College

In previous newsletters we have covered a series of Language Weeks celebrated at College. With this information from student Lucas Vainerere we now give information on the final three Language Weeks held in 2022, with a huge acknowledgement to the Cultural Committee's organisation and to students within the College who supported their work.

In September, Ashburton College celebrated the indigenous cultures of Tonga and Aotearoa New Zealand.

#### Tongan Language Week

The first celebration in September was Tongan Language Week which was held from Sunday 04 - Saturday 10 September. Year 12 Tongan student Sera Ula raised the red and white flag of Tonga on Monday morning to open the week and raise awareness of their culture.

The following day, a group of Tongan girls performed at Hampstead School, showcasing their beautiful culture to the next generation. There, they also quizzed representatives from each class on their knowledge of Tonga before closing with a dance battle between students.

On Wednesday, students and staff were given the opportunity to try some local delicacies from Tonga such as Keke Isite (Banana Pancakes) and Otai (Fruit Drink). Each item was sold for \$2.00 and the stall managed to sell out within the first twenty minutes of opening. A popular food item was the Keke Isite and the mango-flavoured Otai.
