I am going to start my conversation with this whakataukī.

My language is my awakening,

My language is the window into my soul,

My language is my korowai/cloak.

This whakataukī illustrates the depth of language to the identity of you as person.

What is Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori?

Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori is a week for people to celebrate te reo Māori. All are welcomed to take part. This week encourages and celebrates:

- Speaking Māori
- Taking part in Māori games
- Taking part in waiata and haka
- Learning the history of the Māori world

Even saying "Kia ora" is contributing towards supporting Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori. I want to thank you all for your continuing support. I also welcome you all to support this treasure known as Te Reo Māori.

History

In the 1970s, interested groups gathered about the survival of Te reo Māori. The groups gathered to think about formatting a petition to be sent to parliament.

- The petition that was formed called for 3 things:
- 1. For the national recognition and revitalisation of te reo Māori.
- 2. Māori language and customs to be put in schools throughout New Zealand, as a treasure for unity.
- 3. A day needed to seek out to celebrate te reo Māori.

Over 30,000 people signed the petition for te reo Māori. And then, it was decided that the 14th of September would be chosen as Te Rā o Te Reo Māori. It was 3 years later that it became Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori.

10 years had passed since approval was given to establish Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori. In 1985, a group of experts in Māori language was established, they were known as "Ngā Kaiwhakapūmau i Te Reo Māori".

They decided to format a solution to the Waitangi Tribunal;

- 1. That Māori language be recognised as an official language of Aotearoa,
- 2. That a department to focus on Te Reo Māori be formed

In 1987, the response from the Waitangi Tribunal was that Māori be recognised as an official language in Aotearoa, and that a Māori language commission be established to protect and develop te reo Māori in Aotearoa.

Why do we celebrate for just a week? Should it be 1 month? 1 year? A decade? Or a century? Aotearoa is revitalising Māori language, and part of that journey is:

- To Acknowledge and celebrate our success in promoting te reo Māori.
- 2. We all need to celebrate the followed dreams of ancestors.
- 3. It is a focused time for everyone participate in te ao Māori.
- 4. It is a platform for us to celebrate, collaborate and to develop te reo Māori.

Let us not forget those who greet us with "kia ora", the age-old call of greetings. We thank you. Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori allows us to work together as Tangata Whenua and Tangata Tiriti for the wellness of Aotearoa.

- By being immersed in Te Ao Māori, everyone is given a chance to experience:
 - 1. A rich culture Waiata, Kai, Haka.

2. Another perspective – Mātauranga Māori.

3. The ability to grow at your own pace on your own Te Reo Māori Journey — You are your own Chief.

By caring for each other Tangata whenua, tangata Tiriti. We can work together to build and create a future for Aotearoa. We can travel together in peace and love.

Māui Pōmare



Māui Pōmare was a New Zealand doctor and politician. A leader in both Māori and Pākehā worlds. He is famous for wanting to empower Māori and provide better health outcomes, as well as a longer life expectancy for Māori



He was Ngāti Mutunga and Ngāti Toa, from Taranaki but also spent time living in Wellington and on the Chatham islands.



As a boy, Māui Pomare saw the invasion of Parihaka. He then, came here, to our school, **Christchurch Boys High School for** two years in 1887 and 1888. He was a powerful swimmer and school champion. Afterwards, he attended Te Aute Māori Boys **Boarding School. Whilst receiving** education at both schools, he learnt about sciences and hygiene


After his schooling, he went to study in America, at Battle Creek. He then moved on to Chicago for medical studies. He gained his Medical Doctorate in 1899 at the American Medical Missionary College. He was the first, ever Māori to gain a medical doctorate. It was this school that gave him the knowledge and passion to become a doctor.



Regardless of his qualifications, in the year 1907, the government was still ignoring Māori health issues, so Māui Pomare went to work at what was then called 'The Native Department' he worked there for a short time




Such was his love for our school, he established the Christchurch Boys High School Old Boys association in 1911/1912 and was the first ever president of the association.



From 1916 to 1928, he was the Minister of Cook Islands and during his time as a minister, he was knighted in 1922.



His mana was so great that many people from the Cook Islands, Niue, Samoa, Tonga, Fiji and Tuvalu agreed to fight in the first world war with the Pioneer Battalion The first Māori Battalion. We are descendants of the Pacific – all together!



Also during this time, in 1923, he became the first Māori Minister of Health. He launched programs and assisted with new medical research to establish womens hospitals to ensure to good outcomes for all babies, including Māori babies.



A leader for all, who helped to strengthen and uplift. Despite being a victim of racism, he rose above this. The initiatives he introduced were before their time.

He stood as a doctor, a politician and a Māori health officer beside the Health officer for New Zealand.
We acknowledge him and remember him, for he is one of ours
Tīhei Mauri ora!
