Deputy Principal Message

Celebrating Pasifika Culture: le Faitaga/ **Tupenu Joins Ashburton College Uniform**

Last year, TC Trusler-Clark, a Deputy Head Student at the time, approached me with a proposal to integrate the le Faitaga/Tupenu into Ashburton College's official uniform.

This request was driven by a desire to embrace the rich cultural heritage of our Pasifika students. The le Faitaga (in Samoan), also known as the Tupenu

in Tongan, is a traditional Pacific Island garment, akin to a lava-lava, characterised by its wrap-around design.

This initiative aligns with a growing trend in schools across Canterbury and the North Island, where the le Faitaga/Tupenu has found a place within the official uniforms, primarily benefiting male students.

Consultation

Initiating a robust consultation process, we organised an assembly last year, during which our Pasifika students were introduced to the proposal. We sought their feedback and consensus on pursuing this endeavour. We are pleased to report that all of them provided their wholehearted support, igniting the journey toward this significant addition.

Groundwork

It is essential to acknowledge the groundwork laid by individuals and groups before my tenure at the school. Prior efforts to include the le Faitaga/Tupenu in our uniform made it easier to engage in constructive discussions with various stakeholders within and beyond the school community

Sample Garments

To provide students with a tangible representation of the le Faitaga/ Tupenu, a sample was created for the school. TC used this sample to illustrate how the garment would look and fit, facilitating a better understanding among the students.

Input

We valued the input of our Pasifika parents and, last year, a survey was distributed to them. The results of this survey played a pivotal role in informing the decision of the Ashburton College School Board to incorporate the le Faitaga/Tupenu into the official Ashburton College uniform

I would like to extend my heartfelt appreciation to the teachers, parents, and students who have played a significant role in paving the way for this meaningful integration of Pasifika culture within Ashburton College.

Additionally, a sincere thank you goes to our School Board for their decision. This decision not only enhances the pride of attending Ashburton College but also provides our students with a unique opportunity to emphasise the importance of their identity, language, and culture.

the le Faitaga/Tupenu, these garments are available for purchase at the College Office. Each garment is priced at \$60, and we offer a range of sizes from Small to XXL to cater for individual preferences and needs. Faka'apa'apa atu

This competition is an on-line problem-solving competition organised by the University of Canterbury for Year 9 and 10 students.

This took place in June, with four Year 9 and seven Year 10 students participating.

Division 1

The College team played in Division 1, which held a total of thirteen teams; while Division 2 had twelve teams contesting that competition.

He said that the boys had a blast down south. After a long and loud bus trip down, that included an interesting haircut session roadside at Tekapo, the boys checked into their accommodation and headed off to the Highlands Motor Park for some hot laps in the go-karts. In a hotly contested race, Co-Captain Joel Moffett came away with the fastest lap time, followed closely by one of the Year 13 Assistant Coaches, Fletcher Hobbs.

Monday - Game 1:

First up on Monday was the match against last year's runners-up, Dunstan High School.

While the boys produced some 'great footy' in patches, overall they struggled with the pace of an experienced Dunstan side, losing 38-5. The speed and physicality of the shortened tournament games were an initial shock to the boys, and the ball-running of Ma'a Lene (out with concussion) was severely missed.

Game 2:

The boys turned it around in their second game against Christchurch's St Andrew's College. A fire had been lit under them after the earlier loss, and they were determined to produce an exciting brand of rugby. Co-Captain PJ Taumaoe was rock-solid on defence, quickly shutting down the StAC backline attack. Hooker Mosese Loloma and First-Five Kymani-Cruz Pupuke were phenomenal on attack, dotting down for some excellent 7-point tries. Winger James Reid came up with some clutch turnovers and was strong in contact. The boys came away with the win 40-35, ending the day in good spirits. A quick dip in Lake Dunstan to cool off and the boys were ready for the next day.

College Haka

Later on Tuesday afternoon, the leadership group decided that they would like to learn the school haka to perform in their plate semi-final against Lincoln High School. The three 1st XV members, Eddie Galbraith, Fletcher Hobbs and Oliver Hobbs, held a six-hour practice session for the boys, who showed tremendous respect and dedication to learn it.

Led by Kymani-Cruz Pupuke, Ma'a Lene and Brodyn Cooper, they performed this haka with pride twice on Wednesday; in the pre-game against Lincoln High School, and once more to thank the Ashburton College supporters.

The final plate semi-final game resulted in a close 36-28 loss against Lincoln High School. Tired, sore and bruised, the boys rallied to produce another excellent game and cap their tournament off with their heads high. Strong performances from front rowers Curtis Bayston, Mosese Loloma and Kayden Smith-Ackerley provided a solid platform for the team to work off. Tries to Brodyn Cooper, Sekali McGoon, Matangisinga Afu and Elima Soalii had the boys in front for most of the game.

Year 9 boys James Fakateli and Kash McMillan had shown tremendous growth throughout the tournament, displaying strong signs of leadership in the midfield. Unfortunately, two quick tries to Lincoln in the last few minutes put the game out of reach for our boys, but spirits were high.

Tuesday, Game 1:

This game brought a similar experience to Day 1 where the boys' first game of the day, against Cashmere High School, brought with it some key learnings in ball security, working together and physicality at the rucks.

While the boys took a loss (56-24), there were some awesome performances overall. Maxton Rowlands came on and had an excellent game at First-Five, making a number of key tackles and kicks in play. Matangisinga Afu and Elima Soalii were a handful for the opposition on attack, making significant metres up the field, while Mei Vaeila led the defensive line.

The final game of Pool Play saw AshColl come up against Rangiora High School.

There were high expectations for this game, with a number of boys having played their rivals during the club season. After a stirring speech from Year 13 Assistant Coach Oliver Hobbs, energy was high within the playing group. There were numerous supporters on the side-line, with both teams putting on an excellent spectacle.

Stand-out performances again from Mosese Loloma and Elima Soalii, whose physicality proved hard to handle. Playing out of position at Halfback, Matangisinga Afu had an excellent game, with some strong

turnovers at the ruck. Kymani-Cruz Pupuke showed excellent leadership to rally the boys at half-time while down, and James Reid looked to push the pace with some excellent quicktap penalty plays. Joel Moffett and Quinn McDowell were outstanding at set-piece, with a number of lineout steals. The final score ended in a 19-all draw.

Excellent Results at the South Island Secondary Schools' **Equestrian Championships**

Equestrian Centre at McLean's Island, from 28-31 August. This is the first year that Equestrian has been included in Winter Tournament Week.

This was a four-day event consisting of CTR (Competitive Trail Riding), Dressage, Arena Eventing and Show Jumping/Show Hunter. Riders could select how many classes and what level or heights they competed in.

This was a huge event with about 200 riders from thirty schools from the South Island represented.

Coach Emma Silva gave a bear to each player at the start of tournament. They spent their week attached to team members' sports bag. Apparently, players also had a small rubber duck each. Said ducks were able to be 'stolen' at any time, except when leaving to go to and returning from the stadium. There was guite a bit of inventiveness re 'stealing' and hiding the duck!

Tania tells us that Ashburton College finished 24th in A Grade, and that it was 'great to see such a high calibre of netball across the four days, with some very close competition'.

Game 1 was the team's toughest game, against St Hilda's Collegiate School. During this game, one of our senior players suffered an injury which put her out of play for the next three games.

The team's next two pool games to secure a position in the coveted Top 16 were lost by small margins (4 and 6 goals), but Tania said the girls played well and put up a good fight.

The next aim for the team in the bottom 16 cross-over pool play was to secure a position within the Top 8 of the bottom 16. The first game was against fellow Supernet Competition opposition Rangiora High School where AshColl lost by 12 goals.

However, on Day 3 the players did enough to secure their next aim and finished 2nd in the pool to put the team in a position to play off for 20-24. Both of these two games ended with narrow losses.

Overall, while not making the top 16 teams, the team culture was high and the girls put their best foot forward. Tania said the netball was just one part of the amazing six days they had away, which also included exploring Invercargill.

Results over the week were:

St Hilda's Collegiate School (23-50 loss); Rangi Ruru Girls' High School (30-34 loss); Central Southland College (33-39 loss); Rangiora High School - (loss by 12 goals); Mt Aspiring College - (32-31 win); Burnside High School - (43-39 win); Kaiapoi High School – (41-44 loss); Wakatipu High School – (30-33 loss). The two wins placed the team 24th at the end of the week.
