Senior students are now on study leave for their NCEA examinations which start Friday 8 November and finish on Tuesday 3 December. Those students with exams have their entry slips along with an exam timetable; please ensure your son has a clear study plan and knows what day and time his examinations are on. We wish our students the best of success. Some students have been invited back for the Booster programme this week and they will be completing any outstanding internal assessment work.

This is also an important time of the year for our junior students. Our Year 10 students have just sat or are sitting examinations in English, Mathematics and Science this week. We are now expecting our Year 10 students to lead by example in the school, to put in to practice what they have been learning in their Rite Journey programme. This will lead on to Week 6 when they will complete the Rite Journey year by undertaking their overnight Solo experience.

While there are plenty of positives happening in the school at present there is an issue we are concerned about and that is vaping. There have been instances of students vaping on school property, to and from school and even in the classroom. We are concerned that young people who have never smoked maybe taking this up as a habit as it seems it is the in thing to do. We will treat vaping incidents the same way as we deal with smoking at school.

According to the Ministry of Health website; 'The risks associated with long-term vaping are unknown. While vaping is less harmful than smoking it is unlikely to be totally harm free. Ideally, smokers who are vaping to quit should look to eventually stop vaping too. Scientists will not be certain for many years of any health risks associated with vaping. We don't know what is in all vaping e-liquids, as there are no safety standards in New Zealand yet for vaping products."

By law, vape devices and e-liquids are regulated under the Smoke-free Environments Act 1990. It is an offence to sell nicotine vaping products to young people aged under 18.



New Rector for Timaru Boys' High School

The Board of Trustees were delighted to announce the appointment of Mr David Thorp as the 12th Rector of Timaru Boys' High School, commencing January 2020.

Currently Deputy Principal at Wellington College, Dave held the position of Deputy Rector at Timaru Boys' High School from 2008-2012.



Old Boy makes Cancer Breakthrough

We are very proud of Old Boy, **Professor Nigel McMillan** who has made a major breakthrough in the battle against cancer by using gene-editing technology to eliminate cervical cancer in mice.

Based at the Menzies Health Institute in Queensland, Professor McMillan said it is the first cure for any cancer using the technology. This technology allows cancer to be attacked at its very source - the genes themselves.

Attending Timaru Boys' High School from 1978 to 1982, Nigel credited his biology teacher, Mr Ian Willis (a current teacher) for sparking his interest in the field. With a PhD in virology from the University of Otago, he has spent time working in North America and has been in Australia since 1994.

We look forward to hosting Professor McMillan on his upcoming visit to Timaru Boys' in the near future.



New Zealand Short Course Swimming National Championships

Auckland, 1-5 October 2019

Timaru Boys' High School had five swimmers attending this event – Jack Sands, Matthew Moore, Will Tudgey, Dominic Coleman and Thomas Kyle.

Jack started this short course meet with incredible success, gaining a gold medal in the 200 Individual Medley and a

silver medal in his age group for the 400 Individual Medley. In the remainder of his races he gained a 4th, 5th, 6th and a 19th placing. In addition, he made five super finals. Super finals consist of the best swimmers across all age groups competing. In these events he came 5th, 8th twice, 11th and 14th.

Matthew swam very well with the highlight being a bronze medal in the 200 Butterfly. He gained a 5th placing in the 400 Individual Medley, and 6th in the 200 Backstroke. He also placed 9th, 12th twice and 18th in his other races. Therefore, he finished in the top twenty in his age group in New Zealand, six times. Matthew made five super finals, placing 7th, 12th twice, 15th and 22nd with good personal best times.

Will swam a personal best in the 800 freestyle, knocking 14.11 seconds off his old time to finish 6th. He also gained an 8th, 9th, 12th and 18th placing. Will maintained an impressive 100% personal best record in his races.

Dominic gained a 9th placing in the 400 Individual Medley taking 8.61 seconds off his previous best. He gained 11th, 13th and 20th placings in his three other races. He also swam in one super final.

Thomas swam well at his first big national meet. He gained a 9th in the 400 freestyle taking almost 5 seconds off his previous best. He has also placed 12th, 13th, and 16th.

A note that **Riley Taylor**, a recent Old Boy, also competed. Riley gained three silver medals, and one bronze, and finished in the top ten in his other three races. Riley also made five super finals, gaining a 4th place in one of them.



Teens and Vaping - What you need to Know

Gone is the fug of cigarette smoke hanging in the air as smoking has fallen out of favour, but now there is a new habit gaining traction.

Vaping is the inhaling of a vapour created by an electronic cigarette (e-cigarette) or other battery-powered vaping device. Vaping uses cartridges filled with a liquid that usually contains nicotine, flavourings and chemicals. The liquid is heated into a vapour, which is inhaled – and that is why using e-cigarettes is called "vaping".

Even though vaping is exploding in popularity and e-cigarettes are being used by adolescents and adults alike, there is currently a lack of regulation around vaping and how e-cigarettes should be promoted, sold and used in New Zealand.

Because vaping is a relatively recent innovation, its long-term effects are still unknown. It may be a new way of smoking, but vaping is not a safe alternative to smoking and potentially has just as many health issues as cigarettes are known to have.

The liquids used in vaping and e-cigarettes are available in many flavours used to target young users. Most contain nicotine, but even those that don't still contain toxic chemicals. We know that the nicotine inhaled when vaping is highly addictive and can slow brain development in children and adolescents, affecting memory, concentration, learning, self-control, attention and mood, and potentially increasing the risk of other types of addiction in adulthood. Vaping and e-cigarettes can irritate and damage the lungs, and vaping has recently been linked to an increased risk of heart disease. Vaping can be an entry activity that leads to smoking cigarettes and other forms of tobacco use, and some people use e-cigarettes to vape marijuana, THC oil and other dangerous chemicals.

Vaping facts

- The liquids used in e-cigarette devices and vaping contain harmful chemicals like antifreeze (made from one of two chemicals: propylene glycol or ethylene glycol), diethylene glycol, and carcinogens such as nitrosamines
- The nicotine in e-cigarettes is addictive and can harm brain development
- E-cigarettes are not recommended as a way to quit smoking In some cases, e-cigarette devices have exploded, causing burns or fires
- E-cigarettes can be used to smoke or "vape" marijuana, herbs waxes, and oils
- E-cigarettes are not yet regulated nor approved for smoking cessation by the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA), and the long-term health effects to users and bystanders are still unknown. Due to the lack of regulation, the chemical compounds used in e-cigarettes can vary between brands
- The best way to protect your children is to never smoke or vape near them. Talk with your doctor about quitting all tobacco. Never smoke indoors, in your car, or in places where children spend time

As parents, it is important to be aware of vaping and to find time to discuss with your children the costs of vaping and its detrimental effect on health and wellbeing.



PACE Hospitality Class

As part of the project, they had to interview the client to find out any specific dietary requirements, likes, dislikes and analyse the client's cooking skills and abilities. From here

they have had a lot of challenges whilst trialling, testing, developing and packaging a main meal of the day.

The final product was presented to the client and each developer explained their dishes and gave helpful hints on safe cooking and storage of leftovers. The *Senior Food Bag* was gratefully received and the class is looking forward to feedback in the future.



Apply before 16 December - you can't miss it. Apply at https://www.studylink.govt.nz/

If you're studying in 2020, 16 December is a very important date. It's one you just can't miss.

Around 150,000 students will need to get organised for study in 2020. Apply for your student allowance or loan before 16 December to give yourself the best chance of having everything sorted and ready for the start of your course.

If you've had a student allowance or loan in the last 12 months, login to MyStudyLink and use the Returning Application to apply. It'll take less than five minutes.

NB: those who supply all their supporting documents by 16 December going in the draw to win a 15" MacBook to help with their studies.

Students don't need to have their NCEA results or have locked down all their study plans. Applications can be updated as things are confirmed. By applying early, students will allow enough time for all the steps in the application process to be completed before their course starts.

Student Exchange - Timaru and Eniwa

Sister Cities Timaru invites applications (on the attached form) from Secondary School Students to represent the Timaru District on an escorted Educational and Cultural Exchange to Eniwa, Hokkaido, Japan.

The exchange visit is scheduled for June 2020 and will be for 3 weeks. Three students will be selected.

Applying is easy: you will need a current valid passport and permission from your parents. Preference is given those who

attend a Timaru District School.

You can either write us a piece (150-200 words) or do a short video (1-2 minutes) on why you would be the best person to represent our district in Japan.

Approx airfare cost to the student is \$3000 + taxes and optional personal spending (\$250-500), but travel subsidies may be available. There will be no accommodation cost as you will be home-hosted with a Japanese family.

Applications will close on 25 November. Shortlisted candidates will be contacted for an interview at the end of November 2019. Whilst knowledge of Japanese language & culture is not a prerequisite, an affinity with Japanese culture would be an advantage.
